K. Of C. Juniors Retain City League Baseball Ch'ship

Charley Ryan's Knights of Columbus Juniors retained their City Baseball League title Sunday afternoon at the Memorial Field stadium when they defeated the H.M. MacKenzie coached Vics 5-3 in an exciting baseball game played before a large crowd of fans.

Merlin "Red" MacKenzie and Alan "Junior" MacLeod hooked up in a pitcher's battle with a total of only nine hits being allowed during the game. MacKenzie was the victor as he fashioned a neat four-hitter against the Vics while walking one and whiffing nine batters. MacLeod allowed five hits in a losing cause while hitting two, walking one and striking out five.

The Vics opened the scoring in their half of the first inning when they tallied a run when Willis Hennessey was safe on an error. Glen Matheson, with two out, doubled him home when he blasted a MacKenzie pitch into the left centre. The Knights tied matters up in the top half of the second inning on a hit batter, and a pair of singles.

The winners went to the front in the fifth inning when they tallied two runners on two errors, and a double and a fielder's choice. In the top half of the sixth they made the scoreboard read 5-1 when they added a brace of runs, which proved to be the winning tallies, on an error, a hit, a hit batter and a fielder's choice.

The Vics retaliated in their half of the same inning when they scored a brace of runs on two singles, a pair of fielder's choices, a walk and an error. That ended the scoring of the game. MacKenzie pitched masterful ball in the last three and two-thirds innings when he set down the Vics in order.

New York Yankees grabbed a commanding lead in the American League pennant race Sunday and barring a total collapse are virtually assured of their second straight championship.

The Bombers moved 2-1 games ahead of runner-up Detroit by downing Boston Red Sox 9-5 while the Tigers bowed 2-1 to the Indians in Cleveland.

New York has eight games left to play. If the Yanks win only four of their seven to beat the Yanks if the Yanks win six they're in no matter what the Tigers do. The Red Sox are virtually out.

Meanwhile, Philadelphia Phillies led in the National League with a 11-0 decision to the second-place Brooklyn Dodgers. The magic number for the Phil's still is "8". Any combination of six Philadelphia victories or Brooklyn defeats will give the Phils the flag.

Bob Lemon was the whole show today as Cleveland nipped Detroit in a 10-inning thriller. The American League's top pitcher not only baffled the Bengals with five hits for his 22nd victory but also scored both his team's runs. He homered in the fourth for the first tally, then crossed the plate with the winning run after opening the last half of the 10th with a triple.

Meanwhile, the confident Yankees again staggered the demoralized Boston Red Sox 9-5 while the second-place Detroit Tigers dropped their third straight to Cleveland.

New Deal In Hockey Is Approved By M. A. H. A.

HALIFAX, Sept. 4 — (CP) — The Maritime Amateur Hockey Association will this season control two of the five "major" leagues in Canada eligible for the new Dominion championship trophy which will be put up for competition by the Governor-General, Viscount Alexander.

At the annual meeting held over the weekend in Halifax, delegates representing the three Maritime Provinces, approved the new deal in Canadian amateur hockey which makes the famed Allan Cup a secondary trophy. For the new trophy, the Maritimes have two challengers — the Cape Breton League and the Maritime Senior Hockey League.

Only other circuits considered strong enough to play off for a trophy which will be next in hockey importance to the Stanley Cup are the Quebec League, O. H. A. and Western League.

Circuits which are now operating in intermediate ranks are strong enough under the new set-up to compete for the Allan Cup. If they do not upgrade themselves voluntarily, the M.A.H.A. will do it for them.

Intermediate clubs will get special consideration this season. Greater interest is being taken in intermediate hockey than ever before and the clubs will compete for a new trophy.

The contract system for "major" players will not be used this season. Next year, however, all players in the five major circuits will sign a contract almost identical with that used in professional hockey.

Henceforth, all major, senior and junior clubs will be required to produce playing cards before they go on the ice. This action is being taken at the pointed request of the C. A. H. A. which says that in the past the Maritimes have been too lax in this matter.

It was proposed that referees school be conducted through out the Maritimes this season, particular attention being paid to the smaller towns. Mentioned as possible instructors were Dick Davis, Winnipeg; Casey Bradshaw, Toronto; and Dinty Moore, Port Colborne.

Officers Re-elected

With one exception, the officers who handled the affairs of the Association last season were returned to office. Only newcomer is Art Yerxa, Sussex, N.B., who replaces Burnie Lalson, Saint John, N.B., as fourth vice-president.

Dudley Hanover Is Winner Of Little Brown Jug

DELAWARE, O., Sept. 24 — (AP) — Hayes Fair Acres stable of Duquoin, Ill., left little of the harness racing world to be conquered Saturday as Dudley Hanover won a split-heat victory in the \$56,525 Little Brown Jug, three-year-old pacing classic, in world's record time.

First moneys of \$28,525 will be added to the huge earnings of Hayes Fair Acres stable this year. Other triumphs of the Illinois stable include the \$75,000 Hambletonian with Lusty Song and the \$50,000 two-mile trot with Pronto Don.

About all that's left in the way of glory for Hayes Fair Acres is the \$60,000 Kentucky futurity to be decided the week after next at Lexington, Ky.

The three heats set a world's record for a three-heat race divided. The opener was in 2:03 3-5 followed by 2:02 3-5 and 2:03 2-5. The middle stanza surpassed the stake record of 2:02 3-4 that was set in 1946, the first Jug, by Royal Chief.
