TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, Feb. 26.
In the House of Commons to-day Sir Hector Langevin stated that negotiations were going on between the Canadian and Imperial Governments with regard to lengthening the Esquimaux graving dock.
Mr. Platt moved a resolution proposing the abolition of the duty on mining machinery, arguing that such a step was necessary to promote the mining industry.
Mr. Mulock moved in amendment that only such machinery not manufactured in Canada be put on the free list.
Mr. Morn, in amendment to the amendment, moved that inasmuch as the subject is now under the consideration of the government, the debate be adjourned until after the tariff changes are announced in the budget. This was carried by 110 to 77.
After recess, the debate on Mr. Wilson's resolution to repeal the Franchise Act was resumed by Mr. Trow, who supported the resolution. After four hours debate, the resolution was rejected by 99 to 78.
The Orange incorporation bill was passed by the banking and commerce committee to-day, with slight amendments. Some members objected to the provision, enabling the Grand Lodge to confer powers on subordinate lodges in the different provinces. Mr. Curran announced that he would move in the House that the bill should not apply to the Province of Quebec.

British Parliament

LONDON, Feb. 26.
Balfour is engaged in preparing a bill to give Ireland a system of local government or home rule. The scheme is said to be based upon the idea of treating the Irish as to local government, just as the English and Scotch are treated in regard to the same subject. As any proposition to honestly do this would make the Tories a home rule party, it is not believed that his bill will be more than pretence and juggle.
In the House of Commons to-day, Henry Labouchere gave notice that he would introduce a resolution to reduce the appropriation for the courts, in order to call the attention of the House to the great scandal attaching to the administration of justice in connection with the Cleveland Street affair.

Another Terrible Flood.

PHOENIX, Arizona, Feb. 26.
News from the dam disaster reach here slowly. The Company's camp below the lower dam probably contained about 125 people at the time of the disaster, and fears are entertained for their lives. A courier who arrived from near there says he was awakened about two in the morning by the shrieks of the people. The wave was fifty feet high when he first saw it, and it almost instantly swept away the tent and the building and a cannon that was full of cotton wool. Trees were swept clean and the lower structure, 240 feet long and 60 feet above the rock, with 30 feet above the surface, was swept away.

The Walton Embezzlement.

ST. JOHN, Feb. 26.
Proceedings in the Walton embezzlement case were continued all day, and at four o'clock an adjournment was made until four to-morrow afternoon, to allow the detectives time to get from Montreal a certified copy of information against Walton. During the afternoon proceedings, Judge Palmer condemned the methods adopted by the Montreal officers in making the arrest.

Incorporation of Yarmouth.

YARMOUTH, Feb. 26.
A requisition to have the town of Yarmouth incorporated has been signed by about two hundred ratepayers, and the Sheriff will hold a poll on March 13 to decide the question. Many who opposed incorporation before are now strongly in favor of it.

Skating Tournament.

OTTAWA, Feb. 26.
In the skating tournament here to-day, Frank D. Carroll, of Pictou, N.S., won the mile, half, and five mile races, and becomes the amateur champion of the Dominion.
