The sale of Poppies to be worn in memory of fallen comrades, while very good was not so large as we believe it should be in a city and province of our population. Especially when one considers that during the war our listmen was the highest percentage of any province in the Dominion. We believe that it is perhaps not generally known that the money raised in the poppy campaign is spent locally for the relief of needy veterans here and not sent to Dominion Command to be doled out on a percentage basis.

Therefore the more we have in our Poppy Campaign the greater aid and comfort can be given to our needy and disabled veterans here in this province.

The Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion is always interested in and willing to back any worthwhile endeavour as long as they consider it to be beneficial to our citizens and the community at large. Such a project is the Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic which is coming soon. The Legion is sponsoring this clinic, and is giving the Legion facilities free to this very important work.

The Legion Auxiliary ladies will provide lunch for the donors and the Legion members will aid in the work of the clinic. Possibly no one knows better than the veteran the value of this work. Perhaps a pal, or maybe he, himself was saved during war because someone at home made possible the blood transfusion which averted off the grim reaper and brought life back into his broken and weary body. For this reason we hope that it is not necessary to urge veterans who are in good health to make it a point to be on hand this time to swell the ranks in the blood donor parade and make this clinic the biggest one yet.

If I would say a word to the general public in this regard it would be to congratulate those who have contributed before and to say: "Please come again. You probably know from your experience that it did not hurt you and you have derived great satisfaction in knowing that you did your part." To those who have never gone to a Blood Donor Clinic I would say: "Why not try it this time? If you are in good health, it can't hurt you. If you are not—if you are not up to test, they will send you away with thanks. As for physical pain suffered in making a blood donation, it is practically negligible. As one who has given nineteen times, I know."

And, so if we are in good health, let us be mindful of those who may be in great need of help in this way. Let us remember the slogan, "The life you save may be your own", and let us rally to the cause and put this campaign well over the top.

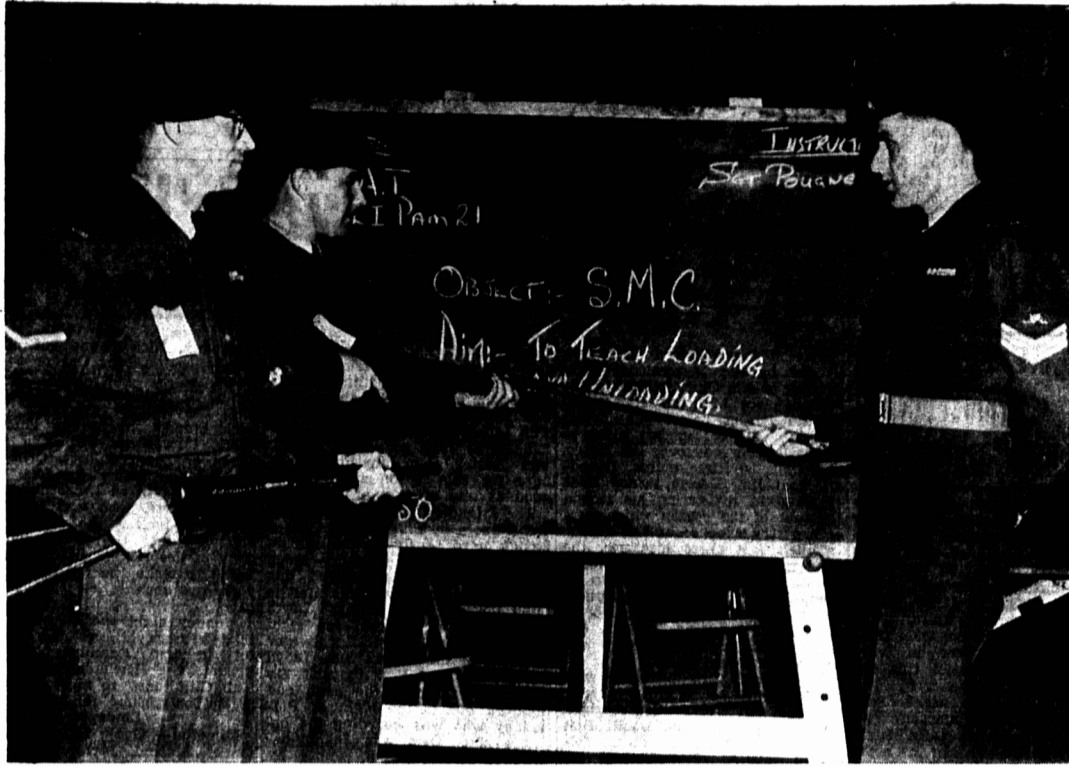
