

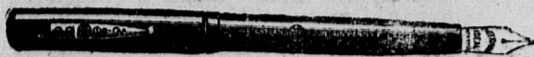

WEDDING GUESTS BURNED TO DEATH

Detroit, November 28.—A merry party of six persons were returning from a wedding at Muskegon last night when the launch in which they were returning suddenly burst into flames. The gasoline tank exploded immediately afterwards, scattering burning oil in all directions. Four of the party, named Coulson, Bissell, raised to 10c, and Gardner all members of the same family, were either drowned or burnt to death. The other two managed to reach the shore, badly burned but alive. Three bodies have been recovered, horribly burned.
