THE LEGISLATURE. LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL DEBATES

Hon. Mr. ROGERS.—In the old law there was a provision that the husband of a woman owing property should have a vote, but that has been overlooked in the present Bill.

Mr. CAMPBELL.—I am sorry my hon. colleague did not move this amendment. We know that women make money at farming and other kinds of business when they undertake it, and why should they not have a right to vote? I hope being a supporter of the Government has not cooled the hon. member's courage towards the ladies.

"Each of the above mentioned fifteen electoral districts shall be represented in the Legislature by two members, who shall be known as Legislative Assemblymen."

QUALIFICATION OF ELECTORS.

"Every male person being a British Subject of the full age of twenty-one years and upwards who owns real estate of a freehold or leasehold nature to the yearly value of three hundred dollars, and who has owned and been in possession of the same for a period of at least six months previous to the date of the writ of election."

"Every son of such owner of the full age of twenty-one years and who shall have resided continuously on such property shall have the privilege of voting at any election held under the Act as long as such property shall represent the value of three hundred dollars for each such son claiming to vote thereon."

"Every male person being a British subject and of the full age of twenty-one years, who shall have resided for a period of three years in any electoral district on this Island and a period of at least one year in the polling division in which he claims a right to vote and shall be in the receipt of a yearly income of at least one hundred and fifty dollars per annum."

That would allow all the intelligent young men of the country to vote for representatives. The effects of the Bill before the House will be very far reaching, under it the intelligent young men from the Chief Superintendent of Education down will be disfranchised.

Hon. Mr. ROGERS.—They will have a vote.

Mr. CAMPBELL.—The Chief Superintendent of Education will have one vote, but is he not as intelligent and capable of exercising the franchise as the wealthiest man in the community. A man owning property worth \$324 is not intelligent enough to vote for a Councillor, he must have \$325 worth. If property of the value of \$325 has a right to vote, you should give a man with a large amount of property a multiplicity of votes. A man with \$1000 worth of property should have three votes. Many men in the City and mechanics through the country have a house which is probably not valued at \$325 and they will be disfranchised. Every school teacher will be disfranchised of one vote which he had before. I believe the majority of the supporters of the Government have the same ideas I have on this question, but they have to bury their convictions, this Bill is a matter of compromise and perhaps the Government have gone as far as they can go. I regret very much that this Legislative Council, which is supposed to represent the intelligence of the country, should so far forget themselves as to disfranchise of one vote the most intelligent portion of the community, the clerks, mechanics, and school teachers.

Mr. DODD.—The hon. member from New London talks loudly about what the late government did in order to get this Council abolished, but he knows very well that this Council did all and more than could be expected of them to bring about this change. This Council offered to reduce their number to seven and sit with fifteen in the House of Assembly, and another session they offered to sit thirteen with fifteen, but nothing would please the late government except the total abolition of this House, so that they could pass bills to sink the country in debt. They passed a bill in the House of Assembly to put a subway under the Hillsborough, which, had it become law, would have sunk the country in debt and it would have been no good when it was finished. That was one of their wild-cat schemes which this House buried, and because we would

not annihilate ourselves and allow them to pass what acts they thought proper they are forever talking about it. The hon. member is never done boasting about all he did, but if he was such an immaculate character when he was in office it is very strange that the people should have rejected him when he went back for re-election.

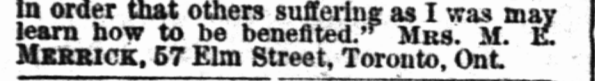

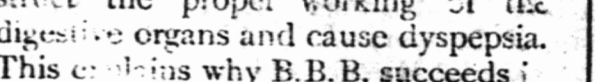

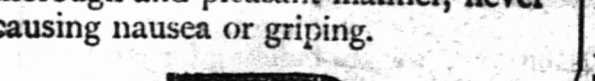

A BYE-LAW

For Levying and Specifying the Rate of Assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for General Civic Purposes, under Statute 5r Victoria, Chapter 12.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:

1st. The rate of assessment on real estate for general civic purposes, under said statute, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1892, and ending the 31st day of December, A. D. 1892, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one per cent. on every dollar of the value of real estate as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the general assessment book and valuation roll of all real estate and personal property liable to taxation in said City, and of all persons liable to pay poll tax therein, made and duly returned to them on the fourth day of May, A. D. 1892.

2nd. The rate of assessment on personal property for such general civic purposes, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1892, and ending the 31st day of December, A. D. 1892, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one per cent. on every dollar of the value of personal property as assessed by the assessors of the said City in the said general assessment book and valuation roll, made and duly returned by them as aforesaid.

A BYE-LAW

For Allowing a Rate of Discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for General Civic Purposes, for the Current Year ending the 31st day of December, A. D. 1892.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:

1st. A discount at the rate of two and one-half per cent. shall be allowed to all taxpayers who shall, on or before the fifteenth day of July next, A. D. 1892, pay to the City Clerk, at his office, the taxes severally due by them for the current year on real estate and personal property for civic purposes.
