SAYS the Sydney, C.B., "Advocate": Charles Houlman, a fireman of steamer Bonavista, committed suicide at sea by jumping overboard while the vessel was coming to this port from Newfoundland. An attempt was made to rescue him, but he sank before assistance could be reached. THE City Surveyor has about fifteen men hard at work. New plank sidewalks are being laid on Grafton, Pownall, Hillsborough, and other streets, and while Empton Street is being built up and otherwise improved. Kent Street, between Hillsborough and Weymouth, should also be attended to. WE must enter our solemn protest against a desecration of the Sabbath by the crew of the brig Tasma, of P. E. Island, on Sabbath last, the vessel being on the Marine Railway, and the crew were busily engaged painting a good part of the day. We do not know who are responsible, but they can rest assured it will not be tolerated in this port.—Picton "News." At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon a woman for violating the Scott Act was fined \$100 and costs; a woman for being an inmate of a house of ill-fame was sentenced to six months imprisonment, and another woman charged with keeping a brothel, was, at the request of her husband, discharged on condition that she sign the pledge and lead a better life in the future. CAPT. JOHN MCKAY, of Stanley Bridge, received a telegram on last Tuesday from the Department of Marine, asking him to accept a position as master in the fisheries protection service of the Dominion. We are sorry to learn that Capt. McKay is confined to his horse and consequently is unable to accept the offer. We feel that no man is better able to perform the duties of such a position than Capt. McKay—his long experience in the coasting trade of these provinces, and his general ability as pilot entitle his judgement to great respect in this business. We are sure his friends generally will be sorry to learn of his present illness and should he recover, we trust the Department of Marine will, on the first opportunity award him the position which he so justly merits.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The Inch-Arran Affair.

SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES

OTTAWA, May 26. The House met at 3 o'clock. After routine the House received the report of the committee on the Cape Breton railway resolutions. Sir Hector introduced a bill thereon which was read a first time. In the motion to go into supply Mr. Davies spoke of the Inch Arran matter, detailing the investigation before the committee and declaring that the railway officials were using their official positions to further their own ends. Hon. Mr. McLellan said the evidence would be printed in full and it would show that the officials had done their duty by the road. Mr. McLellan to-day laid on the table the supplementary estimates for the present fiscal year. The total amount of the estimates is \$4,501,921 of which sum \$418,256 is chargeable to capital, \$1,836,114 to income, \$1,014,310 is the amount required for expenses in connection with the troubles in the Northwest Territory, and \$233,242 is unprovided items. Some items of local interest to the Maritime Provinces are estimated expenses connected with the Franco-Act, \$200,000; further amount required for Colonial and Indian Exhibition, \$50,000; Public Works and buildings Charlotte-town, \$13,000.

Washed Overboard and Drowned.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 26. A cable from Havre announces that Hon. Wm. McDougall, ex-M. P. for Hanu, was washed overboard from his barque Salmon in mid-ocean and drowned. The deceased was going over to Europe in the splendid new ship he had recently built.

A Yacht and Crew Missing.

CAMDEN, N. Y., May 26. Three brothers named Wright and James Harris started out in their yacht Saturday for a sail and have not since been heard from. It is supposed all were lost.

A Royal Betrothal.

LONDON, May 26. It is reported that the betrothal of Princess Louise of Wales to Prince Oscar, son of the King of Sweden, will soon be officially declared.

Suicide.

HALIFAX, May 26. Joseph Aust, of the schooner Etie, jumped overboard while the vessel was going out this morning, and was drowned.

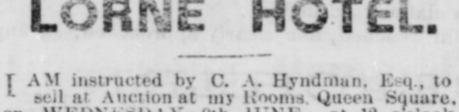
