To Hold Beef Show & Sale As Scheduled On March 20th

"The Show must go on", was the conclusion reached by 38 beef breeders at a meeting held yesterday afternoon in the Board Room of the Department of Agriculture. The resolute attitude of those in attendance was indicated by the immediate submission of 51 entries and a record taken of a dozen more.

A full and free discussion on various aspects of the show was followed by the passing of several important resolutions, put forward with a view to strengthening the position of show and sale in the economy of the country.

On motion of Mr. Houlton Mutch, seconded by Mr. George Hayden, it was agreed that the grading be done at the Fair grounds and that reasonably suitable cattle be accepted. Another resolution agreed to was that the weight range as between 650 and 1250 lbs. and that there be no grading except classification by weight.

Another resolution was passed permitting an entry of one heifer each exhibitor, who will be required, however, to guarantee that the entry is not in calf.

British and French statements, along with some Congress members, have recently expressed fear that Eisenhower's order to the 7th Fleet to cease patrolling the Formosa Strait might lead to spreading the Korean war.

Dulles requested secrecy on his testimony at Friday's close session of the Senate Far Eastern affairs sub-committee.

The Lake Centre member, one of Canada's all-party "parliamentary advisers" to the country's United Nations delegation, said he would not advocate the use of "provocative measures" but added that "in strength and in unity lies the only hope for mankind." There was a need to tread carefully and to be careful about criticism of the United States, which had borne much. But Canadians were entitled to more than the qualified statement on Formosa given by the external affairs minister.

Mr. Diefenbaker criticized the CCF party for its attitude on Formosa. Its spokesmen criticized the original U.S. action in neutralizing the Nationalists on the island with the seventh fleet and now were criticizing the fact the fleet was withdrawn.

Should Aim To End War Stanley Knowles (CCF-Winnipeg-North Centre) said Canada's fundamental aim in Korea should be to "end, not to extend, that war."

"Let's not go along with the kind of mistakes that could lead to a third world war," Mr. Knowles said Canada should be "deeply concerned" that the new U.S. policy on Formosa might be the first step towards that war. Canada also should raise her voice to help the U.S. "get on a more hopeful pathway to Europe."

Lack Of Understanding It seemed that U.S. State Secretary Dulles showed a lack of understanding of the situation in Europe.

Mr. Dulles had given the European nations 75 days to achieve unity "or else". It seemed Mr. Dulles was making an attempt to "condition the American people to the idea of lessening U.S. support for Western Europe."

It would be ideal if Europe could federate. But for the U.S. to say it must be achieved on terms dictated by the U.S. was "the wrong way to go about it."

Other Speakers George Murray (L-Cariboo) said a blockade of China could only result in an all-out war on the Asian continent. Somehow, there must be a way of "appealing to the heart of the Chinese people and winning them to the ways of peace."

Philippe Picard (L-Bellechasse), who recently visited the Middle East, said he had met many national leaders there and had concluded none of them favor the advent of Communism in their part of the world.

"None of them thought that the U.S.S.R. would attempt any violation of any territory in the Middle East unless a general war developed in the world," he said. "Some of them recognize the danger of Communist uprisings or Communist-inspired parties gaining power, but, significantly enough, none admitted this danger to exist in his own country."

Mr. Picard joined with some previous Opposition speakers in stressing that Canada should speak firmly and independently in foreign affairs and should avoid anything approaching the role of a

Strangest Debate In B. C. History Continues

VICTORIA, (CP) - The strangest debate in the history of the British Columbia legislature raged through its ninth day Friday.

The Opposition did all the ragging, Jibes continued to rain down on Social Credit heads but the government benches refused to counter-attack.

The oddity of the throne speech debate, in which members defend, attack and discuss government policy, stems from the fact that no Social Credit private members and only three cabinet ministers are taking part in it.

Premier W. A. C. Bennett said his freshman cohorts chose to skip the throne speech debate and wait for the budget debate, when they should have a complete outline of government policy and thus be better equipped to discuss it.

Tornado of Scorn

This brought a tornado of scorn from the CCF, Liberal and Progressive Conservative benches.

Education Minister Tilly Rolston moved the address in reply to the throne speech and Agriculture Minister Kenneth Egan, seconded. There will not be another Social Credit speaker in the debate until Attorney-General Robert Bonner winds it up for the government next week. Only two Social Credit members have had previous legislative experience - Mr. Bennett and Mrs. Rolston.

Social Credit Silent

Except for a steady volley of taunts and interruptions by the Premier, and loud laughter at some Opposition charges, the Social Crediters have remained silent.

CCF Opposition leader Harold Winch said the premier is dictating to his followers and that he is trying to grasp absolute control over the cabinet and government side.

Robert Strachan (CCF-Cowichan-Newcastle) said Social Credit members can't justify their exist-
