DOWN THE BACK STRETCH



The most sensational event in the local racing season was the pacing of a mile in 2:06 at Summerside Raceway last Saturday night. Andrew Perry's Bay State Pat cut two and two-fifths seconds off the former record of 2:08 2/5 made by Headway 2:06 2/5 on Sept. 27, 1953, driven by Jimmie Given. It was a most astonishing mile and stamps this horse as a 2:00 pacer when he hits a mile oval or a track like Vernon Downs in New York where world's records are being made on that three-quarter mile speedway.

Looking over past record miles we find that at Frederick track Walter Dale 2:00 1/2 (Clukey) paced to a Canadian record of 2:02 1/2 on Sept. 15, 1937. Over the old Moncton oval (Havard) Frisco

paced in 2:04 1/5 for driver Doucette on July 23, 1948, and at St. Stephen on Sept. 2, 1937. Walter Dale 2:00 1/2 (Clukey) set up a mark of 2:05. It was Ray Henley 2:02 1/2, driven by Earle Avery, that paced the Woodstock track in 2:05 on July 14, 1933. At Bridgewater, N. S., on Sept. 6, 1943, Jolity paced to a new record and track record of 2:05 1/2. At New Glasgow Union Track on July 25, 1945, Mighty Hanover 2:02 1/2, driven by Harley Harrison, paced in 2:06, and at Charlottetown on August 20, 1935, Bud Wengert 2:05 1/2, driven by Earle Avery, set the mark which still stands, of 2:05 1/2. The record for the old race track at Summerside was 2:07 1/2, made by Happy L. 2:03 1/2, driven by Earle Sample on July 17, 1945.

Onrushing Phillies Defeat Cubs 6-4 For 15 Of 19; Chicago Maintains A.L. Lead

CHICAGO, (AP)—Philadelphia Phillies bagged their 15th win in the last 19 games as they rallied for four runs in the ninth inning to hang a 6-4 defeat on Chicago Cubs before 4,271 patrons Friday.

In snapping a three-game losing skein, the Phillies compounded their winning spurt on just two hits—one of them Glen Gorbous' line double over right fielder Bob Speake's head.

Sam Jones, who was charged with his 15th loss, walked eight and hit one batsman before his withdrawal with the bases full and none out in the ninth.

Bobby Morgan drew a walk off Bill Tremel, Jones' successor, to force in the first run. Gorbous' semi gift double produced two more and Del Ennis' sacrifice fly powered the fourth.

The Phillies settled for just six hits. Willie Jones smacked a bases-empty homer his 13th of the year.

Ernie Banks homered for the Cubs, getting his 30th to give the Cubs a 4-2 edge going into the Philadelphia nines.

After the Phillies recaptured the lead, manager Mayo Smith sent in Robin Roberts' ace, to hold the Cubs in the ninth.

NEW YORK (AP)—Pinch-hitter Joe Collins slashed a single through the middle scoring Mickey Mantle in the eighth inning to enable New York Yankees to edge the tough Kansas City A's 3-2 Friday night.

The triumph kept the Yanks just two percentage points behind Chicago White Sox in the torrid American League pennant race, 612 to 610.

Whitey Ford went all the way to hang up his 12th victory. He also hit a home run. Tom Gorman, an ex-Yank, was the victim, although he pitched only one inning after taking over for Vir Rashi, himself a former Yankee ace.

BOSTON (AP)—The pennant-hungry Boston Red Sox remained within three games of the top by cooling off the fifth-place Detroit Tigers 5-0 Friday night behind the four-hit pitching of Wallard Nixon, aided by Ted Williams' 17th home run.

The victory, the Red Sox 38th of their last 50 games, kept them two games behind the third-place Cleveland Indians and boosted their margin to 3 1/2 over the Tigers.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Chicago White Sox broke loose for three runs in the ninth inning to defeat Washington, 5-2, Friday night and retained their American League lead. Virgil Trucks held the Senators to six hits to win his 10th decision as the White Sox beat Washington for the 12th straight time.

Walt Droppa, a standout since the All-Star Game, obtained three of Chicago's nine hits off Pedro Ramos and Camilo Pascual and broke a 2-2 tie in the ninth when he singled across Nelson Fox.

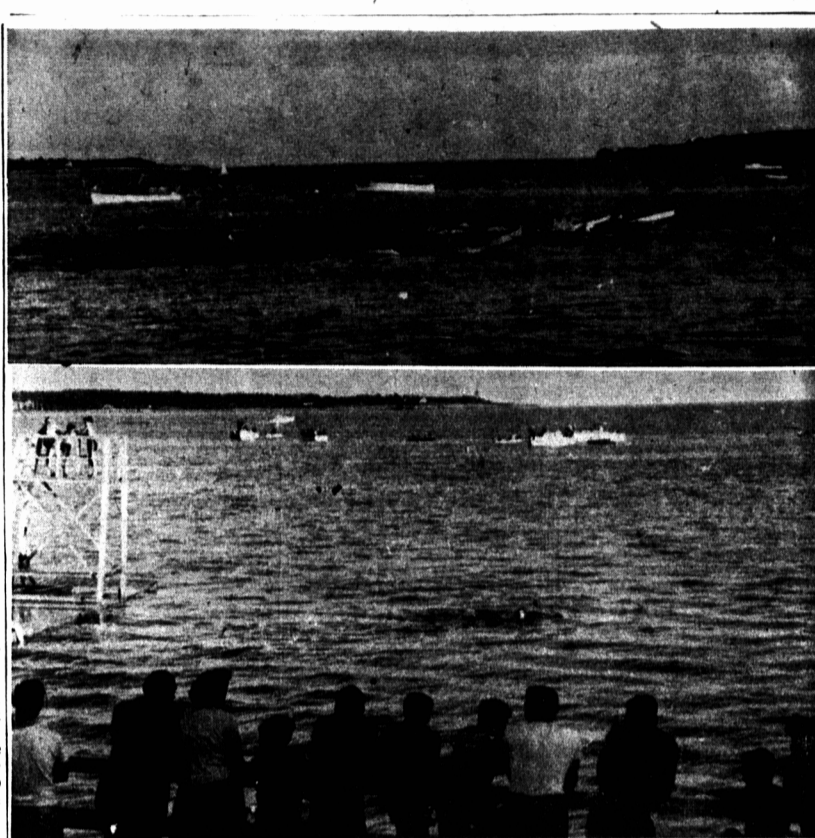

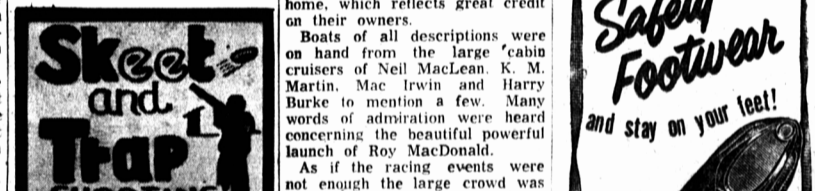

Two weeks following this big shoot the Maritime Championships will be held in Halifax and the local Maritime champions will be out to defend their class titles.

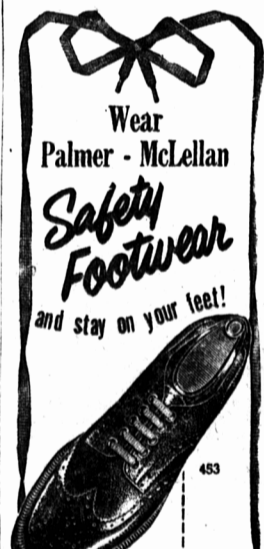
