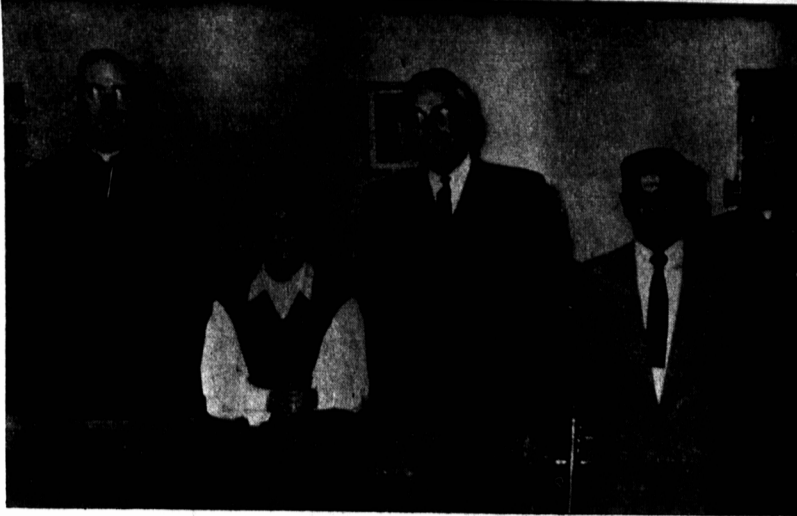

## Fine New School Opened At North Rustico Yesterday

Out of the ashes of a disastrous fire of a year and a half ago arose one of the finest schools ever to be erected in the Province. The opening of Stella Maris School at North Rustico yesterday marked an achievement of which this industrious French Acadian fishing community may well be proud.

Not only were the people of the parish able to erect the most modern fourteen room school in the Province but their being able to do so at a cost of only \$75,000 represents a stroke of financial wizardry which has left builders and others dumbfounded to know how it was done.

The new school was officially opened yesterday afternoon by Mr. Neil A. Matheson, M.P. for Queens assisted by two grade twelve students of Stella Maris High School, Patricia Gauthier and Allison Gallant, representative of Church and State were present for the occasion.

His Excellency, Bishop Malcolm A. MacEachern of Charlottetown said "I wish to associate myself with all of you in this evening your new school brought to completion." He congratulated the Government of the Province for the co-operation it had given the district in making the new building possible.

**LOCAL EFFORT**  
Bishop MacEachern said he was at a loss to know how so splendid a structure could be raised and furnished for the modest sum of \$75,000. He expressed the opinion that a building of the type being opened yesterday would be in the Town where he had just left.

His Excellency noted that the contract had been handled locally and for this he was highly pleased. "It is a good thing to see people doing things for themselves," he said "and not having to go to Montreal or some other place for high cost contractors."

That the parish had taken into consideration the moral welfare of the children was a matter with which His Excellency expressed sincere appreciation. He told both parents and teachers that it was not enough to see children develop.
