# Maple Leafs Thump Habs; Hawks Defeat Red Wings

TORONTO (CP) — Ron Ellis scored two goals to lead Toronto Maple Leafs to a rugged 6-2 victory over Montreal Canadiens Wednesday night that boosted Leafs into a second-place tie with Canadiens.

The rough game was marked by a second period brawl that lasted about 10 minutes.

Canadiens and Leafs each have 51 points, four points behind Chicago, Canadiens have played two fewer games than Leafs.

Bob Pulford, Dave Keon, Red Kelly and Kent Douglas each scored a goal for Leafs. Ralph Backstrom and John Ferguson scored for Montreal in the third period.

The brawl erupted at 5:54 of the second when Leafs were storming around the Montreal zone. Referee Bill Friday signalled a delayed penalty to Ferguson for hooking Mahovich. Mahovich touched things off when he propped Canadiens defenceman Terry Harper against the boards behind the Montreal cage.

# 'Golden Hawk' Out Of Action

Bobby Hull the scoring sensation of the Windy City representative in the National Hockey League has been ruled out of action for at least a week as a result of a knee injury which is reported to have been inflicted jointly by Leaf's Bobby Bain and Tim Horton in the Chicago-Toronto battle, last Saturday night.

Hull whom has been making an assault on the all-time goal scoring record in the NHL, was hit by Bain when he tried to step around the Leaf rearguard in the third period and then later in the game the 'Golden Jet' attempted to shift Horton and was promptly dumped on the seat of his pants and with a bad knee.

The ace marksmen for the Billy Reay coached squad is running out of time to break the 50 goal mark shared by 'Rocket' Richard, Bernie Geoffrion and Hull, but we feel the general hockey minded population is rooting for Robert Hull to break the record in much the same way everybody seemed to be pulling for Roger Maris to break Babe Ruth's home-run record.

Anytime Hull steps on the ice he draws a crowd of enemy players intent on stopping the starchy Hawk, who is perhaps the finest performer in the National Hockey League today. After Saturday night's contest Bobby was quoted as saying "One time Horton reached down and pulled the feet from under me." When told that wasn't usually Horton's style of play Hull replied: "I know, but little accidents happen when a guy has a job to do."

The 5-foot 10 inch, 195 pound native of Point Anne, Ontario is not prone to injuries and has been one of the league's most durable players since his rookie season in 1957. Over that span he has only missed eight games of NHL play and at 25 years of age he has a career total of 263 goals and 271 assists in hockey's greatest league.

Hull is a popular figure with hockey fans all-over the NHL circuit as the blond hockey idol always finds time to sign autographs for worshipping youngsters and a large smile for his adult fans.

He is a great campaigner and we hope to see him back in action soon, although, the dream of breaking the 50 goal record looks somewhat dim the Hawks are on the move and Hull should be back in time to give them a shot in the arm in their efforts to capture their first National Hockey League championship in the history of the Hawks.
