MONTREAL (CP) — The U.S. dollar closed Monday at a discount of 3-7/8 per cent in terms of Canadian funds, up 1-3/8. Pound sterling \$2.69 5/16, up 1-1/8.

Toronto Stocks

TORONTO (CP) — The stock market plodded through a dull uninteresting session Monday and closed thoroughly mixed. The final volume of 2,083,000 shares was the highest since mid-August, 1934. Senior base metals won back lost ground near the close of trading but didn't show an advance on the day. Although Hudson Bay added a point and International Nickel gained 3/8, half a dozen other seniors lost fractional ground. Junior base metal gains were generally limited to 10 cents or less. Hoyle, however, gained 20 cents and Quebec Metallurgical 15 cents. Coppers were mixed in a narrow range. Western oil prices changes ranged to 15 cents. Index changes: golds off .70 to .78.50; base metals up .07 to .232.5; western oils up .28 to 153.64.

N. Y. STOCKS

NEW YORK (AP) — Aircrafts, steels and coppers paced the stock market to its first rise in four sessions Monday. But semi-holiday conditions prevailed due to the Veterans' Day observance. Banks were closed but security exchanges were open. Leading issues advanced from fractions to about 2 points or more. A sensational gain was Lukens Steel, up 4 1/2 to 123, following a prediction of record sales and earnings this year for the firm. Lukens stock sold at a low of '42 this year.

Other bullish news about the steel industry also helped stimulate shares of this industry. The aircrafts rose on good news affecting the industry. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks rose 90 cents to \$179.80. The most active stock was Glenn L. Martin, off & at 40% on 34,900 shares.

Canada's Domestic Exports Increase

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's domestic exports rose 11.8 per cent in the first nine months of 1936 to a record \$3,518,000,000 from \$3,145,600,000 in the corresponding months a year ago. The bureau of statistics reported in the movement abroad of newsprint, wheat and other iron ore, petroleum, nickel, copper, craft and parts and industrial machinery. These gains more than offset decreases in the export of planks and board, aluminum and products, wheat flour and fertilizers. Domestic exports exclude goods imported into Canada and then exported. Shipments to the United States increased to \$2,071,033,000 from \$1,865,072,000. Exports to the United Kingdom rose to \$387,974,000 from \$582,616,000. Shipments to the rest of the Commonwealth increased to \$185,406,000 from \$183,462,000.

LONG-RANGE PLAN

Road Building Costs High When Blending Is Necessary

OTTAWA (CP) — The cost of road building comes high when the main object is to make the highway blend with the natural setting it passes through. That's what Federal District Commission experts are doing in Gatineau Park. The area, a 50,000-acre natural playground a Quebec side of the Ottawa River, is being reserved as part of the plan for beautification of the national capital. The Gatineau Parkway, slowly being chopped through the bush country, is costing \$500,000 a mile. POPULAR LAKES

Lookouts are built along the roads with views of the Ottawa Valley. Stonework on the lookouts is made of materials found in the area, part of the plan to keep the setting natural. Winding footpaths lure the motorist away from his car for a walk through the bush where deer and beaver are abundant.

The park begins on the outskirts of Hull, Que., directly across the Ottawa River from the capital, and stretches up into the Gatineau hills. A 15- or 20-minute ride brings the motorist right into the lap of nature.

in the park's three lakes—Harrington, Philippe and Meach. They can rent tents and boats. FDC landscape architects first set out the route of the parkway with aerial photographs. Then the routes are examined on the ground to ensure they take in the best scenery. The road is planned so that a variety of scenes will be presented to the motorist. He won't see the same view twice. Underbrush is thinned so rock formations and lakes will be visible from the road. The Gatineau hills area was made a park in 1937. At that time most of the area was privately owned and there are still private properties and cottages on the lakes. The late prime minister Mackenzie-King had a cottage there for many years. It was left to the nation when he died. His property at Kingsmere, beautifully landscaped under his direction, is visited every year by thousands of tourists. In winter the park is a skiers' paradise. Many ski lodges dot its borders. The skiers will have a new run this year. The Fortune Lake Parkway will be closed to traffic in winter. The FDC says skiers can use its five-mile stretch, much of it downhill, as a ski run.
