The P. E. Island Exhibit.

OPINIONS OF THE PRESS.
(From the St. John Telegraph.)

The splendid show of live stock, horses,
sheep, swine and poultry gave practical
evidence of the wonderful capabilities of
these Provinces for producing first-class
cattle for export or home consumption,
for family beef, milk for the dairy, wool
for the factory, or hams, shoulders and
bacon for the table of luxury. The mag-
nificent roadsters and carriage horses,
full blood stallions and thoroughbred
mares that occupied the stables were in
themselves objects of attraction that de-
lighted hundreds of visitors. It is ap-
parent that the improvement in horses
that is noticeable every year is traceable
to the great care taken by our principal
breeders throughout the country, and to
the various stock farms in P. E. Island.
New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, where
intelligence and practical knowledge are
in active combination. The Prince Ed-
ward Island exhibit of horses, cattle and
sheep seems to deserve especial men-
tion. They came under the charge of
Messrs. Gardiner and Longworth, men
who know their business, and who take
delight in exhibiting the really splendid
animals from that smallest Province of
the Dominion. The Government Stock
Farm of that Province sends a splendid
collection of horses, cattle and sheep,
which have been alluded to by telegraph.
Their celebrated Clydesdale stallion is a
marvel of beauty; only three years old
and weighs 1,800 lbs.; bred out of pure
stock on this farm. They also have a
Short Durham cow that is a perfect
monster, and a graceful and beautiful
creature, weighing 1,950 lbs. The re-
maining collection of Durhams from this
farm are all up to the standard and com-
prise five cows and heifers and a famous
Short Horn Durham bull. All of the
Government Farm exhibit are prob-
ably the finest specimens in the
yards, and are under the charge
of Commissioner Gardiner. F. Hol-
land, and Mr. Geo. Compton, St. Eleanor's,
Short Horn Durham bulls, that are pro-
nounced the finest animals ever seen on
exhibition. The other exhibitors of cat-
tle and horses from P. E. I. are Messrs.
Longworth and DeBlois, Wallace Rodd
(Henry Morgan Stallion), John Reid,
Geo. McGregor, Capt. McKenzie, James
Mutch, Donald Ross, John Kennedy,
Thomas Robbins, Wm. Sinnott, Wm.
Ross, Capt. McLeod (Blackfoot), who
took first prize in P. E. I. Exhibition as
a roadster), Malcolm McInnes and
George McFarlane. These gentlemen
are all from the vicinity of Charlot-
tewtown, and the excellent character of their
entire show of horses, and the interest
taken by them in the exhibition entitles
them all to special reference.

The P. E. Island live stock exhibit, as
a whole, is universally admitted to be of
a very superior order. The effect pro-
duced in that Province by the Govern-
ment Stock Farm are of the most favor-
able character. The Island horse "Bar-
rister," selected by Mr. Gardiner last
spring and purchased for the farm is pro-
nounced very superior. The cattle and
sheep are of the most improved breeds,
and have shared largely in prizes. H.
Longworth, a prominent stock raiser in
the vicinity of Charlottetown, seems to
compete closely with the Government
Farm in cattle and sheep. He also car-
ries off prizes in the different classes and
sections in which he is a competitor.
Mr. Boswell, also a farmer from the
Island, has a very handsome lot of
sheep on exhibition; also black oats,
which are said to be the best at the
Exhibition. In fact the whole exhibit
from this small but fertile province is
highly creditable to its people and Gov-
ernment. The method adopted by the
Government of that Province in causing
a representation of its products at the
Dominion Exhibition deserves commenda-
tion. They appointed a Board of Com-
missioners termed the Advisory Board
of P. E. Island. The Secretary of this
Board is Mr. A. McNeill, who has for
many years been Secretary of Provin-
cial Exhibitions in his native Province.
This Board appointed Judges to select
the different animals and articles entered
for the Dominion Exhibition, thereby
securing a choice exhibit in every de-
partment. Much of the success of the
Island at the Exhibition is due to this
Advisory Board.

(From the Moncton Times.)

At St. John last year the Prince Ed-
ward Island exhibit attracted a great deal
of attention and admiration. This year
the Island is again to the front. The
live stock exhibit consists of thirteen
stallions, seventeen gelding and mares,
twenty-five head of cattle, forty sheep,
and some poultry. The sheep made a
very fine show, and the horses were by
far the best on the grounds. The Island
is noted for its fine horses. Some ex-
cellent samples of grain, potatoes, oat-
meal, and prepared fish were also exhib-
ited. In manufactures, Thomas Hall, of
Summerside, exhibits a threshing and
fanning machine. Robert Smallwood, of

Charlottetown, a rotary saw mill, shingle
machine and jointer. Edward Lane,
New Perth, a new patent potato digger.
John Burrows, Charlottetown, an iron
plow. Miller Bros., sewing machines.
Sundry articles in woollen cloths, linen
sheeting, table cloths, horse rugs, wool-
len mitts, hair work, fret work, etc., are
also exhibited from the Island, and alto-
gether the display is creditable.

NEWS NOTES.

Mrs. John Footer, of Woodstock, Ont.,
drowned herself and her infant in a cist-
ern containing only about a foot of water.
Despondency is the only probable cause
mentioned.

Further details of the recent defeat of
Ayoub Khan by the Ameer's forces go to
show that the reverse was brought about
after three hours' resultless fighting, by
the treachery of the former's Cabuli
troops and the desertion of two Herati
regiments. The Ameer will march upon
Herat in a few days.

The "Nun of Kenmare" is seriously
ill. An overworked nervous system is
said to be the cause. The hope that one
who has done so much for her poorer
countrymen may soon be restored to
health will be joined in by all who can
appreciate sincerity of purpose, and a
life of self-denial.

McLeod Stewart, Brazilian Vice-Consul
at Ottawa, has received a letter in which
it is stated that the first steamer, the
Comittee Deu, had left France for
Brazil, and was expected to start from
Rio de Janeiro for Canada on 12th Oct.
The company formed have purchased a
second steamer and ordered the construc-
tion of five more.

The prospects for building a ship canal
in Spain from the Bay of Biscay to the
Mediterranean through the Valley of the
Garrone and the Andee are somewhat
favorable. State Engineers originally
estimated the cost of it at 1,500,000,000f
but others who have made a survey say
the canal can be dug for less than half
that—some 700,000,000f. The Coun-
cil General of the Andee has adopted a
motion in favor of the work.

The commander of the United States
revenue cutter Corwin, now engaged in
search service in the Arctic seas, has
formally taken possession of Wrangell
Land in the name of his Government.
The new territory is described as being
desolate and sterile beyond description,
and beyond its possibilities as a future
station for Arctic exploration, it is likely
to prove as unenviable an acquisition as
Alaska.

The land part of the Canadian Pacific
Railway syndicate's work is progressing
favorably. There are nearly 1,500 ap-
plicants for land, and these are stated to
be mostly well-to-do farmers from On-
tario and England. These are the very
people to form the backbone of the popu-
lation of the North-West. Enviroined
as that country may be with possible dif-
ficulties in the future, it is well for Canada
to see that the new population is thor-
oughly permeated with a love for British
institutions.

Dr. Boynton is understood to be about
to publish a statement in reference to
the autopsy performed on the remains of
the late President, in which he charges
the operating and assisting surgeons with
gross carelessness, negligence, and want
of thoroughness in their mode of con-
ducting the examination. He claims that
more than one important viscus which
might have given a clue to the real cause
of death was not examined, and that the
search for the ball—the whole autopsy in
fact—was conducted with a total ab-
sence of scientific precision.

English farm lands having been for-
merly kept up by manure, the impover-
ishment of the tenant farmers has not
permitted this expense lately. A sure
sign of the fearful struggle for existence
among the English farmers is seen in
the fact that their crops now generally
appear thin even with favorable climate
conditions. Meanwhile the lowering
rents and actual abandonment of many
farms is playing havoc with the country
gentry, who have been in almost afflu-
ent circumstances all their lives, inheriting
ancestral estates. There is small chance
that these will recover their lost incomes.

The endeavors to form a company in
London for the purchase and development
of two millions of acres in the North-West,
half from the Government and half from
the Syndicate, are likely to prove a success.
The Times' special letters concerning the
Marquis of Lorne's progress are attracting
great attention. Lord Lorne's statement
that the Syndicate, whose fortunes de-
pended on the success of the gigantic enter-
prise just undertaken, had assured him
that whatever disquietude or anxiety they
once entertained was completely gone from
their minds in consequence of the way in
which settlers are flocking in, and that the
peopling of the North West is an absolute
certainty, greatly influences disheartened
farmers here. Many are now desirous of
emigrating.
