Canada's Coal Situation Scheduled For Full Review

OTTAWA (CP)—A thorough evaluation of Canada's coal situation will be made before the expiry in 1969 of current federal subsidies on coal shipments. C. L. O'Brien, chairman of the Dominion Coal Board, said here today.

O'Brien was referring to an announcement in the Commons on Jan. 26 by Mines Minister Benidickson that the current subsidy payments—about \$18,000,000 in 1963—would be continued for five years.

Couple Take Up Life Again After Children Die In Fire

TORONTO (CP)—A year after their eight children were burned to death in a fire, Roy and Edith French have just about reached the stage where they want to live again. Several thousands of dollars raised to help the couple after the fire through their home Feb. 8, 1963, have enabled them to move into and furnish a modest five-room bungalow.

Mr. and Mrs. French came to Toronto from Newfoundland in 1945 and in 1945 and all their children were born here. After midnight on Feb. 8, Mr. French put a kettle on the stove next to a fryer full of fat. While he dozed in front of the television set, flames swept up the pressed cardboard walls and out through the roof of their old tenement-style home to nine other homes.

The bidding:

This deal was played in the match between Italy and the United States in 1977. It provided a dramatic contrast in bidding style, which the American North-South pair arrived at while the Italian North-South pair with the same cards, arrived at six clubs. At the bidding table, the American South bid two diamonds after North had responded to the spade bid with a notrump. He should clearly have jumped to three diamonds, which would have reached North had no idea of the bidding. The Italian South had such a huge hand, and quite properly passed three clubs.

Alberta sub-bituminous coal amounted to 1,377,000 tons, compared with 1,497,000 tons in 1962, while bituminous mines in Alberta and British Columbia reported a slight increase of 27,000 tons to a total of 1,537,000 tons.

Output last year in Nova Scotia amounted to an estimated 4,900,000 tons, an increase of 385,000 tons over 1962. In New Brunswick, production was 570,000 tons, up by 55,000 tons.

SASK. PRODUCTION DOWN

Saskatchewan, however, suffered a serious drop in production, falling by almost 500,000 tons to 1,753,000 the first time since 1950 that output has dropped below the 2,000,000-ton level, except for a temporary lapse in 1959.

Most of the increase in consumption was met by imports, which rose about 2,800,000 tons to 15,200,000. There was a small rise of about 30,000 in total Canadian output.
