life."

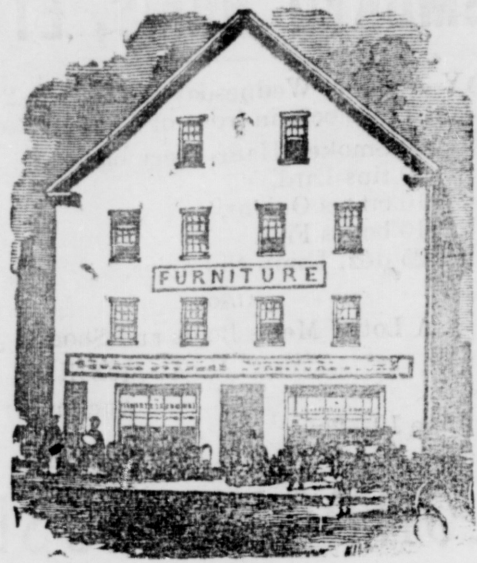
A Rebuff.—Mlle. —, of the Palais Royal
