NEWS NOTES. Mrs. Delia T. S. Parrell, mother of the late Charles Stewart Parrell, is ill at Bray, near Dublin. Li Hung Chang is credited with telling a director of the Bank of England that self-interest as a rule of business is the same the world over, but especially in England. A governor in London, advertising for a situation as teacher to two or three children, adds that her age is "sweet 17," and she is fairly good looking, though not fascinating enough to attract young men. The Malagasy mail brings news of an attack upon a number of English and American gold prospectors in Madagascar by the Tahavoids. The prospectors were obliged to flee for their lives, abandoning their baggage. The Cear and Czarina landed at Copenhagen from Kiel on Wednesday, and were received by Royal Highness, Queen of Denmark, the Crown Prince and Princess, the Princess of Wales, and other members of the Royal family. M. Kildschewski, a Russian electrician, claims to have discovered an improvement on the telephone, by the use of which distance has effect on hearing. He intends experimenting on the Atlantic cables between London and New York. The New York commissioner of parks does not like the great British American motto, "Keep off the grass." His little boulevard parks are placarded with the announcement, "Entrusted to the protection of the public." It is said that his confidence has not been misplaced. The man who was buried alive last week, while hypnotized, at Providence, R. I., has declined to permit the experiment to be repeated upon him. He awoke fourteen minutes before the stipulated time, and he was in his grave for good. During his struggles he dislocated his knee cap. Among the resolutions passed at the recent convention of the French-Canadians of Connecticut, held at Wallingford, was one expressing the hope that every French-Canadian in the United States should become an American subject, and another supporting the demands of the French-Canadians of Danielson and Grosvornode for pastors of their own nationality. John Redmond, in addressing the National League at Dublin a few days ago, denounced the recent Irish Convention held in that city as a sham. Not a single Parrellite, he said, was there, while Healy's followers were absent. Nobody would pretend to guess the exact number who would support Mr. Healy, but he believed that it was fair to say that nearly half of the anti-Parrellite members of the House of Commons might be regarded as Healyites. The London Times strongly objects to the release of the dynamiter. It considers their crime was too serious to justify leniency. The crime was truly a terrible one, involving the possible murder of many innocent people. It was less lenient, only because the perpetrators' skill was not equal to their malignity. The Government's excuse is that physicians have recommended the course it has taken. It is a good reason, if it is entirely genuine, but it may be bad for the Ministers if it turns out to be anything else behind their conduct. A special despatch from Hong Kong to the Imperial says that the commander of the British gunboat Redpole has telegraphed from Manila that the gravity of the situation at the capital of the Philippines has become so serious that he has remained there with his ship. This message indicates that the position at Manila is very serious, though no details are obtainable owing to the rigor of the censorship. British telegrams have been received at Hong Kong from mercantile correspondents at Manila advising against the shipments of further consignments of goods to the Philippines, and stating that business there is at a complete standstill. Professor Stowe, the husband of Harriet Beecher Stowe, said that he saw visions of people in whom he was interested, and Mrs. Field recalls an instance of this in the Review of Reviews. On one occasion Mrs. Stowe was in her room when it was supposed she was out of town. Professor Stowe came in, looked about him with a preoccupied air, but did not speak to her. She thought his behavior strange, and amused herself watching him. At last the situation became so extraordinary that she began to laugh.
