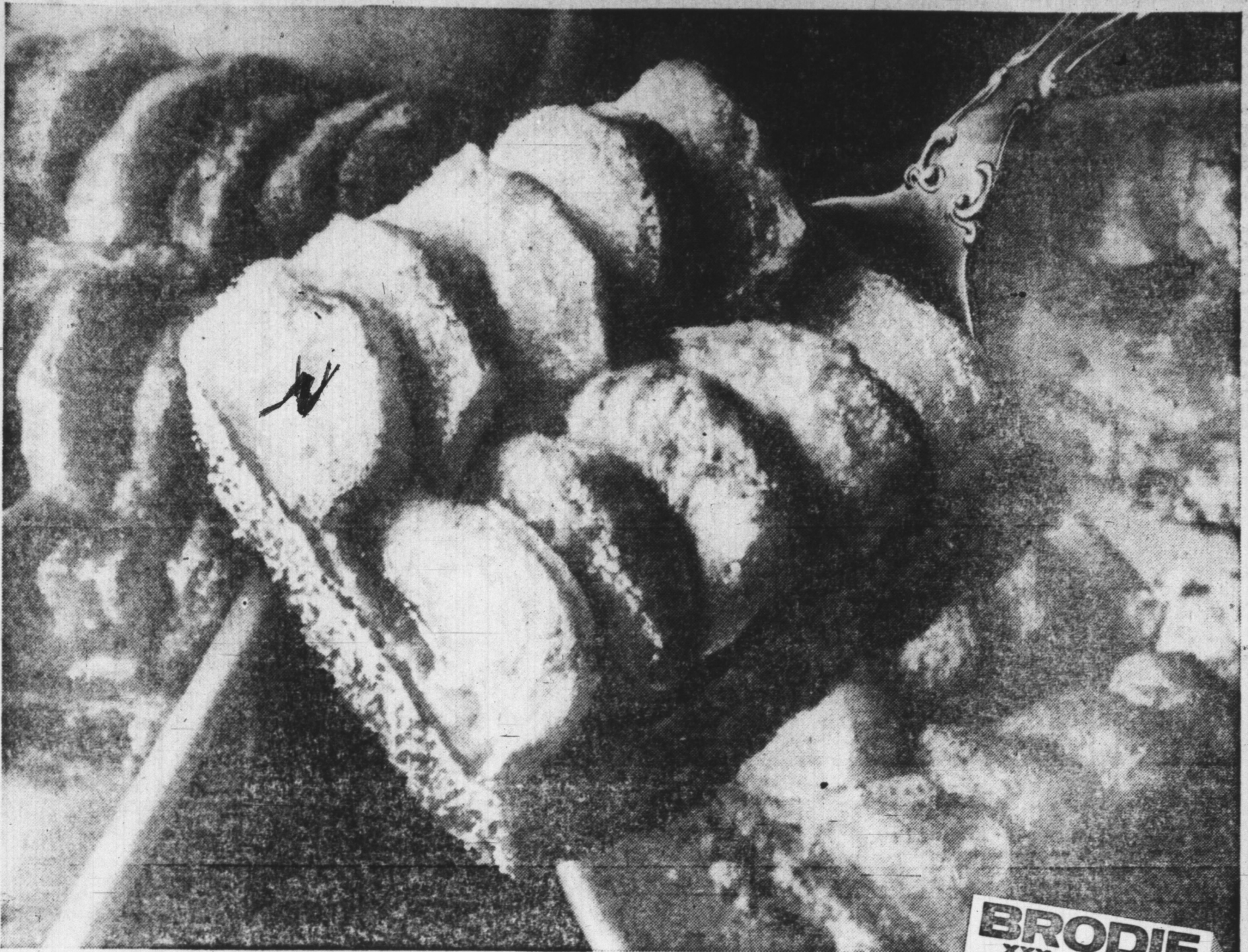

Dr. E. R. MacLean of Toronto, is the theme speaker at the 40th annual Maritime Sunday School Convention being held in the United Baptist Church and Trinity United Church, Summerside yesterday and today under the auspices of the Maritime Religious Education Council.
The theme of this year's convention is "Motives and methods in Christian education."
The convention opened yesterday afternoon in Trinity United Church with the president Rev. J. A. Jardine of St. Stephen, N. B., presiding, and leading in the period of worship.
Mr. Jardine introduced Mayor W. A. Currie who extended a welcome on behalf of the council and the people of Summerside. He told the delegates from the mainland he hoped they would be able to take time out from their deliberations to travel about and see some of the Island. He suggested they also go to the Island capital to view some of the historical sites.
The host ministers, Rev. Keith Hobson and Rev. C. R. Webber also extended warmest greetings.
Dr. MacLean was introduced by Rev. J. B. Wilson of Truro, N.S., field secretary of the Maritime Baptist Church.
During his remarks he pointed out the seven desirable characteristics in a Sunday School teacher.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says a weak disturbance over the southern New England states is moving east-northeast and is expected to move east of the Maritimes later today. In its wake, cooler air will spread southeast across the district.
Regional forecasts:
Prince Edward Island and eastern N.B. counties: Cloudy with widely scattered showers clearing by evening; cooler; light wind becoming northwest 15 in afternoon. Low-high at Charlottetown 45 and 55, Moncton 43 and 50.

Lower St. John River Valley: Cloudy with widely scattered showers; clearing in the afternoon; cooler; light winds becoming northwest 15 in afternoon. Low-high at Fredericton 43 and 50, Saint John 45 and 50.

ignating RCMP officers had not known the identity of the car or driver involved.
Reuben Enman, Springhill merchant, told of checking for pulse of the deceased. He said the waiting habits of Mr. Bell had been poor in regard to road safety, and that the deceased had been in the habit of walking on the pavement. He said it was unusual for Mr. Bell to be out at night, because he usually went to bed about 7 p.m.

The witness believed he had been enroute to a neighbour's home to seek transportation for his son from a nearby community for a visit.
Russell Calvin Williams, Springhill said that Vernon Grant had spoken with him after the accident and told him that he had been driving the car that struck Mr. Bell, but the witness had not bothered to tell the RCMP. He said Grant had been in a very nervous state at the time.

The coroner, Dr. L.E. Prowse, of Charlottetown, read the pathologist's report which showed that in addition to the severe head injuries, the elderly man received a broken nose, a broken rib, facial and body lacerations and bruises.
The post mortem examination also revealed a blood alcohol content sufficient to cause moderate intoxication.

FOUND BODY
Joseph Vernon Fraser of Summerside, the first of five witnesses had first sighted the body of the deceased lying on the side of the road while returning with his wife from Inverness. They had continued on to the store of Reuben Enman and taken Mr. Enman back to the scene, and arranged for Dr. Robinson to be called from Tyne Valley.
George Wotton, Guardian - Patriot news editor at Summerside, identified photos of the body of the deceased taken at the scene of the accident, and photos of the car that had been involved in the fatality.
Cnst. Ronald C. Pettit of Summerside detachment of the RCMP described police investigation of Mr. Bell's death.

He said the deceased had been dressed in dark clothing when found lying on the side of the road. Vernon Grant had phoned the Summerside detachment about 10 p.m. to report his connection with the accident, and previous to this time the investigation was being conducted by Mr. Gallant with a birthday cake complete with candles and a purse of money.
