## 65-Year Old Error In Bill Found & Rectified

Holman Limited when he discovered an error that had been made in the extension of one of the items on the bill. When he found this he brought it to the attention of Holman's and they, as would any reputable business firm, immediately paid for this error plus the interest.

No doubt many of the older citizens of Prince Edward Island would remember Captain Mustard as he was one of the leading sea captains of his day and would also remember the brig Corsica which used to arrive at both Summerside and Charlottetown with cargoes from all over the world.

## Soldiers Return Home

OTTAWA: The first large contingent of Canadian soldiers returning from service with the 1st Canadian Infantry Brigade in Germany will arrive in Canada next week. Army Headquarters in Ottawa said today.

The draft of 650 officers and men will reach Wolfe's Cove, near Quebec City, on Thursday, October 20, aboard the TSS Columbia.

The troops from all units of the brigade, represent every province in Canada as well as the North West Territories. On arrival they will be despatched by train to various depots across the country, from St. John's Newfoundland to Vancouver.

The contingent is the first of eleven that will carry more than 8,000 soldiers and their dependents back home after two years' service with the Canadian NATO force in Europe.

The overall rotation of the 1st and 2nd Canadian Infantry Brigades, which began this month, will go on until early December, transporting more than 15,000 troops and dependents between Canada and Europe.

## Let Boat Fails To Set Record

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—The Jet-propelled speedboat Bluebird of England was thwarted Sunday in its attempt to set a record and then sank a little while later when being towed to shore.

Donald M. Campbell, the owner and driver of the fastest boat in the world, managed to scramble to safety out of the cockpit when the mishap occurred. The Bluebird went down stern first, and settled in a depth estimated at 50 or more feet of water.

It seemed possible that the same rough water that ruined his record-setting chances before a network television audience caused the Bluebird to sink.

Campbell's boat was being towed into dock when it sank.

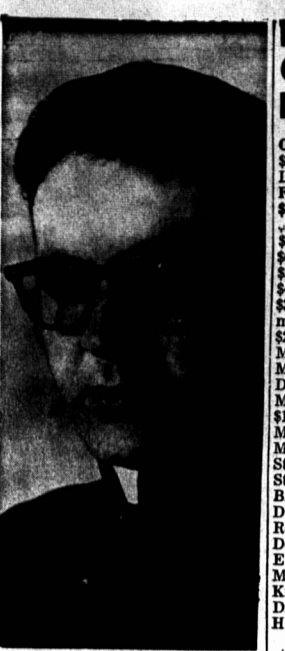

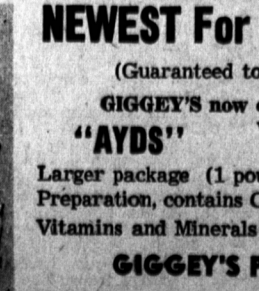
