UN Delegate Says Woman Who Raised A Family Can Cope With Any Problem

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., (CP)—Mrs. Kenneth G. Montgomery of Edmonton, the only woman on Canada's delegation to the current sessions of the United Nations General Assembly, says:

"I think that if a woman has raised a family there is nothing she can't cope with. They have more experience than anyone in smoothing troubled waters."

That's Mrs. Montgomery's approach to UN problems. Besides being a member of the delegation in the General Assembly, Mrs. Montgomery represents Canada on one of the assembly's seven main executive committees.

STUDY WOMEN'S TREATMENT

Her committee this current session has to deal with such varied topics as forced labor, freedom of information, and the "customs, ancient laws and practices affecting the human dignity of women."

"My job certainly is strenuous but I think I can cope with it," says the Ottawa-born mother of two grown sons whose experience in community and public affairs earned her the appointment she calls "the most interesting I've ever had."

To prepare herself for her role, Mrs. Montgomery read "every available book on the UN before she came to New York."

Her day begins at 9:30 with a conference in delegation headquarters on matters of particular interest to Canada to be dealt with at the UN that day.

At 10:30 she takes her place in the General Assembly, or at a

meeting of her committee if one is scheduled. Then comes lunch, and an afternoon of more assembly debate or committee work.

WORKS INTO NIGHT

After dinner, she types up her notes and observations on the day's activities and studies on into the night in preparation for tomorrow.

"Women right across Canada are interested in the UN," she said. Mrs. Montgomery said that women's organizations in Canada almost invariably appoint one woman whose job it is to acquaint herself and keep up with the business of the UN and its various functions.

No stranger to activities of women in public affairs, she has been active in community welfare work in Edmonton and has served on the social services agency board and assisted in fund-raising campaigns for Community Chest, the Red Cross, the Salvation Army and other welfare projects.

Active in public affairs, she has also served on the national executive of the National Twentieth Century Organization and at present is the western representative (woman) of the National Liberal Federation, and vice-president for Alberta of the National Federation of Liberal Women of Canada.

Will Probe Blood Components

TORONTO, (CP)—A blood fractionation plant, where scientists will probe the unknown in blood components, will open here Saturday.

The plant will provide Canada with a source of blood extractions for treatment purposes and make possible research not previously possible in this country.

Separation of blood into strategic components is one of the newest fields of medical research. The plant, part of Connaught medical research laboratories of the University of Toronto, is regarded by medical men as one of the foremost projects of its kind in the world.

It will be opened formally Saturday by Health Minister Martin.

Dam Irrigates 510,000 Acres Alta. Land



This massive barrier, holding back waters of the St. Mary river in southwestern Alberta, is Canada's largest earth-fill dam. The dam, 200 feet above the normal level of the glacier-fed river, holds water for irrigating 510,000 acres of once-arid land. Just below the giant spillway at left can be seen the outlet from which water flows before entering the main irrigation canal. The St. Mary Milk Rivers Development, of which the dam is part, will cost \$60,000,000 before it is completed in 1960.
