Placards have appeared in Paris urging the people to rally in support of a monarchy under Louis Philippe II.

A Catholic Church, seating 1,000 persons, and constructed entirely of papier mache, has recently been completed at Bavaria.

Bankers in Montreal express great satisfaction at the manner in which payments have been made during the past month.

The English fruit crop has been so prolific that stops are to be taken to hold a great fruit show at South Kensington, in October.

It is stated that startling disclosures may shortly be anticipated in regard to the dynamite conspiracy and McDermott's connection therewith.

Zorrilla, the reputed leader of the late rising in Spain, will not be expelled from France, there not being sufficient evidence to connect him with the outbreak.

His Excellency the Governor General and the Princess Louise are expected to arrive in Ottawa at noon on Friday, the 7th inst., leaving Quebec on Thursday night.

It is stated that an alliance between France and Japan against China was proposed to the Japanese envoy in Paris, and that the latter rejected the proposal.

A number of American capitalists, recently arrived in Moncton, were considering the propriety of erecting a hotel suitable to the wants of the town and the travelling public.

Rev. Canon Anson, of Woolwich, Eng., brother of the Earl of Lichfield, is on his way to the Northwest for the purpose of engaging in the work of the church of England in this country.

The False Prophet is making preparations for another struggle in the Soudan, and much uneasiness is felt in Alexandria for the safety of the troops recently sent into that district.

Hon. Mackenzie Bowell has left Ottawa for Winnipeg, to which place he was summoned by a telegram informing him that Mrs. Bowell, who has been visiting her son in that city, was seriously ill.

Arrangements have been made for a trip of the Manitoba Legislature to the end of the Pacific R. R. track. Although the exact date is not fixed, it will probably be on the 12th or 13th of September.

Great excitement prevails at Rat Portage, because of the Manitoba Magistrate Baretton sentencing McDonald and McLean, charged with obstructing Manitoba Constables to six weeks imprisonment in jail.

Ottawa meat dealers complain about the high prices of cattle. All the prime Western meat, they say, goes to Europe, and the beasts of this section command more in Montreal than the market there will afford.

The oyster suffers now. The prospect for a big crop is unusually favorable. It is said that the ravages usually committed upon the bivalve in its native haunts by its creature enemies have been insignificant.

Emperor William reviewed the Guards at Berlin on Wednesday last. The review was a great success. The aged monarch was three hours in the saddle, and it is asserted that he never appeared in better health.

In the Canada Gazette of this week notice is given of a meeting of the shareholders of the Bank of Nova Scotia on the 11th of September, to further consider the terms of amalgamation with the Union Bank of Prince Edward Island.

There is considerable excitement at Calgary over the recent silver quartz discoveries at the summit of the Kicking Horse Pass. Specimens have been brought into Calgary in which native silver can be plainly seen and which will assay at the rate of 1,500 to the ton.

John Bright has been speaking on temperance at Birmingham. His defence of the vested interests of publicans has greatly annoyed the temperance agitators, and his proposal to increase license duties, in order to buy up and suppress some existing houses and to limit public houses in proportion to population has greatly allayed the alarm of the liquor trade. Temperance legislation is coming to the fore front of home policy.

The Petersburg Zeitung reports the destructive action of a flash of lightning, which struck the stable attached to the cavalry officers' school at Krasnoje-Selo, killing sixteen horses on the spot. The electric fluid, on striking the corner of the building, seems to have travelled along the iron with which the racks were covered, and set all the hay on fire at once. The horses all fell to the ground. Most of them were again quickly killed; but sixteen were found to be dead, and two were quite deaf. In all the horses that were killed the electric fluid seems to have entered at the head or neck, passing down through the fore feet.

The Javanese, according to Baibi, the geographer, may be regarded as the most polished people in Oceania, while their literature is the richest and most important. They have at three different epochs been the preponderating nation of Malaysia. The first of these was towards the second half of the 14th century, when the Empire of Majapahit embraced the whole of Java, the Kingdom of Palembang, in Sumatra, the Island of Bali, and the petty states in the southern part of Borneo. The second was in the first half of the 15th century when their dominion extended not only over all Java, but also over Sabrang, Goal Macassar, Celebes, Bonda, Sumbawa, Ende, Timor, Sooloo, Ceram, part of Borneo and Palembang, in Sumatra; and the third, in the early part of the 17th century, when the Empire of Mataram nearly equalled that of Majapahit. Few people of the same intellectual rank (though compared with that of the surrounding communities, it is a high one) have risen to such a position of power as they have done at certain periods in their annals. The Javanese are said to form about two-thirds of the population of the island from which they take their name.
