

**Cain's Relationship to Christ.**

The following is from a treatise in manuscript which will very shortly be sent to press, and is used in pamphlet form, if the demand therefor, in advance, shall seem to warrant the undertaking in the business sense. "I spoke to you last night, sir, of a Son of Man having been born of woman—the original woman—and you reminded me, Sir, that there were more than one such. True. A multiplicity of offspring became necessary to provide against contingencies involving otherwise impending extinction—necessary because of sin, and death by sin. Hence, Sir, the Lord's announcement to woman, 'I will greatly multiply thy conception.' Now, speaking of the three first Sons of Man, speaking of the three of whom only we have the particular mention, we have,

First.—The Son of Man—Cain—who bore the curse and who bent, and bending beneath the load, exclaimed, 'My punishment is greater than I can bear,' but who was enabled to bear it, however.

Second.—The Son of Man, Abel, the Shepherd of the sheep, that just one that was slain by his brother man—by wicked hands.

Third.—The Son of Man Seth, the substitute, the God-appointed substitute for his brother, his dead brother man; for God, said she, hath appointed me another seed instead of Abel whom Cain slew—Seth the first begotten for the dead—Seth, our elder brother. Can't see into that? Well, sir, you shall. 'Begotten for,' begotten in the stead of—begotten in the stead of his dead brother man, the first so-begotten. Next as to Seth, our elder brother, Adam was his father, the father of the Son of Man, Seth, and we are sons of Adam. But you say Seth was the third son? So he was. Bear in mind, sir, that when Seth, the son of man, Seth, was brought into the world, Abel was dead, and as for Cain, the son of man, Cain, he had departed, had become a sojourner in another land. Cain had fled; he had fled from the presence of the Lord laden with iniquity, under sentence of condemnation, fearing the reproach, bearing the mark of transgression—had fled into the wilderness. And so fleeing, he left him also whose begotten son he was, the darling of whose bosom he had been—him, who, notwithstanding he was angry with him, mourned doubtless nevertheless, because of his departure and because of his affliction. And then, sir, this Son of Man separated himself from her to whose grief-bosom she had pressed him in assuagement of his sorrows, from her whose tears and whose entreaties had then in love and in compassion warded off or sought to parry the avenging blow; had left her who had never left or forsaken him, who in six troubles had delivered him, in seven had no evil touch him. He had departed; he was alone; of the people there was none with him. Now, coming to the point, when the son of Man, Seth, was brought into the world, Abel was dead, the son of Man, Cain, a fugitive! Then, sir, Cain subsequently (at the Flood) was cut off in his seed and generation; Seth lives, ever liveth, in his posterity; he ever liveth in the person of Him which was the son of Seth, which was the son of Adam (i. e. son of Man), which was the son of God—an imperishable, incorruptible seed. Hence, sir, Seth is our elder brother; the last is the first,—the first among many brethren! Or, regarding the Son of Man, Abel, and the Son of Man, Seth, as one, the one as the other (him that was slain), alive from the dead—as one that was dead and is alive again. But why, sir, should I lead you to anticipate that of which I shall have particular occasion to speak in treating of that SON OF MAN, the only begotten of the Father, the great anti-type. Let me read to you, sir, the first chapter of the Epistle to the Hebrews. [He read it some parts twice, very impressively. He then shut the book and re-opened Genesis, and read the third verse of the fifth chapter.]

"And Adam lived an hundred and thirty years, and begat a son in his own likeness, and called his name Seth." There is nothing said for nothing in this wonderful book there is nothing said for nothing. The son may well be supposed to have looked like the father, why then the particular mention? I will tell you, sir. It was to point to the fact that the Son of Man typified by Cain, by Abel, and by Seth,—He who was to bear the curse, to be slain by the wicked hands of his brother man, and who was appointed a substitute, the substitute for his brother, his dead brother man (in Adam all die)—that he which was the son of Seth, which was the son of Adam (the Son of Man) which was the son of God,—that the Son of Man Jesus the Christ was not to come in the likeness after which man was originally made, the likeness of God, but to be made "like unto his brethren, in the likeness of sinful flesh."

He reads Hebrews II, 10-13 and after commenting a little upon it he continues:

"Sir, Cain the Son of Man Cain was indeed wicked; he hated his brother, he was a murderer; but let us remember, sir, that the Lord hath laid on Him (on Jesus the Son of Man) the iniquity of us all, and so He who had done no iniquity was full freighted therewith; he bore the sin of the world. Cain's burden was as nothing to his, yet Cain's nevertheless seemed to him greater than he could bear—Cain bore it however—hence, sir, the Son of Man Can foreshadowed that Son of Man who coming after bore the curse for us. Types are types, types and nothing more. We are to take a circumscribed and superficial view of them. 'Made with hands,' rough-hewn, unsymmetrical, fragmentary, properly adjust them and you have, nevertheless, 'the figure of the true.'"
