CRICKET.

Saturday's cricket match between the "Get Theres" and "Absentees" of the Phoenix Club was as interesting and as exciting a game as has been played this season. If it did nothing else, it clearly demonstrated that Phoenix men are not dry weather players by any means and Jupiter Pluvius even cannot deter them from carrying an arranged match to its completion. Play was in progress but a short time when the drizzle began; but the boys held their ground until the drops became too large and too numerous to dodge, and a hasty retreat had to be made to the shelter of the club house. But with the advent of the sun once more they again went to the field and had it out within five minutes of the time agreed for the drawing of stumps.

The "Get Theres" would have got there by a margin of one run, with one wicket to fall, but for the fact that the innings of the "Absentees" had yet to be reckoned with. Their opponents were first to bat and piled 50 runs for eight wickets before being retired. Of this number 21 runs were contributed by Carvell. R. V. Longworth was in good trundling form, considering his little practice, and dropped "Get There" wickets with annoying frequency.

The "Get Theres" 51 runs came almost as a surprise to them, as after the fall of the seventh wicket they had but a total of 33 runs. They then looked upon the match as a goner, and upon their team name as a misnomer. But the unexpected happened thanks to Sullivan's partnership with A. McLeod and then with Meikle, when the former had been retired. The latter duet was adding the needful when the second shower came on and terminated further scoring. Hutcheson for the "Get Theres" played good cricket for his 20, as also did McLeod, though but few runs went to his credit. Though the score sheet shows 51 runs to 50, the match was virtually a draw, by reason of the time limit being reached with one wicket in each side yet to fall.
