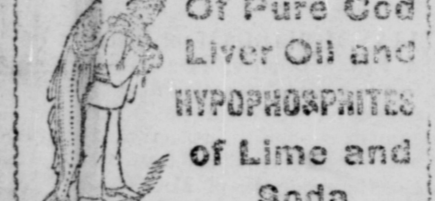

## The Dairy Breeds.

So long as we have different breeds of cattle, for whatever purpose kept, we cannot know too much about them. Hence the work of the experiment stations in testing the different breeds and recording results is invaluable.

The importance of the matter is reason for a careful study of the tabulated results given, taken from station bulletin 77, on one of the Experimental Farms, issued a short time ago. An interesting fact is the close comparison found between the Shorthorns and Holsteins.

The cattle selected were Ayrshires, by the Ayrshire Breeders' Association; Guernseys, by the American Guernsey Cattle Club; Holstein-Friesian, by the Holstein-Friesian Association of America; Jerseys, by the Philadelphia Jersey Breeders' Club; Shorthorns, by the American Shorthorn Breeders' Association.

The most important and thorough test ever made, of all the dairy breeds, shows the Guernseys to produce the highest percentage of solids; the highest percentage of butter-fat; the lowest cost per pound of solids; and that a quart of Guernsey milk costs less than nearly all the others, while it is worth more.

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

### The First District of Queen's.

SIR,—I observe in a recent issue of THE EXAMINER that the independent electors of the First District of Queen's County have proved themselves to be worthy sons of worthy sires by resenting the insult thrust upon them by a clique in Charlottetown. They have chosen a candidate from among themselves to represent their interests in the Legislature of this Province. It is just what the whole country expected from so intelligent a district. Surely among the many highly qualified liberals of New London and Crapaud someone might have been found worthy to fill a seat in the councils of the country! But this did not suit the ambitious little coterie of the city. Hence the Conservatives of the District have come to the rescue and nominated a man from among themselves, independent of any dictation from Charlottetown. They have, no doubt, heard of the experience of other country districts in "ye olden time" when Charlottetown lawyers were considered the fit and proper persons to look after their interests. When these gentlemen would be around the District soliciting votes they appeared to take the deepest interest in the welfare of the constituency. But once they were returned to the House, it was the last time that the light of their countenance would be seen by their supporters until the expiration of their four years term, when they would, in all probability, be around again—smiling as blandly as before. This however, to use a common expression, is "played out." No intelligent community now goes abroad to look for a man to represent it. The people want some one interested in, and thoroughly acquainted with, the wants of the district.

Now, that this commendable spirit has shown itself among the people of the "First District" in the nomination of Dr. McNeill, it behoves all who have the welfare of the district at heart, be they Liberals or Conservatives, to rally around him and thoroughly resent the covert insinuation that they are not one of themselves fit for the position. By doing so they will teach the Charlottetown aspirants for public honors to win them at home, and it will likely be sometime before they asked to elect a non-resident again. Of course a great effort will be made from the city to carry the city man, and a "posse" will certainly be out. Look out for their caravansaries, and make a note of how they are loaded.

### A Shot at the Railway.

SIR,—There is a limit beyond which human endurance cannot or ought not to be pushed. We have not been disposed to criticise the management of the Railway or make more difficult its administration, looking and longing every day for such changes or corrections in the present manner of doing things as anybody in the land has a right to expect. But matters are going from bad to worse. Over the western, or only paying end of the line, any kind of service is considered good enough and the complaints, not of cranks or busybodies, but of those who have the best interests of the people and place at heart, have been disregarded—in some cases even treated with scant courtesy. Just now as I said, any kind of service is considered good enough for us. For dear knows how long, our trains have been two and three hours late, and in more than one case disgusted passengers, tired out waiting at by-stations, (which I may add, are filthy places, little better than urinals) have been obliged to wend their weary way homeward and take to the means of locomotion of pre-railway times. Why, sir, this very evening I stood for hours in the rain at Mill River Station, a place nobody could put his nose into, while the train due when I got there, was handing freight and creeping along at a snail's pace, between Port Hill and O'Leary. The special train, notwithstanding the number of times the favor has been asked for, lies all day long at Summerside, at the same cost to the country as if it were put through to Tignish, while the passenger is obliged to travel by the regular, and to his utter disgust and inconvenience, be landed at his destination hours behind schedule time. In this age, in any age, Mr. Editor, I call this shameful and no credit to our vaunted railway management. Let them do one of either things or get out and make room for others:—Let them put the steamboat special through to Tignish every day as we have a right to expect; or send out a special to clear up the freight along the line in busy seasons like this and allow regular trains make regular time. We certainly have a claim to some better attention and a share of the improvements being made around us. Cross over the straits and you would find that you were under the same government at all. Here, fast trains, comfortable, clean, well ventilated, newly painted cars are on every little branch of the I. C. R., the stations are bright and clean and the officers well dressed—very big runs along as if you were in another railway world. Here we would be taken (at least up west) for a coal mine track, while we are in every way entitled to the same service as the Nova Scotians and New Brunswickers get. Just look at our old cars, cast-off engines, etc. Look at the shabby staff of the half-paid employe. See the wearied out passenger getting off at every miserable station and praying that there may be no more stops, think of the extravagant fares charged for such a service, and then ask yourself if the time has not come to kick against such an outrage and kick vigorously. 'Tis a shame, a crying shame, and none but the spiritless would tolerate it! You may think, Mr. Editor, that this is overdrawn, but any such delusion may be quickly dissipated by buying a ticket for Tignish to-morrow.
