

Reopening Service Held At Princetown Road U.C.

Extensive redesigning and re-decorating of the Princetown Road United Church has been completed. The original building was moved back thirty feet on a new foundation. A front entrance, nine by fourteen feet, and an extension to the main building, twelve by twenty-eight feet, were built on the front entrance partially supports the new spire, and the extension to the main building provides space for two class rooms and a chapel.

The lines of distinction running between the square blocks of ten text on the ceiling, form a very nice pattern. The walls are graced with ripple plywood, nicely tinted, with trimmings to match. The new furnishings consist of: Pulpit, Pew, extra lights, heating system and new carpets.

A capacity congregation attended the reopening service on Nov. 13. After the singing of Psalm 68, Mr. Heber Hardy, Minister, conducted the dedication service. The service consisted of: Pulpit, Pews, extra lights, Heating System and carpets were dedicated as a memorial to the late Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Darke. The extra lights, in loving memory of Mrs. Fred Dolar, given by Alice, Florence, Alma and Golden; and the George F. Proude, sister Beattie and brother Dale, given by Mrs. Charles Proude, Mrs. Emerson Kent, Percy and Owen.

These memorials were unveiled and presented by Mr. Charles Proude, who also read the Church History. Three special selections were sung at the morning service: A solo, "Bless This House" by Miss Pauline MacIntyre; a Trio, "The Love of God" by Mr. Hieshly, Mr. Lorne Smith and Mr. Davis Ward; and a Duet, "The Beautiful Land" by Mrs. Kenneth MacRae and Mrs. Heber H. Hardy. Fred Coles, organist, presided throughout the service.

Mr. Hardy chose for a Scripture lesson, Ezekiel Ch. 43 verses 1-6, and from the sixth verse preached a timely dedication sermon, from the subject, "God speaks to man, and man can speak to God." The singing of Hymn No. 199 and benediction brought the morning service to a close.

Mr. Hardy was in charge of the afternoon and evening services. Overflow congregations were in attendance. The special numbers at the afternoon service were a Duet, "Who at My Door is Standing," by Mrs. Vincent White and Mrs. MacPherson; Anthem, "Christ and the Church" by the Choir. The choir was under the direction of Mrs. Fred Coles, except for the Trio "Saved by Grace," sung by Messrs. J. B. Lewis, Colby Lewis and Ray Lidstone, with Mrs. Stanley Newman, organist.

Rev. Frank MacLean, of Trinity United Church, Charlottetown, was the guest speaker at the afternoon service. Reading from Second Peter, Chapter one, choosing for his subject, "The Dangers of Idolatry," and in his usual eloquence delivered an inspiring address. The service closed with Hymn 491 followed by the Benediction.

The special numbers for the evening service were a Duet, "Dawning and" by Mr. Everett Dunning and Mr. Andrew C. Johnson; accompanist, Mrs. Ernest Dunning; Trio "The Lord is My Shepherd," by Messrs. J. B. Lewis, Colby Lewis and Ray Lidstone, accompanist Mrs. Stanley Newman; Solo "The Heart That was Broken for Me" by Mr. J. B. Lewis; and the Anthem and other selections rendered by the choir under the leadership of the organist, Mrs. Fred Coles.

Rev. John Sheen of the Orwell Vernon Charge, was the guest speaker for the evening service. He chose for his text Hebrews Chapter 9, verse Nine, subject "Obedience" and from that subject he delivered a challenging message. After a few words of appreciation to all who so unselfishly gave of their time and talent, by Mr. Hardy, Hymn No. 441 was sung, bringing a delightful and inspiring opening day to a close with prayer and the Benediction by Mr. W. E. Brooks, President of the Lay Association.

The original church built approximately ninety-one years ago, has been remodeled and reopened three years ago. The last reopening was about thirty years ago, when Rev. Henry Pierce, Rev. W. M. Ryan, and Rev. W. H. Palmer conducted the reopening services. At this reopening a new organ was presented by relatives and descendants of Thophilus Abbott. Two gasoline lamps were also donated, one by Mrs. W. G. Darke in loving memory of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Essary, the other by Mr. Lloyd Proude of Charlottetown.

Former Islander Retires From Saskatchewan Bench

A Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan, paper has the following reference to Judge George W. McPhee, a former Prince Edward Islander who has been a judge of the District Court in Saskatchewan since 1940 and before that a member of the House of Commons at Ottawa, and who is retiring from the bench on Nov. 17:
Judge McPhee's forebears came from the Isle of Skye in the Hebrides as long as more than a century ago, and the family has lived in Prince Edward Island, where George W. McPhee was born, down to the present generation.

He was born on Nov. 17, 1880, at St. Catherine's, Prince Edward Island, and was educated at Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, near his birthplace.

He studied law and was admitted to the Bar of Prince Edward Island in 1910, and the same year was elected to the Legislature of Prince Edward Island serving his fellow Islanders for two years before packing his bags and coming west to the land of greater opportunity and enlarging law practices.

One of Judge McPhee's first activities in Saskatchewan, where he located, was to take part in the strenuous six weeks' election campaign of the Scott government, and his capabilities were shortly afterwards again recognized, when in 1914, he was appointed chairman of the Board of Licence Commissioners for this province.

From 1915 until 1918 he acted as Crown Prosecutor for Yorkton. In 1917 he was Liberal candidate for the House of Commons in MacKenzie, but was defeated.

MP FOR YORKTON
In October, 1925, however, he secured election to parliament in his new home riding of Yorkton. In 1927 he was Liberal candidate for the House of Commons in MacKenzie, but was defeated.

During the time that he was active in politics before he was appointed to the District Court Bench, George McPhee rendered great service to the Liberal cause. In the 1935 general election he campaigned in Ontario and the Maritime provinces and took an active part in the provincial elections in New Brunswick. He addressed more than 20 conventions in the province of Ontario in the Dominion election.

He was chairman of the private bills committee of the House of Commons and a member of the committee on banking and commerce.

From 1943 until 1950 Judge McPhee was appointed as rental appeal judge for the southern half of Saskatchewan from Qu'Appelle valley down to the international boundary, and from the Manitoba boundary to the Alberta boundary.

SWORN-IN HERE
Mr. McPhee was created a King's Counsel in August 1920. He was sworn-in as judge of the District and Surrogate courts for the judicial district of Moose Jaw on Feb. 26, 1940, the ceremony being the first time in the annals of the city that the swearing-in of a judge had taken place here. He succeeded Judge F. A. G. Ouse.

He tempered justice with mercy and in every possible way gave the prisoner the benefit of the doubt, imposing short prison terms whenever possible.
