GERMAN WILL TAKE REVENGE

For the Murder of Her Minister

THE CHINESE HAVE PRACTICALLY DECLARED WAR

And are Enrolling Boxers to Resist Foreigners.

BERLIN, July 4.—The Lokal Anzeiger, referring to the Kaiser's speech at Wilhelm says:—"Never had the Kaiser been known to speak such strong and emphatic language at the beginning when His Majesty condemned the abominable outrage perpetrated on Baron Von Kettler his voice shook with anger and showed such great emotion that it was scarcely recognized."

The speech has made a tremendous impression since it signifies war.

The ironclad division for China consists of the battleships Kurtuerst, Fredrick William, Bradenburg, Weissenburg and Weich, and a small cruiser, the Hela. This force is to be under command of Hoffmann, who preceded Von Diedericks in command of the East Asiatic station and was the direct cause of the occupation of Kie Chan. This naval force is composed of the best ironclads in the German fleet. It is of course understood that after the proclamation of war by the Kaiser other reinforcements will follow.

LONDON, July 4.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Times telegraphing on Monday says that the edict issued at Peking on June 25th amounts to an open challenge of the Powers and practically declares war. It commands the provinces to enrol the Boxers and troops to assist to expel foreigners.

DEATH OF HON. A. R. DICKEY.

Occurred by Drowning Yesterday at Amherst, N. S.

HALIFAX, July 4.—The death by drowning of Hon. A. R. Dickey, at Amherst, has caused sorrow throughout Canada. About one o'clock yesterday afternoon Mr. Dickey went out for a walk on the beach saying as he left the house that he would return at 3 o'clock. They did not see him again. As he did not return R. B. H. Davison and Creel Allen went down to the shore to see if they could find him. While there they had a bath but did not see Mr. Dickey. About 7 o'clock they went down to the shore again and then found Mr. Dickey's clothing lying on a rock. After searching around for a few moments they found his lifeless body lying in less than two feet of water a very short distance from the shore. Only a few hours before Mr. Dickey had remarked to a friend that he could not swim as he used to be able to do. It is supposed that he was seized with cramps.

BOERS CLINGING TO ADVANCING BRITISH COLUMN.

Nothing From Troops That are Pursuing General Dewet.

LONDON, July 4.—Nothing decisive has yet been heard from the continuous seeking to hem in General Dewet. All of Lord Roberts' field transports are engaged apparently in supplying the columns. Operations elsewhere are necessarily relaxed.

One thousand Boers are hanging on Gen. Clery's right flank in his advance to Greyingstad.

Strathcona's Horse on July 1st, received its baptismal fire in which one trooper was killed. Captain Cooper is reported as missing.

LONDON, July 4.—The total loss in the South African war exclusive of sick and wounded is 29,706.

DAIRY NOTES.—There was received at Verdun River Factory on Monday morning 37,604 lbs. of milk which was manufactured into 53 cheese of 70 lbs. each. The largest contributors were David P. Irving, 1,775 lbs.; Owen Sullivan, 991 lbs.; Agutine McLouis, 805 lbs.; Wm. Jenkins, 700 lbs.; R. Farness, 680 lbs., and R. McIasc, 638 lbs. A number of other patrons followed close on the above figures.

There were 27,500 lbs. of milk received at the Hazel Brook Cheese factory yesterday morning out of which 44 cheese were manufactured. The directors have put in another (8th) vat. An addition of 14 feet by 28 feet is also being made to the work room of the factory. Mr. A. A. Moore, of Pownal, has the contract and is pushing the work in his usual rapid style. The outlook for the factory this season is the best it has yet enjoyed.

BOYS' BRIGADE.—The officers of the Boys Brigade had a meeting last night, Col. Moore chairman, at which it was decided that the Brigade should go into camp July 18th, and to continue for one week. The camp will be held at Victoria barracks and in the militia tents. Col. Moore stated that clean blankets would be issued. The different companies are in strength about as follows:—St. Peter's, 20; St. James', (Highlanders) 55; Methodist, 50; St. Paul's, 35. About 30 members of the Summerside Boys' Brigade are coming down. The Brigade will be under command of Major Stewart.

PROHIBITION VOTED DOWN

By Leading Members of The Government

SIR LOUIS DAVIES AMONG THE NUMBER.

Both National and Provincial Prohibition Condemned.

OTTAWA, July 4.—The Prohibition question occupied the House all day and a larger number of members participated than any debate has called up for some time. There were three resolutions: Flint's in favor of Provincial Prohibition; McLure's in favor of Dominion Prohibition, and Parmelee's declaring that the country was not ripe for prohibition.

Messrs. Laurier, Fielding, Fisher and Davies were among those who opposed McLure's and Flint's resolutions. They favored enlarging the scope of the Scott Act.

Parmelee's amendment was carried 93 to 41.
