Observers At Ottawa Speculate On Possible Delay For Caueway

OTTAWA BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN—There is some speculation here as to what effect the minority government position of the Conservatives may have on the party's pledge to build the Prince Edward Island causeway.

Both Conservative and Liberal parties promised, during the campaign, that they would proceed with the project. The Conservative party was a relaxation of an announcement of intention made by Prime Minister Diefenbaker shortly before the dissolution of the last Parliament.

Some observers here point out that neither party would reasonably want to go back on such a promise, but that circumstances might force an actual construction work.

The principal objection mentioned is the effect it has on the course of Canadian affairs between now and the next election is held. Already Social Credit leaders have made it clear that they intend to wield influence on the Conservatives if they continue to try to govern from their minority position. The support of the 30 social credit MPs in the Commons will be necessary to keep the Conservatives in office and functioning as an effective government.

During the campaign, Social Credit spokesmen have made it plain that their party does not look with favor on high government spending to boost the economy nor on continuing large federal deficits. If Social Credit does exert a strong economic influence in the 25th Parliament, such major projects as the \$100 million causeway may also have to be shelved for a time.

In any event, it is pointed out that time may solve the dilemma as it is expected to be about two years before necessary engineering work is completed.

Joey Gets Set To Lower Boom

ST. JOHN'S Nfld. (CP)—Premier Smallwood said Wednesday he has given Bowater's Newfoundland Pulp and Paper Mills Limited of Corner Brook his word to answer to his critics that he is backing grants retained.

Bowater's announced in early spring that it would do away with all logging camps in favor of loggers commuting from their homes to the cutting area each day.

Mr. Smallwood said last week that the legislature would be asked to pass legislation against this policy if Bowater's would not agree voluntarily to change it.

The premier said he had received objections to the policy from all Progressive Conservative members of the legislature in connection with long distances which loggers had to travel each day and the lack of shelter, hot meals and medical attention in the woods.

Carrier Rocket Fails Bomb Test

WASHINGTON (AP)—Some officials connected Wednesday with the failure of the second time of the United States effort to fire a nuclear device at a high altitude is a propaganda embarrassment.

But the officials said they expect only a temporary setback in the nuclear test program itself—a setback in the time spent in the Pacific tests, not in the atomic development program.

In both fashions the carrier rocket system, not the nuclear device, malfunctioned. On June 4, the tracking system failed. Wednesday there was an undischarged trouble in the missile.

The air force was particularly charmed, since the fiasco marred the otherwise good record of its Thor missiles. The Thor has been used 42 times in space and scientific experiments and was rated a success in 32 of them.

Douglas Says To Consider Leadership

OTTAWA (CP)—T. C. Douglas said Wednesday he will "have to consider" whether he will remain as national leader of the New Democratic Party.

"That is something I want to think about and discuss with my friends before making any announcement," he told an interviewer after flying here from Regina for a television appearance.

Mr. Douglas was met at Uplands Airport by a crowd of 200 who sang NDP songs and waved party placards as he entered the terminal with Stanley Knowles, newly-elected NDP member for Winnipeg North Centre.

Mr. Douglas said he agrees with Liberal Leader Pearson that Prime Minister Diefenbaker should call a new session of Parliament as soon as possible.

Reds May Try One-Way Trip In Moon Race

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A scientist says Russia could be planning to land a cosmonaut on the moon in a one-way "Kamikaze" mission.

Such a mission would put a country ahead 1 1/2 to 2 years scientifically, John M. Cord, a Bell Aerospace Co. engineer, said.

He presented a paper to the Institute of the Aerospace Sciences and said the feasibility of what could turn into a suicide mission. "Such a flight would reduce the risk of a one-way mission to zero," he said. "If it were successful," Cord said.

Narrow Margin Vote Totals PC And Liberal Vote Separated

Progressive Conservative candidates, winners of 118 seats, topped the Liberals, who won 97, by less than 30,000 votes in a record poll of more than 7,400,000 in Monday's general election.

A Canadian Press compilation from all but 1,509 of an estimated 48,375 polls showed these figures: Progressive Conservative 2,781,405; Liberal 2,734,551; New Democratic Party 1,012,144; Social Credit 861,828; others 30,068. The total, with three per cent of the polls still in count, was 7,420,286, compared with 1958's previous record of 7,327,297.

Seen In Cuba

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP)—A fresh outbreak of counter-revolutionary activity was reported Wednesday from Matanzas province where the Cuban government sent troops and tanks five days ago in a show of force against anti-Castro demonstrators.
