Laurier continues Debate on Address

THERE IS NO HOPE AT ALL OF PROHIBITION

Foster Shows up the Absurd Claims of the Government.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, March 22.—In the House of Commons, Laurier continued the debate on the address.

Referring to the Plebiscite he said the pledge had been made by the Liberal party in convention that a plebiscite should be taken, and a plebiscite had been taken.

The result was that only 23 per cent of the people had pronounced in favor of prohibition, and as the leader of the Liberal party and with a full sense of the responsibility of what he was saying, he had no hesitation in saying that there was never any intention in adopting prohibition unless a majority of the electors pronounced in favor of it.

With reference to the fast Atlantic service he admitted that the Government had done nothing, but he hoped it would be able to do something some time.

He took up the Washington Commission and defended the commission from the charges made against it of taking a very long time to do very little.

Foster made an able address treating of the Grit combinations, the trade and tariff policy, and their juggling of accounts to conceal the true deficit. Tariff reduction, he showed, was only three one hundredths of one per cent.

Martial Law at Skagway.

VICTORIA, B. C., March 18.—Steamer Amur, from Skagway, brings news of riots over a railway strike. Martial law is said to prevail.

MALCOLM M'LEAN BURIED.

Requiem Mass Sung for a Shipbuilder of the Old School.

The funeral of Malcolm McLean, an old resident of Cambridge, took place this morning, the procession leaving his home, 102 Inman St. Requiem high mass was celebrated at the church of St. Mary of the Annunciation by Rev. Patrick H. Riley, assisted by the sanctuary choir. A large number of mourners were present as a mark of respect and esteem of his sterling qualities.

Mr. McLean died Thursday morning as a result of a stroke of paralysis. Although he had reached the age of 85 years, and had been an invalid for the past 16 years, he was up and about up to within a couple of months before his death.

Mr. McLean was a native of Cardigan, Prince Edward Island, and was born in 1814. At the age of twelve he was apprenticed to a shipbuilder. On arriving at his majority he came to the States, ever since working at his trade in all the big shipbuilding yards of the country. He was a shipbuilder of the old school, and in his 65 years of work was employed on some of the staunchest vessels afloat, and on several racing yachts.

He was married in 1864. Five years ago his wife died. The pallbearers were his four nephews. Mr. McLean left three daughters and two sons. The interment took place at Arlington. —Boston Globe, March 18th.

NATURAL HISTORY AND ANTIQUARIAN SOCIETY.

Quite a large meeting took place last evening to hear the paper read before the Natural History and Antiquarian Society by Mr. Watson, descriptive of a plant which grew in a human throat. The subject was treated both from its botanical and biological aspects. A full and minute description of the throat and contiguous parts was given. The possibility of a seed obtaining a lodgment, germinating and growing there were considered and treated with a good deal of detail. A number of authorities were cited in support of the views taken in the paper.

A lengthy discussion followed, the main points of which were the possibility of a seed in such a position, growing and described as this one, which was decided to be a lemon, had. Amongst those who participated in the discussion were Drs. Beer and McLeod, Messrs. McCready, Doull, Palmer, McSwan, Bentley and the President of the Society. Statements corroborative of those contained in the paper were made by Messrs. Hughes and Saunders, both of whom had a personal knowledge of the history of this particular plant.

At the next meeting of the society, to be held a fortnight hence, the President, Mr. John Newson, will read a paper on a geological subject.
