**Six Latin American Students Invited To Halifax College**

HALIFAX (CP)—The University of King's College is issuing the first invitations for students at its new Latin American Institute.

President H. L. Puxley said the invitations are being sent to an initial group of six students, three men and three women. If the invitations are accepted the students will arrive at King's

For opening of the fall term Sept. 13.

The institute is the first of its kind in Canada for students from Central and South America. Canon Puxley, who has worked on the project for several years, says one aim is closer educational and cultural relations between Canadians and Latin Americans.

Most of the students are expected to take post-graduate work in such fields as medicine, oceanography, dentistry, law, engineering or nursing. However, undergraduate classes will be open to them.

They will live in student residences on the King's campus. Canon Puxley said this is "vitally important" if they are to enter into college social life and see how Canadians live and think.

For the same reasons he feels the institute's fall enrolment should be kept at a low figure—"probably less than 20."
