Three of last year's six teams apparently have decided to disband. According to reports the Sunshine Island champions, Sunshine Island Dairy are dropping out of competition this year as are Keefe Drug and the Navy.

To date the B. I. S. are the only new club. The Abbies, Barry's and B. Y. C. played last year with the B. Y. C. being the only club to remain in operation since the League was first formed in 1952.

### Fardy Wins 10-Mile Race



FIRST TO FINISH

Jim Fardy, Charlottetown cyclist, finished the race almost four minutes ahead of his nearest competitor, Dennis Arsenault of Summerside, yesterday morning as he led a field of seven other racers by a wide margin and finished in 30 minutes and 10 seconds.

Windsor Arsenault, last year's winner, had covered the course in 32:32. Dennis Arsenault of Summerside was second yesterday in 33:59, and Donnie MacEachern of St. Eleanors third in 34:34.

All eight starters finished the race although a stiff head wind was buffeting the young athletes for most of the course between Kensington and Summerside.

Fardy won the Victory Cleaner trophy for placing first, \$3.00 for being the first to pass Harold Moase's store in New Annan, a bike horn for leading the way past Lorne Wright's Service Station at Road's Corner, and \$5.00 for being in the lead going by Jimmie's Grocery in Summerside East.

Dennis Arsenault won a fishing rod from Victory Cleaners for finishing second, \$1.00 for third position going by Moase's store, and a bicycle light for passing Wright's in second place.

Donnie MacEachern won a flashlight from Victory Cleaners for placing third at the finish, and \$2.00 for passing Moase's in second position.

Ken Ramsay, 10-year-old cyclist won mud guards from Lorne Wright for being the youngest to finish, and a box of chocolates from Jimmie's Grocery for finishing last.

### Hawks Buy Lumley And Eric Nesterenko From Maple Leafs

CHICAGO (AP)—Chicago Black Hawks of the National Hockey League announced Monday night that they have purchased veteran goalie Harry Lumley and right-winger Eric Nesterenko from Toronto Maple Leafs.

The Hawks shelled out \$40,000 for the two players and said it is their intention to use either Lumley or their present goalie, Al Rollins, as trading material in a deal "which is now pending."

Nesterenko, 22, was signed by Toronto in 1952. However Toronto had become impatient with Nesterenko's inability to develop the potential the club believed he possessed.

Nevertheless, Nesterenko scored 10 goals in his rookie year, 14 the following season and 15 in the 1954-55 season. When he slipped to four goals last year, he was traded to Winnipeg of the Western League.

Lumley returns to the Hawks after four years with Toronto. He was traded to the Leafs at the start of the 1952-53 season for forward Gus Mortson and Rollins.

Lumley, 30, is a 13-year veteran of the National Hockey League. In addition to four years with Toronto and two with Chicago, he spent seven seasons with Detroit Red Wings.

# Yanks Dump A's; Mantle Clubs Tremendous Homer

KANSAS CITY (AP)—The Kansas City Athletics won the home run derby but lost the ball game 8-5 to the New York Yankees Monday on Mickey Mantle's tremendous homer over two fences, up a 40-foot embankment and out of the park.

The A's hit four home runs, two of them by Harry Simpson, and all with the bases empty. Hector Lopez and Gus Zernial hit double-header circuit smashes to lead off the third inning. Simpson hit to lead off the second and eighth innings.

Mantle's gargantuan clout came in the fifth, also with the bases empty, and after the A's had handed the Yanks five runs in the first inning, four of them unearned.

The game was further enlivened by a near free-for-all when Billy Martin charged off the bench to do fisty battle with relief pitcher Tom Lasorda in the ninth. Players from both clubs swarmed onto the in-

field and together with the umpire prevented Martin and Hank Bauer from reaching the mound. Martin had struck out to start the ninth and had hit the dirt to avoid an inside pitch. Bauer, who hit a home run Sunday but struck out three times Monday, also had spent the afternoon hitting the dirt to avoid being beamed.

Don Larson, who had won three straight without a loss, lasted only one and one-third innings for New York. He gave up three hits and two bases on balls in the second inning and had the bases full when reliever Tom Sturdivant came in to pitch a double-play ball to Demaestri.

Jim Finigan and pinch-hitter Johnny Groth contributed singles

to augment Simpson's homer in the A's rally.

Sturdivant, who took the pitching decision, his second against one loss, had to have help from fireman Tom Morgan in the ninth after a lead-off walk to Rance Pless. Morgan got pinchhitter Bill Renna to hit a double-play ball to Martin and struck out Demaestri.

NEW YORK (AP)—Wilmer (Vinegar Bend) Mizell, going the route for the first time this season, pitched the St. Louis Cardinals into second place Monday as the Redbirds defeated the New York Giants 4-1 to salvage the last of the three-game series.

Home runs by Rip Repulski and Bill Sarni and a triple by Bobby Del Greco were the most damage-

ing of the eight safeties collected by the Cardinals off four giant hurlers.

The Cards actually have a half-game lead over the first place Milwaukee Braves but trail in percentages, .619 to .600.

Repulski's home run, his sixth of the year, came in the second inning off starter and loser Don Liddle, and gave the Cardinals the homer, his third of the campaign, came in the fifth, climaxing a three-run assault that sent Liddle to the showers with his first defeat of the year against one victory.

Mizell, who had failed to finish any of his six previous starts, had a shutout going until the seventh when Don Mueller drove a home run. The tall lefthander yielded only four hits for his third triumph against two defeats but had several bad moments in the eighth when Ray Katt drew one of his four passes and, with two out, Whitey Lockman doubled, Mizell weathered the storm, however, by retiring Alvin Dark on a foul pop up to Sarni.

### MacDougall Scores 3rd-Round KO Over Don (Duck) Trainor

GLACE BAY, N. S. (AP)—Gordie MacDougall, 158, of South Bay, Cape Breton, scored a third round knockout over Donald Trainor of Charlottetown here Monday.

Trainor was downed at the 2:30 mark of the third round in the 10-round main bout.

MacDougall, whose two fisted attack had the Charlottetown boxer on the canvas three times in the third round, sent Trainor down for a nine count with a right to the temple. Trainor got up but walked into a solid right

which sent him through the ropes. Trainor got back after a seven count but MacDougall's two-fisted attack sent him to the canvas for good with 20 seconds to go in the third round.

Both fighters were bleeding from the nose early in the fight and in the final minute of the second round stood toe to toe and slugged it out.

In the semi-final bout Bobby Moore, 145, Sydney Mines, gained a unanimous six round decision over Johnny Griffith, 146, Halifax.

Frick's Office Will Conduct All-Star Poll

NEW YORK (AP)—Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick announced Monday his office will conduct this year's all-star game poll in co-operation with Canadian and American newspapers, radio stations and television stations.

Already approximately 500 newspapers and stations have indicated willingness to conduct local polls and forward the results to Frick's office.

"The response was magnificent," said Frick. "This is still the fans' game."

In recent years the Chicago Tribune has served as the central counting bureau for the poll. The Tribune withdrew this spring.

Frick said the voting opens Friday, June 1, and closes at the local level at midnight, Friday, June 22. Final tabulations must be in his office by midnight June 26, shortly thereafter.

The game is July 16 in Washington.

Chisox Obtain Wilson In Deal With Baltimore

CHICAGO (AP)—The Chicago White Sox Monday obtained pitcher Jim Wilson and outfielder Dave Philley from the Baltimore Orioles in exchange for four players, including veteran third baseman George Kell.

Pitcher Mike Fornieles, outfielder Bob Nieman and a player to be named at a later date went with Kell in the package deal with Baltimore.

Wilson, 34, was the keyman in the trade—one of the biggest of the season. The righthander had 12-18 for the Orioles last year with an earned run average of 3.45. This season he has a 4-2 mark, including 31 strikeouts in 49 1-3 innings.

### Woodling Feeling Fine After Series Of Hospital Tests

FAIR LAWN, N. J. (AP)—Outfielder Gene Woodling of the Cleveland Indians, back home after a series of hospital tests, said Monday that he's feeling fine and expects to return to baseball in about two weeks.

"I'm very pleased with the results of the checkup and feel fine, except that I am tired," he said. Woodling entered Presbyterian Hospital in Newark 11 days ago after undergoing a series of dizzy spells he said hampered his playing.
