A DAMAGING DEFENCE.

In reply to the letter of Mr. W. S. Stewart, Q. C., the Patriot says: "What Hon. Peter Sinclair said, or Premier Peters, or Mr. J. H. Bell, is little to the purpose. Like their predecessors in power, it is true, they have failed so far to equalize revenue and expenditure, but they have had courage to do one thing which the late Government shirked, that is to impose a moderate amount of taxes."

FEEDING HOGS.

PROFESSOR SAUNDERS said, when he was here a few days ago, that it had been proved by actual experiment that four to five and a half pounds of oats would, when properly fed to a healthy growing hog, make a pound of pork. At this rate the oats would bring a cent a pound, or thirty-four cents per standard bushel, if the pork were sold at four and a half cents per pound; and as most of the oats grown on P. E. Island weigh more than the standard, the price to our farmers would be considerably higher.

It is to be remembered, too, that oats and other grains are the materials from which the highest priced pork is made. That pork in now most highly prized which shows a streak of fat and a streak of lean, and is obtained by feeding young hogs with milk and grains, etc., until they reach a weight of a hundred and fifty to a hundred and eighty pounds.

We may see no way towards agreement, but we may at least do something towards knitting together the bonds of peace."

"There is one wish in which we can all share, and I send it to you with all hearty wishes—may God's Holy Spirit guide us all alike to speak the truth in love and in all we do and say to seek first God's kingdom and His righteousness."

NEWS NOTES.

Moose, deer and caribou are reported plentiful up the New Brunswick rivers. Spain has sent General Pelayo to quell the Philippine islands revolt.

The Duke of Orleans was married in Vienna a few days ago to the Arch-Duchess Dorothea.

The house of Mrs. Annie E. McLeod of Sydney was lately saved from destruction by fire by the blowing of the cat.

Vice-President Hobart's cousin was killed through an explosion in celebrating the Republican victory at Hightstown, N. J.

It is reported at Madrid that the Spanish have defeated Antonio Maceo in Pinar del Rio, the insurgents losing 200 killed and wounded.

A heavy snow storm prevailed at Huron, S. D., a few evenings ago. Trains were delayed and telegraph and telephone communication interrupted.

Some of the Nova Scotia fruit growers have organized a fruit shipping company with a capital of \$50,000, for the better handling of their export trade.

The steamer Tyrion, which left Halifax on October 21st with a cargo of fish and potatoes valued at \$15,000, has been towed into Bermuda in distress. No particulars.

The London Graphic learns that the Marquis of Salisbury has decided to evacuate the island of Cyprus, and that it is understood this decision has cleared the way for common action of the powers in Turkey.

Collectors of customs have been instructed that under no circumstances are postage stamps to be removed from postal packages or parcels while the same are under customs control.

It is recorded as a mark of English railway enterprise that the Midland Railway Company will commence this month to supply passengers with pillow and a sleeping rug for 25 cents. It is cheap, though, but seems a very primitive sort of advance towards the sleeping car arrangements on this side of the water.

The Paris Gil Blas publishes an interview with the Paris representative of the Cuban Republican committee, in which he is quoted as declaring that the result of the election is a triumph for Cuba, which, however, he declared, would be free before the new president arrives at the White House.

News has reached Washington that the Japanese government has finally awarded the American ship builders contracts for building two swift protected cruisers of the Olympia type.

The Vienna Neue Freie Presse, doubtless inspired by Bismarck, reveals another important secret. It alleges that early in 1876 Russia asked Prince Bismarck whether Germany would remain neutral if Russia attacked Austria, as the Russian army was tired of inaction.

Prof. Robertson, government dairy commissioner, states that another order has been issued in the butter trade of Canada this year is the more general use by creameries of square boxes as packages for butter.

THE PROVINCIAL SITUATION.

Letter From Mr. W. S. Stewart, Q. C. Sir,—The gentlemen composing the present Local Government to whom I have been lately directing public attention, have been very emphatic in their condemnation of a Provincial debt, and once upon 'time event went so far as to announce as part of their policy to get the country out of debt.

In the year 1886 the Hon. Mr. Sinclair spoke in the House of Assembly as follows: "If they continue running in debt as they have been doing, the province will be ruined financially. We want to get out of debt."

The member for West River, Mr. Farquharson, in the same year had this to say: "He heard more than one farmer declare that they did not care about remaining in a country where the debt was so large in relation to the value of the property."

Then we have Mr. Sinclair in the session of 1891 speaking in this way: "I say that no government is justified in adding to and increasing the public debt every year."

While the leader, Mr. Peters, in the year 1892, after he had been in power about a year, announced himself as follows: "We came in in 1891 with the distinct policy to get the country out of debt, and the same gentleman as late as the month of April, 1895, in delivering his budget speech to the Legislature made the following declaration: 'The policy of the Liberal Government, as I understand it, is to run things so that you will not get into debt without prospect of getting out of it.'"

According to the public accounts there was a balance against the Province of \$160,581.90 on the 31st of December 1891. There was a deficit of \$30,433.20 on the transactions of the year 1891 and the Peters Government had charge for more than eight months of that year. It is not fair to charge the deficit of \$29,292.80 or two-thirds of this deficit. This would make the balance against the Province when the present government assumed the reins of power \$140,389.10.

There is a tale of a Debiture of \$185,000.00. There is a tale of a Loan debt of \$116,622.10. There is a tale of a Temporary loan debt of \$7,297.65. There is a tale of a Private loan debt of \$31,132.32. There is a tale of a Floating debt of \$71,356.84. Total Provincial debt on December 31, 1895 \$383,399.31. Deduct debt which existed when present party came in 140,389.19. Debt for which present Government is responsible \$243,010.12.

This amount represents the increase which has been made to our debt by the present government. It is the distinct policy to get the country out of debt. It has all been done in a little over four years at a rate of about \$60,000 a year, not a bad gain for a party that has at the same time been collecting large sums by taxation.

What about their other pledges? They promised in 1893 to carry on the affairs of the Province for many years without taxation. The present Commissioner of Public Works, Mr. McLean, declared in the House, in the session of 1893, "that the affairs of the country can be carried on for many years without a direct tax on the people of the Province."

Mr. Warburton in speaking on this matter in the House of Assembly in the year 1892 said: "But if they proceed to levy a tax upon the people without their consent I would vote against it. If asked why I would oppose such a measure I would answer because it would be springing taxation upon the people without consulting them." And Mr. Peters on more than one occasion declared that taxation would not be resorted to without consulting the people at the polls.

OTTAWA, Nov. 9. It is given out here that there will be no official announcement of the terms of the School Settlement before Wednesday next. The general basis of the agreement is half-hour daily for religious exercises, certificated Catholic teachers in school sections where twenty-five families reside, and provincial control over the schools.

HALIFAX, Nov. 9. A laboring man named John Tobin, belonging to Windsor, was run over and killed on the Intercolonial Railway, near North Street station, on Saturday night.
