

Ont. Skaters Make Sweep In Figure Skating Ch'ships

TORONTO (CP) — Ontario skaters Saturday made a clean sweep of all national titles in the Canadian figure skating championship finals.

A capacity crowd of 4,500 at Varsity Arena saw Don Jackson of Oshawa Ont. one of the world's top skaters, easily defend his senior men's singles title. He also took the men's free skating championship.

Toronto's Wendy Griner retained her senior women's singles and free skating titles.

Jackson, 31, drew a burst of applause from the crowd when he executed the incredible triple lutz—three mid-air turns from a backward take-off. It had never been done before in competition skating.

Maria and Otto Jelinek of Bronte, Ont., repeated last year's win of the senior pairs championship, finishing well ahead of three other competing twosomes.

In the senior dance competition, Virginia Thompson of St. Catharines, Ont., and Bill McLachlan of Toronto, champions in 1961, again won handsily.

Jackson, a wiry 135-pounder, combined nerve, athletic energy and grace in his free skating display. He took first from all five judges. He got off to a flying start in the earlier compulsory figures session and piled up a total of 990.20 points, 51.88 more than runner-up Don McPherson, 17, of Stratford, Ont. Miss Griner, a pretty 17-year-old blonde, garnered 949.40 points. Petra Burka, 15, of Toronto, finished second with 882.24. The Jelineks, a brother and sister team born in Czechoslovakia, executed a breathtaking series of new lift manoeuvres to take first from four of five judges.

Maria, 19, and Otto, 21, won the pairs title with a margin of six ordinal points over Gertrude Desjardins, 19, and Maurice LaFrance, 21, formerly of Sudbury, Ont.

BEAT FAMILY TEAM

Miss Thompson, 18, and McLachlan, 23, a construction company vice-president, finished 10:46 points ahead of the brother-sister pair, Donna Lee and John Mitchell of Vancouver. In the senior fours competition Elinor Flack, 18, and Philip

McCordic, 17, both of Toronto, and Miss Desjardins and LaFrance took the national title. The Ontario quartet got 479 points, 15 more than the other entry from Penticton, B.C.

Earlier in the competition the Ontario sweep became apparent when skaters from the province bagged all junior titles.

The Jelineks are happy about the idea of going to Prague for the world championships March 14-19. They were born there. Czech authorities, after claiming them as subjects of that country last year, have recognized the pair as Canadian citizens.

In Disagreement

We have read and heard comments about how much pleasure the fans derived from the Pee-Wee hockey game between the Natick Comets and the Summerside All-Stars. This in spite of the fact that the score was 9-2. The international flavor probably helped, but we suspect it was the clever stick handling displayed by some of the youngsters that really took the crowd's eye. There is nothing more exciting and crowd-pleasing to watch a player zig-zagging his way down the ice through opposing players accompanied by clever stick manipulation.

Yet the rule makers inserted rules years ago which makes it virtually impossible and certainly not feasible for players to use this tactic today. The forward pass effectively eliminated this rink length dippy doodle. We were just a kid but we'll never forget the stick wizardry of such fellows as Jimmie Wilkie and Mag MacGregor of the old Maritime professional league.

Today, you have to be head and shoulders over your opponents to carry this zig-zag solo effectively. Of the seniors Angle Carroll comes the nearest to it, and he couldn't get anywhere with that solo of his in faster company. The rule makers have changed the rules to give us more and more speed, but we wonder if they have made the game really more scientific and enjoyable.
