Would Call Special Session Says Hepburn

(By The Canadian Press) TORONTO, July 6—Premier Mitchell Hepburn said tonight that if necessary he would call a special session of the Ontario Legislature to deal with the Succession Duties Act and "forestall the future efforts of the government by blocking by purely technical objections."

The Premier spoke after a conference with Crown officials over the judgment of Mr. Justice Hugh Ruse continuing an injunction which forbids provincial treasury officers to intrude the estate of the late J. J. McCann, a Montreal rubber manufacturer.

Good Roads Convention

Montreal, July 7th. Every province in the Dominion of Canada will be officially represented at the 25th annual convention of the Canadian Good Roads Association, to be held at the Chateau Frontenac, Quebec, on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, September 12, 13 and 14. The President, Hon. T. B. McQuesten, Minister of Highways, Province of Ontario, has already received assurances to this effect and in addition announces that eminent highway engineers from the United States and the Mother Country will also be in attendance. The Hon. Mr. McQuesten will head a large delegation from Ontario, including the deputy minister, chief and staff engineers and the highway engineers of the various counties. Hon. Frank M. McPherson, Minister of Public Works, British Columbia, who is honorary president, will lead a strong representation from the West while Hon. W. A. Falow, Minister of Public Works, Alberta, and the Hon. W. R. Clubb, Minister of Public Works, Manitoba, will each be accompanied by their highway engineering staffs, as will also Hon. A. T. Proctor, Minister of Highways for Saskatchewan. From the Maritime Provinces, Hon. S. Macmillan, Minister of Highways for Nova Scotia; the Hon. J. P. McIntyre, Minister of Public Works for Prince Edward Island; and the Hon. W. S. G. Macdonald, Minister of Public Works for New Brunswick will each head strong delegations, that will participate in the proceedings.

The Hon. Anastole Carignan, Minister of Roads for the Province of Quebec, who is host to the convention has authorized his deputy minister and the full engineering staff of the Department of Roads to take a leading part in the lectures and discussions. The Minister will not only extend an official welcome to the delegates on the opening day but will give a special address at the Thursday afternoon session.

The rapid strides made in recent times in the construction and maintenance of modern highways in every province has been due, in large measure, to the increasing interest taken by the general public and their representatives in conditions of travel. The work of the Canadian Good Roads Association has done in marshalling this public opinion has long been recognized by the different Governments. They have realized that without such opinion behind them they would be unable to carry out the important factor in promoting the general prosperity of the Dominion.

The Premiers of the nine provinces several of whom attend the conventions, as well as their Ministers of Highways, realize that at these gatherings their officials by interchange of ideas and discussion of problems with experts from other countries, are enabled to obtain knowledge of a practical nature that will help them to give the public the best highways available. Being held at Quebec this year, particular attention will be paid to problems of special interest to Eastern Canada, and proposals are being made to accommodate some 500 delegates.

There will be five general sessions during the three days, at which will be given 12 lectures, covering various aspects of highway construction, maintenance, financing, safety and other factors. The score of speakers selected to head discussions will ensure that every subject will be canvassed in a thorough manner so that the maximum of benefit will be derived therefrom.

GENERAL CONDITIONS

All races to be mile heats raced on the three heat plan; 10% of each purse will be awarded to the winner. The remainder will be divided into three equal parts, one part to be raced for each heat. In the event of there being three heat winners they shall have a fourth heat to determine the winner.

All purses divided 50, 25, 15 and 10. Entry fee 5%. Five per cent of the money raced for each heat will be deducted from the first and second horses; 3% will be deducted from the third horse and 2% from the fourth horse.

Six horses to enter and four to start.

Right reserved to change program, reject any entry, or if entry appears to lay over field to the extent that there is not, in the opinion of the management, sufficient competition, then the said entry may be transferred to a faster class or entry fee refunded; but any driver and to declare race off on account of bad weather, or failing to obtain satisfactory number of entries or starters to transfer horses to another class to which they are eligible, re-open or substitute another without advertising, or alter or extend racing dates.

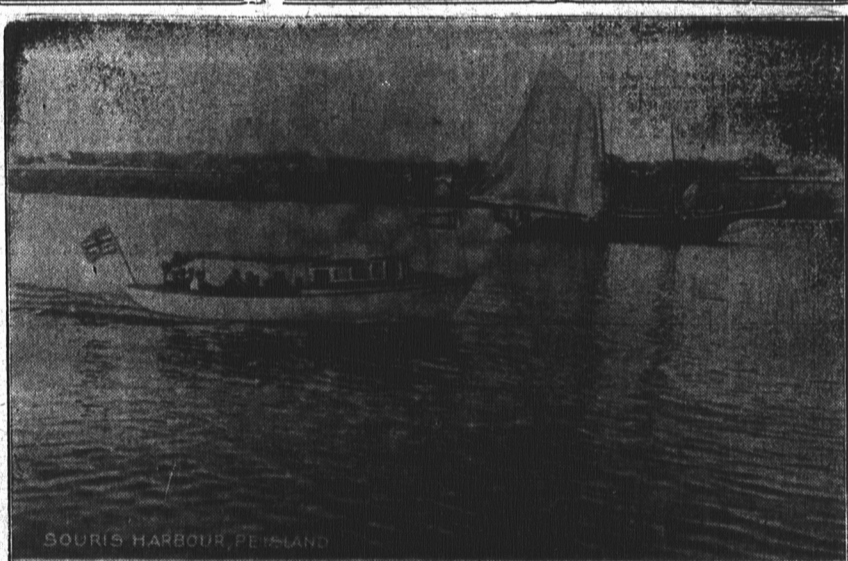

JACKSON, Ky., July 6—Bodies of 58 persons trapped in their eastern Kentucky mountain homes and drowned when a night cloud-burst poured tons of water into small streams had been identified today.

Search was continued for 47 reported missing.

Property and livestock loss was heavy. Railroads and highways were damaged badly.

Breathitt County—scene of feuds in the past—superstressed Rowan County as being the locale of more deaths as bodies were dragged from Frozen Creek and from the Kentucky Rivers into which they flowed.

Latest figures by counties of recovered bodies: Breathitt 27; Rowan 24; Lewis 1.

The little centre of Keok, a few miles north of Jackson, almost was wiped out as a 20-foot wall of water thundered against homes and carried away all but three houses. It was here that the largest death list was expected. The 1930 federal census gave Keok's population as 38.
