SHIP NEWS.

The Antelope, Griffiths, 44 days from Liverpool, arrived here on the 22d inst., with loss of mainmast, and mainmast injured. Same day, arrived the Sir James Macdonell, Kelly, from Youghall, with 130 passengers.—On Tuesday, the Henrietta, Kelly, from Bideford, with the loss of several of her spars, and with her mainmast injured. Brings 100 passengers. The British Lady, Yeo, 37 days from Bideford, arrived at Port Hill on the 10th inst. with Goods, and a number of passengers. A new Schooner from Bay Fortune, bound to Newfoundland, loaded with produce, was cast away some days since. Arrived on the 24th inst. the barque John Bromham, Barrett, 42 days from Plymouth, with main mast sprung and loss of fore yard. All the vessels which have arrived from Europe this spring have more or less sustained damage. The Morgiana, from Belfast, for Prince Edward Island, was spoken with in lat. 51. lon. 11, by the Sisters, arrived at Liverpool on the 22d April. HALIFAX, May 18th.—Arrived, sch. Waltron, Moore, P. E. Island; 20th schs. Morning Star, Packet, and Seafower, from do. 22d. sch. Jane, Macdonald, do. bound to Boston; 24th, schs. Catherine and Elizabeth, Bonnis, Uniacke, Landris, and Glory, Le Blanc, do. SHIPWRECK.—The Barque Isabella, Thoms, from Glasgow to Pictou, with goods and Passengers, was totally lost at Aspy Bay, Cape North, on the 11th instant. The Isabella had nearly completed her voyage, when she was surrounded with ice off the East Point of Prince Edward Island, and was swept away with the crew, until she was finally stranded, as above. The Passengers, seeing the fate of the ship inevitable, left her on the 10th in the boats, landing all safe. The vessel parted her cables next day and went ashore, but the weather being favorable a great part of the goods were safely landed. We learn, however, from the passengers, (most of whom arrived here on Sunday in the Schooner Henry), that the bales were ripped open by the inhabitants and pillaged of their contents before their eyes—a transaction so disgraceful that every effort should be made by the proper authorities to bring the parties to conviction and punishment.—Pictou Observer.
