

### Interior Of Alberton Hall Redecorated

The first project undertaken by Alberton Women's Institute following its organization twenty-seven years ago was to provide for the Town a community hall which would be attractive in appearance and safe for use. At that time the only hall in Alberton was in such disrepair that it was not only an eyesore but a fire-trap and unsafe for a large assembly to occupy.

The Institute purchased the hall out of part of the first storey which had been a warehouse, lowered the structure, put in a concrete basement with sufficient supports to carry any audience, built an addition to the south end to serve as a kitchen and a meeting place for the Institute, enlarged the stage, installed a furnace, refurnished the outside and put in new windows. Then the entire building was painted. It was an ambitious undertaking for a new organization but it reached a most successful conclusion at a cost of more than two thousand dollars. The work was supervised by Mr. John Owen Gordon.

To provide funds for the work the ladies resorted to a number of money raising expedients. It was necessary to have some money on hand before the work could be commenced and the hall was the only place where the ladies could show their talents in a variety of ways. The Burns concert, said a character member, "it would be almost as wet inside as out." Prior to the presentation of one entertainment the president, Mrs. H. J. Larkin, had her husband and two other men place props under the hall, lest the floor should give way under the audience. The ladies also served dinners, sponsored lectures, etc. These were busy days for this group of women whose purpose was to serve their community.

During intervening years Alberton W. I. Hall has been used for concerts, plays, dances, card parties, lectures, school closings, showing of films, dinners, and shows. The Red Cross Blood Donor Clinics, T. B. League, Mobile X-ray Unit, Boy Scout meetings, W. I. District Conventions, etc. It has been the scene of an untold number of happy and beneficial gatherings. Many people knew well the interior of this hall with its color scheme of gray and green.

Within the past few weeks the interior has been redecorated and those who now enter will be pleasantly surprised and impressed by its transformed appearance. The redo is done in a deep dusty rose, with walls of pale dusty rose, and ceiling of a still paler tone. This beautiful effect of blending tones has been achieved by the use of colorizer paints. The kitchen has also been made attractive with bright with cream colored walls and dark buff floor. The work was done by Mr. William Currie and Mr. Fred Hardy.
