

# Canadiens Score 2-0 Shutout Over Boston Bruins In NHL Semi-Final Opener

MONTREAL, (CP)—Rookie Lorne Davis and bull-shoother (Boom Boom) Geoffron fired the only goals Tuesday night that gave Montreal Canadiens a 2-0 shutout over Boston Bruins and the first game in the best-of-seven Stanley Cup semi-final opener.

The Montrealers kept right on where they left off in the regular playing season and have yet to give up a game to the Bruins this season on Montreal ice. Canadiens came up with a well-nigh perfect defensive game, backed by goalie Jacques Plante's steady work in the nets, and the Bruins were restricted to an even dozen shots on goal. Several of them were lifted from far out and slid slowly up to Plante.

Goalie Jim Henry of Boston, who had 43 shots thrown at him, was beaten on both goals by shots from rebounds, both shots from close range.

The Boston goalie held Canadiens scoreless until 4:25 of the second period. The play started with Butch Bouchard's shot from just inside the blue line. Eddie Mazur deflected the shot into Henry's pads and on the rebound Davis came swooping in to score.

Geoffron's insurance goal came at 13:48 of the final period. Jean Beliveau picked up a rebound from Dickie Moore and fired a hard shot that dropped off Henry's pads. Geoffron reached through a maze of legs and tapped the puck in.

In the second period rookie Doug Mohns tried an angle shot and the puck trickled down Plante's pads and wobbled about the goal line. Defenseman Doug Harvey fished it out and referee Red Storey halted play to question the goal judge while the Bruins put up a howl, claiming that the puck had crossed the line.

George Moore of Detroit, the goal judge, assigned to the series, held that the puck did not cross over a crowd of 14,088 watched the series opener, in which play was rather typical of Stanley Cup hockey. The action was both fast and hard and even rough at times.

There were several minor flare-ups, although only six penalties were called, four against Boston.

Two rookie farm hands were used by Boston—centre Guyle Fielder and left-winger Wayne Brown—both called up from Seattle of the Western Hockey League. At times they played on a line with veteran Woody Dumart. The Bruins were short Hal Laycoe, left at home with a groin injury.

Canadiens did not dress two players—veteran centre Elmer Lach and defenceman Jim MacPherson.

The teams meet in the second game here Thursday and then move to Boston for the third and fourth games Sunday and Tuesday.

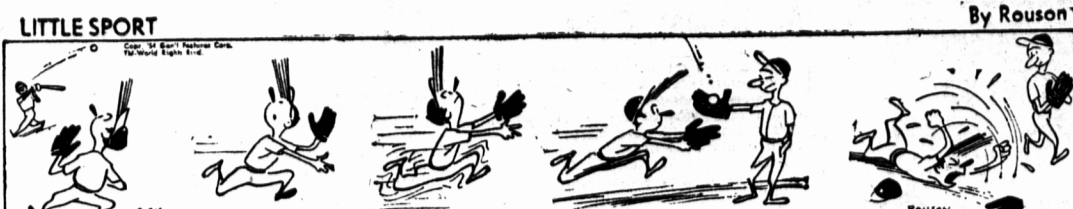

## Duke Donates Hockey Trophy

OTTAWA, (CP)—The Duke of Edinburgh, who showed keen interest in hockey during his visit to Canada in 1951, has donated a trophy for winners of the new east-west professional hockey series.

The trophy is a silver figure of a hockey player mounted on top of a silver globe with a map of North America raised on it. The globe is attached to a round, black ebony base bearing the Dominion coat of arms. On the opposite side of the base is an oblong plaque for an inscription to be decided on later.

Smaller plaques set around the base will carry names of the winning teams and the year they won it.

The trophy will go to the winner of the East-West series to be held annually between the champions of the Quebec Hockey League and the Western Hockey League champions.

The year's series will be held on the home ice of the WHL finalists. The games alternate between East and West each year.

## Halifax Wins Decisive 6-1 Victory Over Sydney In MMHL Finals Opener

HALIFAX, (CP)—Halifax Atlantics bounced into a 1-0 lead over Sydney Millionaires in the best-of-nine Maritime Major Hockey League finals here Tuesday night by smashing Sydney Millionaires 6-1.

Before the game started and before a crowd of 4,434, sports editor Alex Nickerson of The Chronicle-Herald presented Atlantics' forward Billy Ford with the Herald trophy for high scorer in the league.

Ford broke the MMHL records for number of goals and number of points in a season, with 138, during the regular schedule.

Halifax blanketed Sydney in the first and third, and fired a steady two goals a period past Sydney goalie Norm Defelice. Lorne Pirie whistled home Sydney's goal at 2:29 of the second period.

Jackie Hollett paced Atlantics with a goal in the first period and another in the third, Marcel Clements, Doug McPhee, Bob Bowness and Johnny Morrow scored the others.

Halifax took five of the seven penalties handed out.

## Damages Awarded Sugar Ray Cut

NEW YORK, (AP)—Supreme Court Justice James Gibson on Tuesday reduced from \$25,000 to \$15,000 a libel verdict won last week by Sugar Ray Robinson. The judge told the former middle-weight champion he had 20 days in which to agree to accept the lower sum.

A jury of 10 men and two women awarded Robinson the \$25,000 in his suit against the Amsterdam News.

Robinson brought suit after the newspaper had printed a story reporting that the ex-fighter, now a song and dance man, had assaulted his wife, Edna Mae, when the two were in Paris three years ago. Robinson was making an exhibition tour of Europe when the paper printed the story on Jan. 6, 1951. Both Robinson and his wife testified during a three-day trial that the newspaper story was not true.

# Pavelich Scores Pair As Red Wings Blank Leafs 5-0 In Semi-Final Opener

DETROIT, (AP)—Low-scoring Marty Pavelich fired a pair of unassisted goals Tuesday night as Detroit Red Wings blanked Toronto Maple Leafs 5-0 to take the opening game of their semi-final Stanley Cup hockey playoffs.

Pavelich, who scored only nine times during the regular 70-game schedule, started and finished the Red Wing route. He clicked at 8:21 of the first period and at 14:01 of the final.

In between Ted Lindsay, Tony Leswick and Gordie Howe scored as Detroit jumped away to a fast start in the series before 13,177 fans.

Goalie Terry Sawchuk, a self-admitted flop in last year's playoffs, was magnificent in the Detroit net, turning aside 37 shots. He had to make brilliant stops on Bob Bailey and Rudy Migay in the third to preserve the shutout.

Toronto's Harry Lumley, who edged Sawchuk by one goal for the Vezina Trophy, didn't have one of his better nights. He stopped 18 of the 23 drives.

Pavelich scored his first goal while Detroit was short-handed. He picked up a loose puck, skated in Toronto territory and fired a low 15-footer. Ted Lindsay made it 2-0 at 15:48 of the first period, whipping in a close-off of the goal post.

Detroit added two more goals in the second period—both coming unexpectedly. Leswick stole the puck from Toronto defenceman Tim Horton and shot a 40-foot past Lumley. That was 3-0. At 17:39, Howe golfer a hard 25-footer from the right side of the net.

Pavelich closed the scoring when he swiped a pass, cut in front of Lumley and shot the puck past the Maple Leaf net-minder.

In the third period, referee Bill Chadwick slapped Ted Sloan, Toronto centre, with a misconduct and game misconduct penalty. When Chadwick called the game

misconduct, ejecting Sloan from the game, the Maple Leaf centre lapped out of the penalty box and pushed Chadwick by the throat, almost knocking him to the ice. The two penalties carry a fine of \$75.

A defensive lapse by Toronto's Sid Smith set up Detroit's first goal of the game and the Wings were home free. Pavelich headed into the Toronto zone when Smith skated to the sideboards in a wide circle instead of covering the middle and leaving Pavelich with a wide-open path to the Toronto nets. His 15-footer had Lumley beaten all the way.

Defenceman Red Kelly of the Wings was serving an interference penalty at the time.

# Canadiens Plan To Use Entire Line From Buffalo

MONTREAL, (CP)—With the start of the Stanley Cup playoffs an indication of things to come was seen Tuesday—in a statement by Montreal Canadiens that an intact line now with Buffalo will have a chance to start with the National Hockey League club next season.

The statement said that "the work of Gaye Stewart, Eddie Slowinski and Don Marshall has definitely earned this line the right to start with Canadiens next season" always assuming that the players escape injury and report to training camp in good physical condition.

The three have proved a high-scoring line for Buffalo's American Hockey League entry this season. If they stepped up to the NHL it would mean that others on the current roster would not be on the protected list for the new draft and waiver regulations.

Marshall, a centre, played with Canadiens juniors last season and is rated a fine prospect. Stewart and Slowinski have seen plenty of service previously with NHL clubs. Stewart, now 30 years old, was with five—Toronto, Chicago, Detroit, New York and Montreal. Slowinski, 31, had most of his career drops below 10 because of injuries, and then only as many as necessary for replacements.

**Also Goals Plante**

The three players were placed on Montreal's eligibility list for Stanley Cup play. In addition to these three, Canadiens already have goalie Jack Plante, recalled from Buffalo several weeks ago to replace the injured Gerry McNeil.

The Montreal statement said Canadiens would like to see Buffalo win the Calder cup, in the AHL playoffs, "no matter how badly any of the players might be needed at Montreal."

Under the regulations the three forwards can be recalled while Buffalo is in the AHL playoffs only if Canadiens' forward-line strength drops below 10 because of injuries, and then only as many as necessary for replacements.

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
