Notes of the Week.

Russia is again big with discontent. The Nihilists are once more on the war path; and the crowned Czar is as carefully guarded as ever.

The perpetrators of the Star Route Frauds have escaped unwhipped of justice. The trial of the accused has resulted in a verdict of "not guilty."

The advices from Zululand are not reassuring for reformers in that country. The influence of Cetewayo has, during his long absence, been undermined by his rivals; and many of his former adherents are now in arms against him.

France is still in difficulty with China and Madagascar. But the telegrams announce that the Chinese authorities have given pacific assurances, and that the Malagase will probably be satisfied with the mediation of the British.

A few months ago the people of London and other large cities in England were seriously alarmed by the discovery in their midst of the dreaded "dynamiters." Justice has not been too tardy with respect to these ruffians.

John Bright has been a tribune of the people upwards of a quarter of a century; and now he is enduring a series of public ovations, with processions, complimentary addresses, etc., thrown in.

The Irish Laborers Bill has passed a second reading in the British House of Commons. It gives poor-law boards and town commissioners full power to erect suitable buildings for laborers, or to improve existing dwellings, as the case may be.

Though the tickets were eight dollars each, the banquet in honor of Sir Charles Tupper was "beyond question the most successful event of the kind that ever took place in Halifax."

Practically, New Guinea has been annexed to the British Empire; the Bechuans, in South Africa, have offered their fine, undeveloped country to the British Government; and it is announced that the wisdom of taking the New Hebrides, the Solomon Islands, and other islands in the Southern Pacific Ocean, is being seriously considered.
