



RUINS OF STATION AT VERNON BRIDGE

Only charred ruins indicate where the CNR station at Vernon stood for almost 60 years. Destroyed in a blaze that broke out sometime before 8:00 a.m. Monday, the village depot was a total loss, but equipment rushed from the CNR's City headquarters managed to save the nearby freight-shed. Rolling stock on the adjoining switch was moved out of harm's way. A railway spokesman said yesterday that plans for reconstructing the station would be started right way, and that the agent's office in the meantime would be located temporarily in the freight-shed. Cause of the blaze was not determined.

Adult Polio Clinics To Start Again In Ch'town Next Week

With the arrival of spring the adult polio immunization clinics are again getting under way. A large percentage of the Island citizens have already availed themselves of the opportunity to benefit from the Salk vaccine. However, the local chapter of the Polio Foundation which administers these clinics, hope that those who have not already been vaccinated will take advantage of the clinics to be held at various centers throughout this province during 1959. The first clinic will be held at Charlottetown next week. The Summerside clinics will take place April 23rd and 24th. If a sufficient number of people request first inoculations, a return clinic will be held approximately one month later. The Summerside clinics will be followed by clinics to be held in a number of rural areas dates and locations to be published later.

Life Underwriters Pay Tribute To Late J.O. Hyndman

"With the passing of John O. Hyndman, the Life Underwriters' Association of Canada has lost its last surviving charter member," W. Blair MacDonald, president of the local association, stated in a tribute released yesterday. "To advance the best interests of true life insurance" was the motto adopted by the late Mr. Hyndman when in 1905, he was elected first president of the Island group. Mr. MacDonald noted, adding that this motto is still in use by the organization today. "In the year 1906," Mr. MacDonald continued, "Mr. Hyndman was invited to Toronto where he met with a group of 2 other Canadian life insurance men and helped organize the large organization known today as the Life Underwriters Association of Canada. "Since those early days the Association has done much to raise the standards of the life insurance business which today covers such a wide field and plays such an important part in our economic life. "With branches in 75 major centres across the nation, the national association has a present day membership of more than 9,500. "At a golden jubilee annual dinner held in Toronto on January 26, 1956, and during the Association's two-day annual meeting that followed, the late Mr. Hyndman was publicly honored by his Canadian associates for his many contributions in the field of insurance."

Souris Council To Purchase Hose

A special meeting of the Souris Town Council last night decided to immediately purchase 3,000 feet of fire hose and accept the offer from Charlottetown of the pumper engine, formerly used in Spring Park and the ARP engine from the city. Both are now on loan to the Souris Fire Department.
The council also decided to accept the loan of a modern fire pumper from the Nova Scotia Civil Defence Department. The truck was picked up by Major Orin Simons, P.E.I. CD co-ordinator, and is now in Charlottetown. Several members of the Souris department will spend a few days in Charlottetown taking instructions from city engineers in the operation of the vehicle and then it will be taken to Souris.
Tenders were opened regarding the construction of two water reservoirs, one at each end of the town. However, no definite action was taken on the tenders as the specifications have to be revised. The question of what to do about the block-sized area of the town that was razed by the late March fire came up for much discussion and it was decided that a delegation of councillors would meet with members of the Town Planning Board in Charlottetown today to discuss the matter.
The meeting was adjourned until 8 p.m. Monday night.
Mayor Wendall Birt presided at the meeting which was attended by a full slate of councillors. Fire Chief Edward Lavie was also in attendance.

LONDON (Reuters) — The Queen Mother and Princess Margaret will fly to Paris for a private weekend visit April 25, it was learned Tuesday.



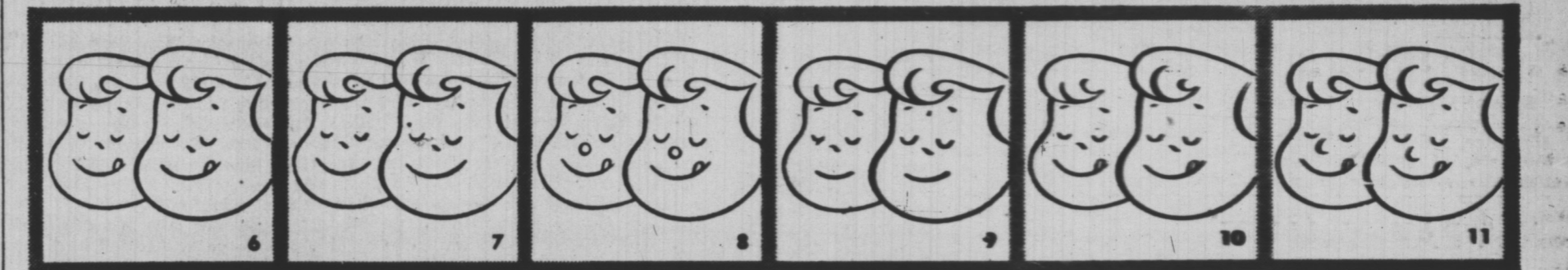
