Sir Alex. Galt says there was no truth in the rumor circulated by Opposition journals that he was about to enter the Cabinet.

Hon. James Cockburn, ex-Speaker of the House of Commons, has recovered from his recent illness, and is expected to be out in a few days.

Rev. D. D. Currie concluded an eloquent thanksgiving sermon by saying that a great cause for thanksgiving to the Almighty was the election of Garfield in the United States.

A special despatch to Halifax Chronicle says a boy about twelve years of age, son of Jacob Dorey, of Hubbard's Cove, was shot dead yesterday afternoon while gunning in company with another boy.

In the sculling match between Laycock, of Australia, and George H. Hoerner, of Boston, for £200, on the Thames champion course, the Bostonian was defeated. Laycock rowed easily and won by three lengths. The weather was splendid and the river perfectly still. Hoerner was dead beat.

The memorial cross of the Prince Imperial, on Chiselmhurst Common, is made of gray granite, on which are sculptured the imperial beaus. On one side is inscribed this sentence from the Prince's will: "I shall die with a feeling of profound gratification to her majesty the Queen of England and for all the royal family, and for the country where I have received during eight years such cordial hospitality."

We trust the Government of Canada are not overlooking the importance of establishing a line of steamers between St. John and Liverpool. All parts of New Brunswick call for such a line, and all parts of Nova Scotia adjacent to the Bay of Fundy join in urging the matter upon the Government. We have no doubt that the Government will aid the undertaking when the members of the Ministry have given the subject full consideration.—St. John Sun.

The Mail says:—"It is understood that Colonel De Winton, the Governor-General's Secretary, will go to England almost immediately. Her Royal Highness, we are led to believe, will not return to Canada this winter, her health not being sufficiently established. While the parliamentary session will thus lose much of its interest, no one will feel inclined to grumble at the loss. Her Royal Highness' loss of health will give the Canadian public more real concern."

Of the war vessels to come to Canada the Mail says:—"We understand that the name of the vessel, which is a corvette of 1500 tons, is the Charybdis. She has just returned from India, and has been placed at the disposal of the Government, all standing, with complete outfit. It is understood that the Government have determined to accept the gift. Captain Scott, R. N., of Halifax will proceed at once to England to bring out the vessel. She is to be stationed at St. John, N. B.

On Tuesday afternoon a young man named John Macfarlane, living at Marble Cove, St. John, was shot and killed by Policeman Wm. Malone, of the town of Potland. The affair happened on the road leading to Long and Burnhill's Mill. Macfarlane had in his possession a watch which a young fellow named Alchorn had stolen from his (Alchorn's sister). Malone went to arrest him, without a warrant, and Macfarlane ran away. Malone drew a revolver and fired. The bullet entered Macfarlane's back and caused instant death.
