COURT PROCEDURE RULES - The rules procedure of most of the courts functioning in this Province have been published in one volume by the Provincial Government. Legislation, rules and forms applicable to the Court of Chancery, Supreme Court, Probate Court, County Courts, Divorce are included as the statutory provisions regarding divorce, costs, judgment and execution, trusts, evidence, criminal appeals and certiorari under the Criminal Code. Each Act and its rules are indexed at the back of the volume.

Mr. Wright attended Prince of Wales College, Dalhousie University, Pine Hill Divinity Hall and was ordained in 1928, after which he did most graduate work at Princeton Seminary. He reports that his congregation is in the process of completing the erection of a new church which will be dedicated in October. The former church was destroyed by fire last year. Mr. Wright is married to the former Elizabeth Clarke of Coppel, Ontario. They have three children, Robert, Catherine and Margaret.

MANY DELEGATES

This year Shur Gain Feed Service mill owners and operators from the Maritimes held their annual convention at Dalvay Hotel, P.E.I. Over 80 delegates from all points in the Maritimes attended and were welcomed by Mr. J. K. Leggett, Maritime manager of the Feed and Fertilizer Division of Canada Packers Ltd from Saint John, N. B. Many of the delegates were accompanied by their wives, who were guests of the wives of Island mill owners, they toured the Island, and on their itinerary was a visit to Green Gables along with lunch at Lakeview Lodge at Cavendish. The delegates thoroughly enjoyed an afternoon of mixed sports. All events were very capably run off by Major Andrew MacRae, Winsloe. The delegates enjoyed a clam bake at Stanhope beach on Thursday evening. A large number enjoyed a visit to the packing house plant of Canada Packers in Charlottetown on Thursday afternoon.

Among the many speakers who addressed the gathering were Mr. W. G. Cunningham, assistant sales manager Canada Packers, Toronto, who spoke on the progress of the Shur Gain experimental farm at Maple, Ontario. All Shur Gain feeds are tested under actual farm conditions, at the Shur Gain demonstration farm before being released to Island farmers.

Mr. W. K. Meyer, director general of nutrition for Canada, conveyed to the large gathering the latest scientific facts on feeding, and spoke of the feed manufacturers responsibility towards feeding programmes in today's feeds.

Mr. O. P. MacCollum spoke on grain supply, and markets for Island grain.

Larsen, Presque Isle, Me. The very largely attended convention concluded with a banquet and dance as guests of the feed division of Canada Packers.
