SOME LIVELY MOVING.—A champion trotting record that has stood for seven years was smashed at Nashville, Tenn., on the 22nd, when the chestnut mare Nightingale went two miles in 4.33 at Cumberland Park. Belle Ham' was also in such good form that she drove 1½ without a skip in 2.11, over a second below her record made at Rochester three years ago. Besides these fast time performances, there were some sensational battles in the regular contest, the 13 heats trotted and paced all being faster than 2.15. Storm reed off a heat in 2.09 to begin with, and ended the race left over from Friday by another mile in 2.08½, the favorite, Winslow Wilkes, having no business with the great young stallion at this clip. At Stockton, Cal., on the same day, Stamboul was driven against his record of 2.11, and made a mile in 2.04. The wind was not favorable for record-breaking.

THE BRITANNIA ASHORE

ALL HANDS SAFE.

Position of the Ship.

Likely to Become a Total Wreck.

HALIFAX, Oct. 26.

The steamer Britannia, of the North Atlantic Line, Captain Doane, from Boston, October 24th, for Halifax, in ballast, struck on the Racehorse Shoals, off Cape Sable, yesterday morning. The ship came off almost immediately, but her bottom being badly damaged, the captain ran her into Barrington, East Bay, and beached her, where she now lies, a little east of West Head, at the northeast point of Cape Sable Island. From the head of Barrington harbor the ship can be seen lying head on to the beach and sitting in an upright position. She is not at present in a dangerous position, but should an easterly gale spring up she will doubtless become a total wreck. There were eight passengers on board. The crew and passengers have been all safely landed.

General Telegraphic News.

MONTREAL, Oct. 24.—A cable to the Star dated London, Oct. 24, says: Hon George E. Foster denies the rumor that Canada intends to issue a new loan. He also denies that his visit is connected with the Atlantic service. He and Sir John Abbott spent Sunday with Lord Mount Stephen.

DUBLIN, Oct. 24.—Lord Houghton, viceroy of Ireland, has refused to receive an address which the Irish Methodists wished to present him. He based his refusal on the ground the address contained political references.

LONDON, Oct. 24.—Abnormally cold weather continues. Snowstorms are reported from the north of the kingdom, and the interests of farmers generally are suffering heavily from this premature winter weather. A furious gale raged on the North Sea to day, and bad weather is reported from nearly all British ports.

OTTAWA, Oct. 24.—In reference to the alleged case of pleuro-pneumonia among the cargo of Canadian cattle of Dundee, the high commissioner reports that one animal was slaughtered on suspicion, with faint symptoms of disease. Veterinary Surgeon McEachern has been instructed to make an investigation regarding this particular shipment and in the meantime Sir Charles has reassured the imperial authorities as to the non-existence of pleuro in Canada.

TORONTO, Oct. 24.—Fifty cases of diphtheria were reported in this city during the past week, the disease being almost epidemic. In addition there were 15 cases of typhoid fever and 16 cases of scarlet fever. Fourteen cases of diphtheria were admitted to the Isolation Hospital yesterday.

LONDON, Oct. 24.—According to custom, Baron Herschell, Lord Chancellor, received Mr. Stuart Knill, Lord Mayor elect of London, at the house of Lords to-day. The Lord Chancellor commented upon the fact that the election of Mr. Knill had been received with determined hostility in certain quarters, owing to the creed in which he believed and said that, undoubtedly, the times were passed when it was impossible for a Catholic to hold office without paltering with his religious convictions. Happily the battle of religious liberty had been fought and won, and the creed in which a man believed was no barrier to privileges, rights and honors.

TORONTO, Oct. 24.—Accountant Menzies, of the city treasury, has been dismissed by the city treasurer for alleged insubordination and plotting against the city's interests. He makes counter charges of improper management of the civic accounts and loose book-keeping that leaves room for fraud to be perpetrated without discovery.
