The Cardinals recorded a 17 and 11, won-lost record this season and they will tangle with Summerside's number one team Monday morning for their first taste of competition in the Prince Edward Island Little League tournament in the western capital Monday.

Crothers Wins Metric Half-Mile

From AP-Reuters. RUDAPÉST (CP)—Bill Crothers, an 800-metre menace disguised as a friendly pharmacist, raised the Canadian victory standard for the first time Friday at the World Student Games.

Winding up with his spectacular finishing kick, Crothers, grabbed the gold medal in the metric half-mile with a time of 1:47.7 seconds. George Germann of the United States was second, Rudolf Klaban of Austria third.

The bespectacled, 24-year-old Markham, Ont., pharmacist, a quiet, unassuming man off the track, thus became the hero of the small Canadian contingent here and confirmed the expert status of those who call him the world's best over the 800-metre distance.

Other Canadians came through in fine style Friday, especially George Puce of Toronto. He took the bronze medal in the 400-metre race, won by Lars Hezlund of Sweden.

Jiri Zemba of Czechoslovakia edged out Puce by the slightest of margins for the silver. Hezlund had a best time of 1:44.5, Zemba of 1:44.5 and Puce of 1:44.4.

LEADS QUALIFIERS

Abigail Hoffman of Toronto, the only Canadian girl here, led the qualifiers for the women's 800 metres with a time of 2:09.1 in the heats.

Harry Jerome of Vancouver, bronze medalist in the 100 metres Thursday, got past the first round in the 200 metres but owed out of the semi-finals because of a pulled muscle in his left leg.

Bookies Like The Dodgers

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Los Angeles Dodgers remained pennant favorites Friday in the eyes of an important group of fans—Las Vegas bookies.

The Dodgers were posted at 9-10-5 to take the National League baseball crown, while Minnesota Twins were off the board—no bets to win in the American League.

Close behind the Dodgers were Cincinnati Reds and Milwaukee Braves at 2-1-1. San Francisco Giants at 5-2, Philadelphia Phillies and Pittsburgh Pirates at 6-1-1. Rounding out the National League are St. Louis Cardinals at 15-1-1, and Chicago Cubs and Houston Astros at 500-1-1.

In the American League, Chicago White Sox were the second at 5-1-1 followed by Baltimore Orioles at 8-1-1, Boston Red Sox, Washington Senators and Kansas City Athletics were rated at 500-1-1.

Like Minnesota, New York Mets were off the board—no bets. They already have been eliminated mathematically.

Are Trying For Solution

WASHINGTON (AP)—The top officials of the two big battling powers governing United States track and field affairs agreed Friday to meet and try to settle the row themselves.

They said they would announce later where and when the peace talks would be held, promising Senator Howard W. Cannon, who engineered the agreement that the talks would be held before Wednesday. It will be their first face-to-face effort to talk it out in more than two years.

The new peace move came as a surprise in the final minutes of a Senate commerce committee investigation in which senators sought ways to bring about a lasting peace between the Amateur Athletic Union and the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

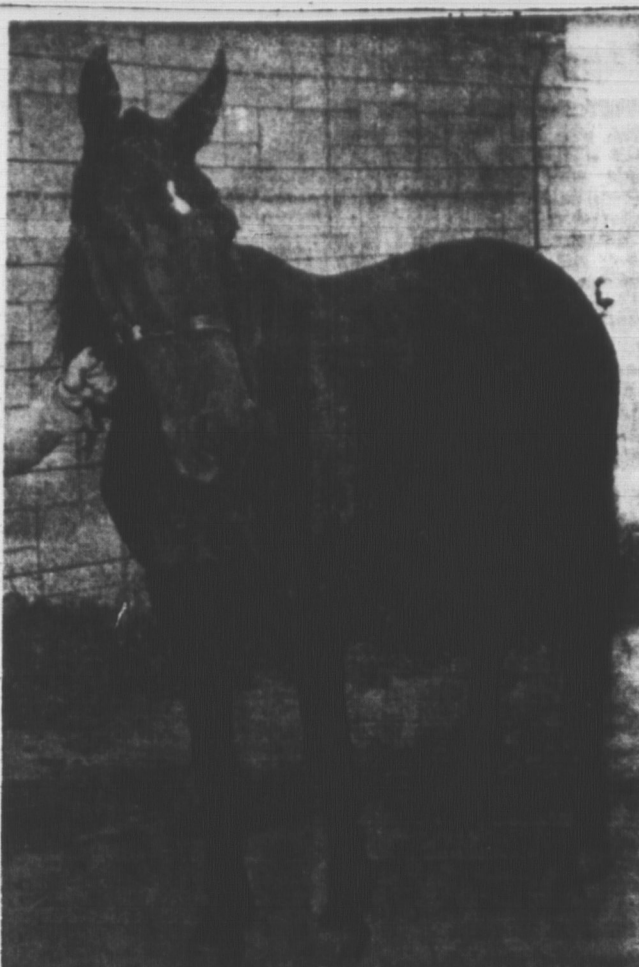

Ont., B.C. Athletes Shatter Records

By DON LEBLANC SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—Five records were broken—four by Ontario athletes—and two others equalled Friday as the two-day national age-class track and field championships opened at Shamrock Park here.

Astrong contingent from Don Mills, Ont., came up with one record and a tie to lead Ontario. Sue Nigh jumped five feet, four inches, to give Don Mills the juvenile high jump record. The former record of five feet, 3 1/2 inches was held by Beverly Pierce of Hamilton, Ont.

Sue's Club-mate, Cathy Chapman, one of the best age-class hurdlers in the nation, beat Barb Dallimore of Ottawa to equal her own record in the 80-metre hurdles. The trim 17-year-old hit the wire in 11.5, a mark she set last year in Winnipeg and lowered by two-fifths of a second this year in Ottawa.

Records set at age-class meets are unofficial until ratified by the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada. The AAU reviews records once a year.

BREAK RECORD A team from the East York Club of Toronto dashed to a new record in the junior 440-yard relay. Anchor Ron Yaschyn was pressed to keep ahead of a swift Manitoba contingent in setting the mark of 42.6. The old record was 43.3.

Ken Hamilton of Toronto's Olympic Club cut three-tenths of a second off the mid-mile record established last year in Summerside by Club-mate Dave Patterson. Hamilton ran the

mile in 4:24.2, finishing ahead of Jean-Richard Dextras of Ottawa and Bill Pitt of North Bay, Ont.

Bruce Simpson, 15, of Toronto set a new mid-jet pole vault record with a jump of 12 feet, seven inches, a half-inch better than the mark established by Donald Gray of Vancouver two years ago.

JAVELIN RECORD Christa Leiper of Burhaby, B.C., bettered the juvenile javelin record by nearly four feet. Canadian javelin champion at the Olympic trials last year, 16-year-old Christa hurled the javelin 139 feet, one inch. Wendy Kellond of Vancouver had set the old record of 135 feet, one-half inch, eight years ago.

Jana Lundy, 15, of Vancouver reached five feet, four inches, to equal her own mark in the mid-jet high jump. She is considered the best female long jumper in Canada.

Garth Hilderman of Saskatoon, a newcomer in age-class competition, won the juvenile 1,500 metre steeplechase in 4:35.4. The event was held for the first time.

Mike Haugh of Windsor, Ont., established a mark of 128 feet, one inch, in the juvenile hammer throw, also a new event. About 300 athletes are competing in the championships which end here today.

Tiger-Cats Invade Calgary Tonight

CALGARY (CP)—Hamilton Tiger-Cats seek their first win against Calgary Stampeders since 1961 when they meet Calgary in a Canadian Football League interlocking game tonight.

Tiger-Cats, defending Eastern Football Conference champions and unbeaten so far this season, edged the Stampeders 36-35 in 1961 but since then all Hamilton-Calgary games have been won by the Stampeders.

In their two 1964 encounters, Calgary walloped Hamilton 33-7 in a pre-season match and nosed out the Tiger-Cats 20-18 in an interlocking game.

Stampeders, who battered last week's Edmonton Eskimos 20-4 last Monday night, are in their place in the Western Football Conference win six points, behind second-place Saskatchewan Roughriders.

Winnipeg Blue Bombers are holding out to top spot in the WFC with eight points. A win for the Stampeders tonight would vault them into a first-place tie with the Bombers.

Tiger-Cats, who defeated Ottawa Rough Riders 27-1 in their last game, are tied with the Riders in first place in the EFC after Ottawa surged back to trim Montreal Alouettes 31-13 Thursday night.

MUST STOP COLEMAN Tiger-Cats will have to muzzle Stampeders fullback Lovell Coleman, who set a WFC one-game rushing record against the Tiger-Cats last year when he rolled up 238 yards in a game in Hamilton.

Both teams have strong defenses. Hamilton has the best defensive record in the EFC having allowed an average of 5.67 points in three games. Calgary has the top defensive record in the West, with a 13.2-point average on five games.

Ticats coach Ralph Szabo hasn't said whether he will start Joe Zuger or Frank Costentino for tonight's game but guessing has it that Zuger will get the call at quarterback.

Zuger and Costentino are fighting a close battle for the job. Costentino has completed 23 of 36 passes for 313 yards and three touchdowns, while Zuger has completed 30 of 59 passes for 365 yards and four touchdowns.

Yanks Top Athletics; Cubs Trounce Braves

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Dick Green's run-producing single in the ninth inning broke up a pitchers' duel between Kansas City's John O'Donoghue and Whitey Ford, giving the Athletics a 1-0 victory over New York Yankees Friday night in an American League baseball game.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) Right-hander Don Drysdale shattered a three-year jinx and won his 18th game Friday night as Los Angeles defeated Philadelphia 9-8, ending a three-game losing streak for the National League leaders.

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Billy Williams socked the fourth grand-slam home run of his career Friday night as Chicago Cubs dealt Milwaukee Braves their fourth straight defeat, 5-3 in a National League baseball game.

NEW YORK (AP)—Willie Mays hit his 40th home run, setting two National League baseball records and tying a second, while Willie McCovey connected twice as San Francisco Giants whipped New York Mets 9-2 Friday night.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Jim Loop opens this Sunday.

LANCASTER, N.B. (CP)—The rejuvenated Atlantic Football Conference, taking a completely new look, opens its 1965 schedule Sunday with two new clubs kicking off the season at Dartmouth, N.S.

Dartmouth Vikings, a team of mostly former high school stars with a mixture of college graduates, clash with the young Lancaster Tiger Cats.

Halifax Buccaneers, last year's Maritime "B" section champion, is the other new club in the circuit that was left on its last legs when Maritime college teams formed their own league. Shearwater Flyers, using some of the players who made up the Stargate team last season in the APC, complete the circuit.

The Ticats have only 10 players who were on the team in last year's Maritime final against the Buccaneers. One of them is Terry Ward, the understudy to quarterback Peter Murray. Ward will start at the signal-calling post Sunday.

Linemen back included Bert Saunders, Darrell Northrup, Jim Inch, Gerry Griffin and Hartley Bastarache. Fullback Don Dwyer is back along with Ron Wright, Ron Hooper and Dave Rowe.

The Lancaster club, under coach Jackie Boyle, played only three games last season; splitting two of them with the junior varsity club from the University of New Brunswick.
