Fall Session Depends On Korea

OTTAWA, July 23—(CP)—The calling of a fall session of Parliament depends on developments in Korea.

Some Cabinet ministers say privately that Parliament will not be recalled unless the Government decides Canada should contribute to any international force raised by United Nations for service in Korea.

The idea of an international force is being discussed among United Nations secretariat, but so far in an inconclusive, informal way. It is felt here to have its attractions, but also its practical difficulties.

Prime Minister St. Laurent said last week the Government is prepared to consider Canadian participation in the recruiting of an international force. But he added that any plans for such participation would be submitted to Parliament for approval.

Present plans do not call for a reconvening of Parliament to vote more money for defence purposes.

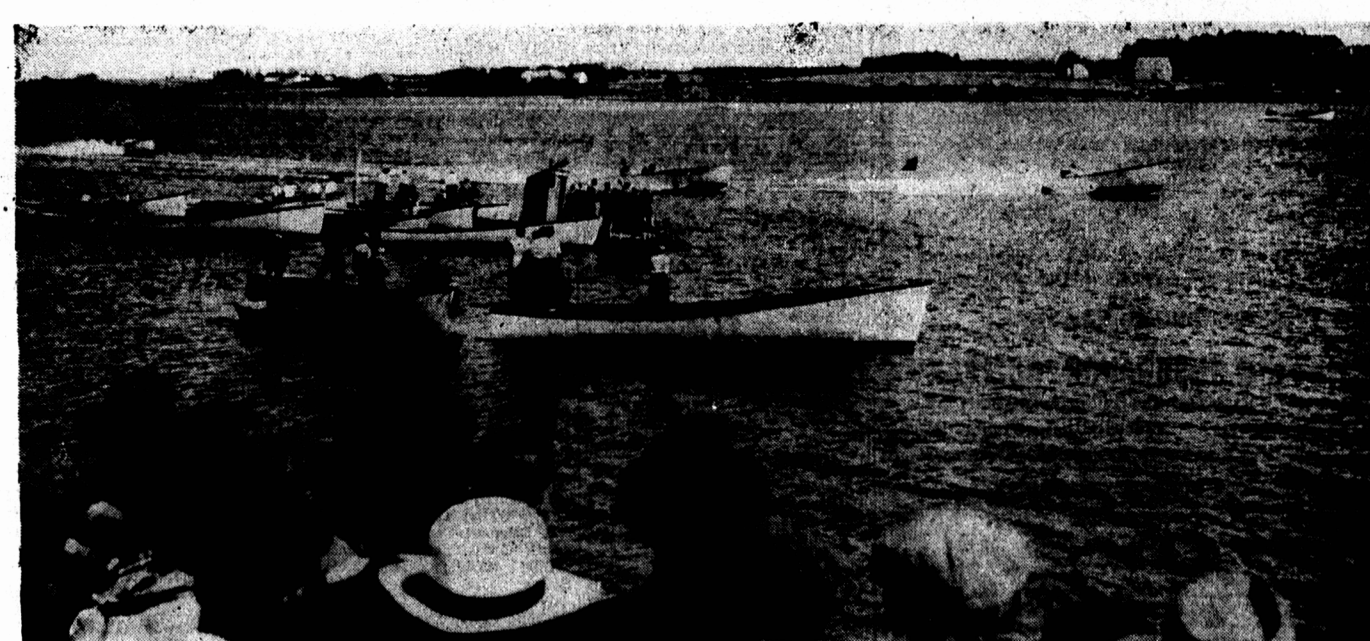
