### Strange But True

The age of a fish can be measured by its scales. The number of scales is fixed at an early age, and as the fish grows each scale increases in size so that the fish remains at all times fully covered. The growth of the fish, is not uniform, being more rapid in summer when temperatures are high and food is abundant than in winter when temperatures are low and food scarce. The scales grow by the disposition of material along its outer edges, in the form of concentric rings. The changing character of these rings, and the spacing between them, which varies from winter to summer, permits an exact determination of the age of the fish to be made from microscopic examination of the scales. Artificial spawning areas are now being created. This is done by dumping loads of gravel on the ice of a lake or pond during the winter.
