Portrait Leads to Film Career

LONDON, July 16.—(C.P.)—Eight months ago Pat Prior served drinks at the bar of a London hotel. Today she is an artist's model and climbing the ladder of film success, acting with one of the biggest producing firms in England.

Miss Prior, a red-head, often dreamed of becoming a star on the screen and when a friend suggested she should become an artist's model, she laughed.

Miss Prior did turn artist's model. Cecil Phillips, director of the Leicester Galleries, saw her one day and thought her type of beauty would appeal to an artist he had in mind—Suzanne Eisenbeck. When Miss Eisenbeck said she wished to paint Miss Prior, Phillips began to search the West End for her. She had left the hotel bar for a restaurant and from there she had obtained a post somewhere else. At last Mr. Phillips found the would-be film star, and she agreed to sit for a painting. Nervous and unaccustomed to the long hours of patiently sitting still in the brightly-lit studio, Miss Prior wondered how she would appear in the finished painting. At last she saw herself in a big oil painting—as a young Edwardian maid, pouring a drink out of a silver cocktail-shaker for a bearded diner.

Today her picture is hanging with 22 others by Suzanne Eisenbeck at the Leicester Galleries. The words "Miss Pat" above the artist's signature, give the clue to the identity of the maid who wanted to go on the screen. Mr. Phillips helped her obtain a film test. Then followed voice tests and after that small parts in films. Now she is on her way up in the film world.

LONDON, July 16.—(C.P.)—Literally speaking, Adrian Bilgeman is "all at sea." Recently he inserted an advertisement in a newspaper asking for six young men who would invest \$500 each as expenses and act as crew on a 30,000-mile voyage. He would buy the boat. A week later he married Miss Jane Rafterbury and immediately set off on his honeymoon to Finland. On his return the 28-year-old son of a Wimbledon scientist was practically overwhelmed by more than 200 applications from men and women, young and old. After careful study of the applicants he has reduced the number to 43. Many of the 200 who wrote him didn't have the necessary money while one man said he would contribute \$25,000 as his share. "A person deeply interested in our enterprise has written suggesting I should try to buy the Cutty Sark, the famous old China tea clipper," he says. The Cutty Sark was built on the Clyde 67 years ago and since 1922 has been anchored at Falmouth Harbor and used as a training ship. Mrs. Downman, widow of Captain W. H. Downman, bought the old boat back from the Portuguese, but the difficulty now is to induce Mrs. Downman to sell. Meanwhile Bilgeman has received notification of several schooners in the market and, failing to buy the Cutty Sark, he will start out on another "process of elimination."
