Cars Collide, Pedestrian Injured On Icy Streets

A pedestrian suffered undetermined injuries, and 11 vehicles

sustained combined damage which was last night estimated to be well over \$1,000, as the result of five traffic mishaps in the city yesterday. All were the result of icy streets.

The pedestrian, John Dougan, Sacred Heart Home, was injured while crossing the intersection at Fitzroy and Great George streets, and was struck by a car driven by John A. Staver, Charlottetown.

Mr. Dougan was taken to the Charlottetown Hospital by Cutcliffe's ambulance, and the extent of his injuries were not known late last night.

The worst property damage incident resulted to three cars and a truck, which were involved in a tail-end collision on Elm Avenue near Young street.

The truck, which was parked, was owned by Wilfred Burke, one car was driven by Foché Dorton, Milton, another by Herman Cousins, Breadalbane, while the operator of the third car, which escaped a damaged, was not known.

One collision occurred at the intersection of George and Sydney streets, when a car operated by Leonard Spencer.

Lemuel A. MacDougall, 309 Euston Street, Charlottetown, died at the Prince Edward Hospital Thursday morning. He was in his 68th year.

A veteran of the First World War, Mr. MacDougall held the position of chief accountant at the Central Creameries at the time of his death.

He is survived by his wife, the former Marjorie Wood; two sons, John, with the Canadian Army in Europe; Alan at home; and a daughter, Mrs. Merrill Johnson, Charlottetown. A brother, Russel, also resides in the city. Three brothers and a sister predeceased him. There are also two grandchildren.

He was a Shiner and served as grand secretary of the Grand Masonic Lodge of P.E.I. for 15 years. Mr. MacDougall was also a member of the United Services Officers Club, HMCS Queen Charlotte, the Charlottetown Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion and had served overseas in the First World War with the 8th Siege Battery.

Remains are resting at the MacLean Funeral Home from where the funeral will be held Saturday at Trinity United Church with service commencing at 2 o'clock. Interment will take place in People's cemetery.

Construction Record Expected For 1963

OTTAWA (CP) - Construction work worth \$2,500,000,000 is expected in Canada in 1963, Hugh B. Montgomery, president of the Canadian Construction Association, says in a year-end statement.

This would be a record and up \$100,000,000 from the estimated \$2,400,000,000 program of 1962.

Mr. Montgomery is president of Pentagon Construction Co. Ltd. of Montreal, described the construction materials industry as "Canada's largest industry and employer."

The equivalent of 370,000 new jobs on-site are required to carry out the program, he comments, plus an even larger work force off-site to produce, sell and transport the necessary construction materials and equipment.

Despite these high figures, he adds, the rate of economic expansion in Canada, as reflected by construction volume, has levelled off since 1957 and, on a per capita basis, is actually declining.

COULD AJD JOBLESS "With unemployment still a serious national problem, larger construction programs are needed to provide more jobs and the physical means for a quickened economic expansion. The construction industry is largely a service industry and construct facilities for the use of others. Our annual volume therefore reflects the state of economic well-being and development of Canada."
