

About Horses.

If any of our readers are looking for a here definition of a "general-purpose horse" it is from the prize list of the Toronto Industrial Exhibition: "A general-purpose horse is understood to be a horse that is suitable for the wagon, carriage, buggy, saddle, or plow." The next problem is to find a horse to fit the definition. Really we mildly protest that this is carrying classification altogether to an extreme.

The horse will leave musty hay untouched in his bin, no matter how hungry. He will not drink of water objectionable to his questioning sniffs, or from a bucket which some other odor makes offensive, however thirsty. His intelligent nostril will widen, quiver, and query over the faintest bit offered by the faintest of hands. A mare is never satisfied by either sight or whinny that her colt is really her own until she has certified the fact by means of her nose. Blind horses, as a rule, will gallop wildly about a pasture without striking the surrounding fence. The sense of smell informs them of its proximity. Others will, when loosened from the stable, go directly to the gate or bars opening to their accustomed feeding grounds; and when desiring to return, after hours of careless wandering, will distinguish the one outlet, and patiently await its opening. The odor of that particular part of the fence is their guide to it. The horse in browsing, or while gathering herbage with his lip, is guided in his choice of proper food entirely by his nostrils. Blind horses do not make mistakes in their diet. In the temple of Olympus a bronze horse was exhibited, at the sight of which six real horses exhibited the most violent emotions. Aelian judiciously observes that the most perfect art could not imitate nature sufficiently well to produce so perfect an illusion. Like Pliiny and Pausanias, he consequently affirms that "in casting the statue a magician had thrown hippomanes upon it," which, by the odor of the plant, deceived the horses, and therein we have the secret of the miracle. The scent alone of a buffalo robe will cause many horses to evince lively terror, and the floating scent of a railroad train will frighten some long after the locomotive is out of sight and hearing.

The Farming World has this to say concerning the treatment of mare and foal: It is most injudicious, dangerous indeed, to both mare and foal, to keep the mare away from her foal until her udder is very much gorged and extended. Inflammation may arise in the udder, and unless it is at once checked the life of the mare be endangered. Then it will be risky for the foal to allow it to suck the milk from the inflamed udder. If there is any reason to suspect that inflammation has begun, a portion of the milk should be drawn away by hand and the udder bathed with cold water before the foal is admitted. It is believed by some farmers that when a nursing mare gets overheated at work and returns to her foal with a full udder, the milk, because of the overheating of the mare, is liable to injure the foal. They therefore draw away a little of the milk and bathe the udder with cold water. This idea, however, is not well founded. The mere heating of the mare will not spoil her milk so as to endanger the foal, and unless there is reason to fear that inflammation has begun in the udder the foal may be admitted at once without any previous stripping or bathing. But the overheating of nursing mares at work is very reprehensible, and should never on any account take place. Fleet, the filly by the California stallion stallion Sidney, that last season as a yearling trotted a mile in 2.35, was recently given four easy heats, the last mile being trotted in 2.32 and the last quarter in 34 seconds, which shows that Fleet is liable to trot close to 2.20 before the season is over, and almost certain to beat 2.25. Another California trotter that is doing well is the stallion Bonanza, a son of Arthurton that entered in the 2.30 list last year. He has been showing miles in 2.30, and his owner offers to match him against any horse on the Pacific Slope, barring Stanboul and Favonia. Jimmy Dustin, who still lingers in California, has a good one in Maggie E., a daughter of Nutwood that he recently drove a mile in 2.19. The pacer Almont Patchen is also doing well in Dustin's hands, having recently shown a mile in 2.18.

A despatch from Racine, (Wis.) states that Jay-Eye-See, "King of the Turf," the phenomenal little black gelding who electrified the country several years ago with his remarkable speed, has again gone lame and will not be trotted in any races this season. Indeed it is doubtful if he will ever again appear upon a track as a participant in a race. Last November, while the little gelding was in the pasture at Hickory Grove farm near this city, he accidentally severed an artery of one of his legs and came nearly bleeding to death before he was discovered. His present lameness is said to be the result of an accident he sustained about five years ago at Lexington, Ky. While being driven he accidentally ruptured the left sheathing of the tendon of the left forward leg. The injury has made the animal lame several times before and is the cause of his present disabled condition. The prospect that Jay-Eye-See will ever lower his present record is very small, as it is not believed that he can hold out for more than a mile without going lame. He was being trained to contest some great races this season, and with a view to breaking his record, and has been brought down pretty fine. The fact has been kept quiet in the hope that the lameness would pass away, but it was found that it was more serious than at first considered. He is at present at J. I. Case's stables at Hickory Grove farm, one-half mile south of this city, where Ed. Blithe, his driver, is tenderly caring for him. The history of Jay-Eye-See is an interesting one. He was bred by Col. Richard Weir, of Lexington, Ky., and attained a record of 2.19 as a 4-year-old. At 5 years he lowered this to 2.10, and at 6 years 2.10, and two consecutive heats 2.11 and 2.10.

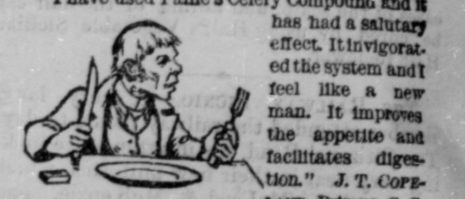
