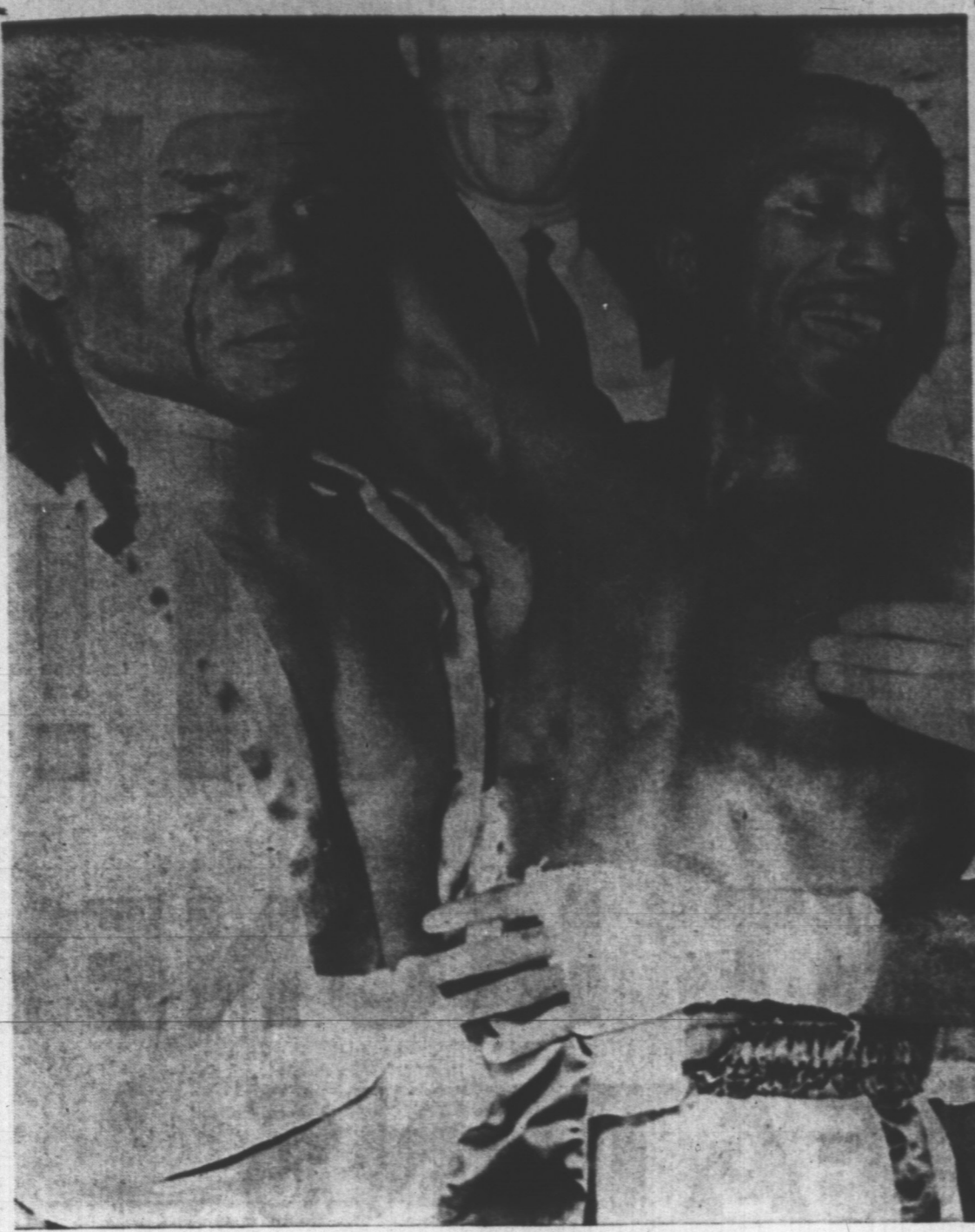

**Willie McCovey Is Leading In Loop Rookie Competition**

NEW YORK (AP) — Wallpola Willie McCovey of San Francisco, although a big leaguer less than a month, has thrust himself in front in the National League rookie - of - the - year competition in a season relatively bare of first year stars.

McCovey, in 22 games since joining the Giants on July 30, has batted .384. He has two doubles, three triples, seven homers and 22 runs batted in.

At Foxboro, Mass., last week, Alben Young of Nova Scotia, up behind Lee Sota, won the A Pace in 2:05. . . . . At Sydney Sports Center last Saturday night, the eight-year-old pacer, Acemor, from New Waterford, won the first dash of the free-for-all in 2:07 2-5, which is two seconds faster than his previous lifetime record. It was the fastest mile raced over that track in six years, and only a fifth of a second short of the track record of 2:07 1-5 set by Lucky Chief 2:02 1/4. Jackie Jackson, imported from Ontario several months ago, won the second dash in 2:13 . . . . . Sir Joseph, a starter in the above event, finished 4-3; he is owned and driven by Mike Jabalee. . . . . At Moncton Raceway last August 20, Mighty Arrow, driven by Harvey Cormier, won the third and seventh dashes in 2:09 2-5 and 2:10, and Jean Smart won the second dash, driven by Blair Bernard, in 2:13 3-5, which was two seconds faster than her previous record. The pre-season favorites, outfielder Ron Fairly of Los Angeles and second baseman George Anderson of Philadelphia, have not lived up to their training camp billing. Sherry, brought up from St. Paul of the American Association on July 2, has won four games, lost two and struck out 38 in 52 innings. Broglio's record is 6-11, but he has pitched three shutouts and fanned 104 in 150 2-3 innings.

Lee Maye has done well since Milwaukee recalled him from Louisville of the American Association in mid-July. He is batting .304 in 27 games.

**Rocky Nelson Finds A Home At Pittsburgh**

PITTSBURGH (AP) — First baseman Rocky Nelson of the Pittsburgh Pirates—a perennial batting champion in the minor leagues for the last 10 years or so—is fast slugging his way into the National League limelight.

The 34-year-old Nelson, who has failed in seven previous attempts to crack the major leagues, seems to have finally found a home at Pittsburgh. His performance of late was cited as one of the reasons why Pittsburgh Pirates traded Ted Kluszewski to Chicago White Sox Tuesday.

"Klu just didn't figure into our plans," said general manager Joe L. Brown. "Nelson's hitting and fielding and Dick Stuart's power are what we need now and in upcoming season. So, we traded Ted."

Until recently, Nelson, a big lefthanded swinger with an unorthodox stance at the plate, was used mostly as a pinchhitter, hitting a lousy .333 and stroking five home runs. However, his overall average was an anemic .224 because of his failure to hit the few times he played regularly.

"The Rock" was called on to bolster the Pirates' hitting attack on the club's recent disastrous Western trip. Since then, he has raised his season's average over the .280 mark and has doubled his runs batted in to 28.

The highlight of Nelson's surge was against the league-leading San Francisco Giants Monday night. He had three hits in four trips to the plate, including two home runs and three runs batted in. The Pirates won 6-0. Nelson played for Toronto Maple Leafs and Montreal Royals during his stint in the International League.

**Ingo Inks Rematch Pact; Site To Be Decided Later**

GOTEBORG, Sweden (AP)—A return bout contract estimated to be worth \$1,000,000 apiece for heavyweight champion Ingemar Johansson and Floyd Patterson was signed Tuesday after three days of negotiations.

It called for the fight to be held "sometime between March 1 and June 15 next year" at a site to be determined later.

Jack Dempsey, the old Manassa Mauler and former world champion, was credited with breaking down the icy chill of Johansson and his Swedish advisers in the lengthy discussions that began Saturday.

Dempsey will promote the fight. The site and date were left up to him.

"All speculation concerning the date and site are meaningless," Dempsey said before Johansson affixed his signature to the dotted line.

TO LOS ANGELES? However, with New York apparently out of consideration because of the suspension of the license of Rosensohn Enterprises, Inc., it was believed that Los Angeles with its 105,000-seat coliseum.

"I have accomplished what I came for," said Dempsey who headed the six-man American delegation which flew here to confer with Johansson.

Johansson knocked out Patterson at New York's Yankee Stadium June 26 in the third round. A return bout within 90 days was called for, and was tentatively set for New York next month.

However, Johansson balked because he had not received a financial accounting for the June 26 bout. The Swedish champion returned about 5 a.m. from a business trip to Boras in West Sweden.

Johansson then left for the airport to catch a plane for London where he will observe the British Empire title bout tonight at Porthcawl, Wales, between

champion Henry Cooper of England and South Africa's Gavie de Klerk.

**SOME OF THE TEAMS**  
A member of the delegation gave the following account of the financial agreements included in the contract:

1. Twenty five per cent of the gate receipts will go to each fighter, with 50 per cent to Rosensohn Enterprises.

2. Kahn was guaranteed a minimum of \$500,000 apiece for each fighter from the television, radio and motion picture receipts. Each fighter is to receive 35 per cent of this revenue, with 30 per cent to TelePrompTer.

The final thawing out came after the New York State Athletic commission cabled Johansson that it was holding checks totaling \$122,766.17 as the Swede's share of the June 26 bout.

When the financial tangle developed after the fight, and promoter Bill Rosensohn was ousted as head of the promotional group, the organization's license was lifted. A New York grand jury is investigating the promotional background of the fight.
