

# Sheriff James MacKillop Serves Orders For Delivery

SYDNEY (CP) — Sheriff James MacKillop of Cape Breton County made the rounds of banks in this part of Nova Scotia Monday serving Supreme Court orders for delivery of thousands of dollars worth of sunken treasure recovered from a wrecked French pay ship near Louisbourg, N.S., last fall.

The order in effect required Alex Storm, 9-year-old Louisbourg scuba diver, and two companions to turn over to the sheriff an estimated \$700,000 in 18th century French gold and silver coins they salvaged.

Sheriff MacKillop said he found six boxes come in a Sydney bank during visits to all banks here and in Louisbourg Monday. His next step will be to count the money, record it, arrange for its safekeeping and report to the court.

He said he planned to start counting the coins Wednesday night and he expected to have the count completed by Friday.

The injunction was obtained in Supreme Court at Halifax Saturday by other Cape Breton group headed by Robert D. MacDonald of Glace Bay, N.S. MacDonald, also a scuba diver, contends his group has a partnership agreement with Storm covering search for the treasure. Storm says he ended the agreement last year.

An earlier injunction obtained by the MacDonald group prohibits Storm and his co-workers from disposing of the money until the Nova Scotia Supreme Court hears arguments April 22.

Also involved in the case is the Nova Scotia Provincial Secretary, J. Gerald Doucet. His department is a used Storm a treasure trove licence last year. It provided that the province would get 10 per cent of anything he found.

MacDonald contends his group has a prior title based on a licence to search the 1925 wreck of the pay ship Le Chameau issued in 1961, by the Sydney receiver of wrecks, a federal official. Meanwhile varying estimates of the recovered treasure were made by both sides to the dispute. These ranged from a high of \$800,000 to a low of \$10,000.

# Former Archdeacon Passes In Hospital

Canon James Thomas Ibbott, retired Archdeacon of the Diocese of Prince Edward Island, died Monday morning in the P.E.I. Hospital.

Rev. Ibbott had been inducted as Rector of St. Paul's Parish in Charlottetown in 1944 and promptly became identified with many objectives recognized as worthy and in the interest of the community.

Born in Rosendale, Lancashire County, England, Sept. 9, 1884 the son of a clergyman, he came to Canada as a young man and engaged in various kinds of work available eventually joining the staff of the Canadian Bank of Commerce in a western city.

Shortly after the outbreak of hostilities at the time of the First Great War he enlisted for training at Moulton, Ont., with a view serving in the Imperial Forces, which he did as a pilot officer in the Royal Flying Corps, on completing his training.

On his return to Canada he became a theological student at Wycliffe College in Toronto and was made a deacon of a parish in Nova Scotia in 1923. A year later he was ordained priest.

Rev. Canon Ibbott was curate of St. Paul's Church Halifax, N.S., from 1923 to 1930, rector of a church in St. Stephen, N.B., from Dec. 1930 to March 1937 and rector at a parish in Woodstock N. B., from March 1937 to Dec. 1939 and at Trinity Church in Halifax from Dec. 1939 to Oct. 1944. From Oct. 1944 to Sept. 1962 he was rector at St. Paul's in Charlottetown.

He was made a Canon of St. Peter's Cathedral, Charlottetown, in 1952 and a Canon of All Saints Cathedral, Halifax, in 1957.

In 1960 he was made Archdeacon of the Diocese of Prince Edward Island. He retired from active parish work in September due to ill health.

For the following year he was rector emeritus of St. Paul's Parish.

Canon Ibbott was past president of the Ministerial Association and was active in the formation of the Protestant Welfare Bureau.

Other local activities during his life in Charlottetown included membership in St. John's Lodge, A.F. and A.M. where he served as protestant chaplain. In the Second Great War he was Protestant Chaplain to the Naval unit at HMCS Queen Charlotte. He had also been part-time chaplain at HMCS Stadacona in Halifax.

# Contraceptives Termed Harmful

HALIFAX (CP) — The head of the medical staff at Halifax Children's Hospital, Dr. William Cochrane, says birth control pills may be contributing to an increase in the number of deformed babies born in Canada.

"Somebody should be studying this," he said in an interview.

Dr. Cochrane based his concern on an apparent increase in the frequency of birth defects involving mothers in their late child-bearing years.

He said it seems obvious that many mothers delay having children so they can work to accumulate a nest-egg or pay for their home before getting tied down to the job of raising a family.

As a result they were having fewer children and having them at an age when, according to evidence, there is a greater risk of congenital abnormalities. Statistics indicated that from four to six per cent of all new-born babies are deformed.

He said he feels birth control pills and other contraceptive devices are "significantly affecting our population growth" at a time when Canada needs more people. There were 25,000 fewer births in Canada last year and 250,000 fewer in the United States.

Dr. Cochrane urged formation of health councils to co-ordinate a welfare, education and employment program for victims of congenital deformities and their families. An accurate registration system should be started and a genetic laboratory counselling service provided, possibly on a regional basis.

# Accident Claims Life

BATHURST (CP) — A two-car head-on crash at nearby Jeanville early Monday claimed the life of a six-year-old child and sent eight persons to hospital, one in critical condition.

RCMP said Gilbert Drapeau of Eel River, N.B., died in hospital of injuries suffered in the collision.

In hospital are Evelyn Blanchard, 31, the driver of one car and her mother Macrina Blanchard, 64, both of Bathurst.

Occupants of the other vehicle taken to hospital were Noella Paradis and Geraldine Drapeau, both 18, Maurice Savoie, 21, and Gerard Ouellet, 22, all believed to be from the Eel River area.

Police have not released the names of two other persons taken to hospital.

An inquest has been ordered into the death of the Drapeau child but no date has been set.

## Heavy Traffic Is Reported

The only exceptionally heavy traffic over the Easter weekend was Eastern Provincial Airways schedule. EPA reported their passenger service was extremely busy with all flights booked over the weekend, yesterday and today.

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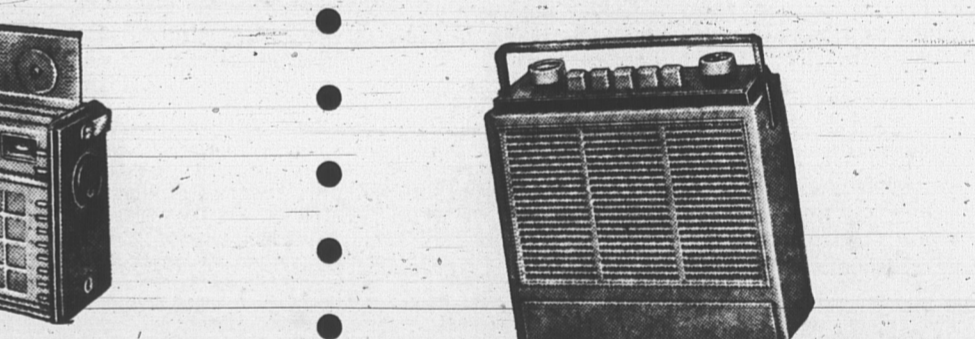
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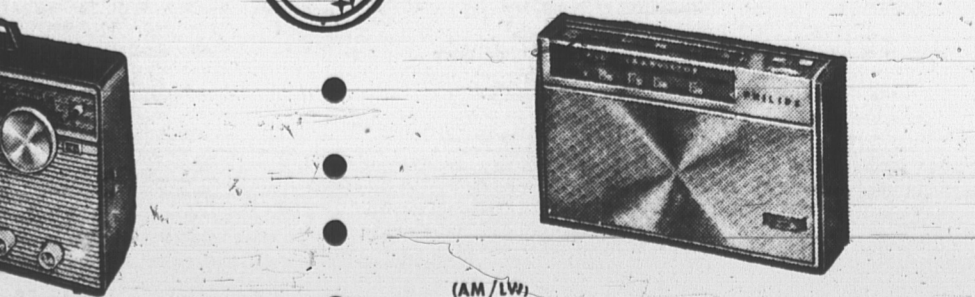


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
