### Contract Bridge

**HE CHEATED HIS OWN PROBLEM**

The defense chosen by East in the following deal seemed safe enough at the time—but it created a problem which he solved incorrectly.

South dealer.  
Both sides vulnerable.  
Both sides 30 on score.

♠ A 9 6 3  
♥ 10 9 5  
♦ 7 3 2  
♣ A 4 3  
 ♠ J 10 8 5  
♥ 8  
♦ K Q 10 8  
♣ 10 9 7  
 ♠ K 2  
♥ 3 2  
♦ A J 4 5  
♣ K Q J 8 2  
 ♠ Q 7  
♥ A K Q J 7 6 4  
♦ 9 4  
♣ 6 5

The bidding:  
South West North East  
3♥ Double Pass 3♠  
Pass Pass 4♥ Double  
Pass Pass Pass

The part-score situation naturally influenced West, but as long as he was going to stretch, it might have been more logical to bid four clubs, instead of doubling. Defending against the four-heart contract, West laid down the club king. Declarer played the ace from dummy, and then, simply hoping for something favorable to happen, returned a diamond. East went in with the queen and obviously feeling that nothing could be lost by returning the spade jack, made that play. South covered with the spade queen, and West's king went to dummy's ace. Now, still leaving the trumps severely alone, South led a low spade from dummy. East took this trick, of course,
