NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADA.

TORONTO, June 6.

At midnight it does not seem possible, in
the absence of returns from a large number
of constituencies, to make a correct estimate
of the results of the elections.

All that can be positively asserted is that
the cities and great centres of influence
have, with the exception of Hamilton, gone
with the opponents of the Mowat Govern-
ment.

Ottawa, which was represented in the
old House by a Grit, rejected him and
elected a Conservative.

Kingston elected a Conservative.

In London the leader of the Local Op-
position is elected by 450 majority.

In Toronto, where the Mowatt party
made a tremendous fight, Premier Mowatt
himself was defeated and both seats have
fallen into the hands of the Local Opposi-
tion.

Hon. Mr. Fraser, Commissioner of Pub-
lic Works, who, like Mr. Mowatt, was run-
ning for two seats, was like him, defeated
in one of them, his old constituency of
South Grenville.

Returns to midnight show that the
Mowatt Government had lost the following
seats, which they held in the late House,
viz: Glengarry, South Grenville, Kingston,
Ottawa, Stormount and South Wentworth,
while their opponents lost Lincoln, Len-
nox, South Ontario, North Renfrew and
Russell.

Later telegrams may change these posi-
tions somewhat and extend the list on
either side.

It appears that 81 places had been heard
from, and the returns from five are not in,
the elections in the two sections of Algoma
and Muskoka not having taken place.

UNITED STATES.

BUFFALO, June 5.

Fire destroyed Barnum's variety store
last night. The adjoining stores were
slightly damaged. Loss \$250,000. Insur-
ance, \$200,000.

[NOTE.—The firm is S. O. Barnum &
Co.—not the showman.]

NEW YORK, June 5.

Among the bequests in the will of the
late Wm. Sloan, a New York carpet mer-
chant, is \$100,000 to persons long in his
employ.

Sophia Lehrethayer, aged 24, died in New
York yesterday, from the effects of swal-
lowing a pin last November.

GREAT BRITAIN.

LONDON, June 5.

A memorial to Beaconsfield, signed by
the leading merchants and banks of London
in the foreign trade, asks inquiry into the
effect on the commerce of the world of the
undoubtedly-large contraction of metallic
currency.

ITALY.

ROME, June 5.

The sum of \$100,000 has been promised
for the sufferers by the Alessandria floods
and the eruption of Etna. This amount,
however, is considered far from sufficient.

The Chamber of Deputies has voted
500,000 livres for the relief of sufferers by
the eruption at Mount Etna and inunda-
tions of the river Po.

GERMANY.

BERLIN, June 5.

The Ultramontanes will refuse to vote
the duties on tobacco, beer and spirits, un-
less they receive tangible concessions in
ecclesiastical matters. If Bismarck refuses
the concessions, the dissolution of the
Reichstag is probable.

The Prussian Government has offered to
grant a site for the new Imperial Parliament
House in Berlin.

RUSSIA.

St. PETERSBURG, June 5.

Three more small fires occurred at Perm
on the second and third of June inst.

A COOLNESS BETWEEN RUSSIA AND TURKEY.

LONDON, June 5.

A Vienna correspondent says: Relations
between Russia and Turkey are cooler in
consequence of the events attending the in-
stallation of Aleko Pasha. The Sultan
particularly begins to doubt Russia's sin-
cerity because of the discovery of corres-
pondence between Slav committees in Rus-
sia and branches throughout Turkey, show-
ing a design for a union of all Bulgarians
in accordance with the treaty of San Ste-
fano.

BANK SUSPENSION IN AUSTRALIA.

MELBOURNE, AUSTRALIA, June 5.

The Australian and European Bank has
stopped payment.

EGYPTIAN AFFAIRS.

St. PETERSBURG, June 5.

It is stated in official circles that Eng-
land has joined Germany in a protest
against the arbitrary manner in which the
Khedive's decree of April 4th dealt with
the creditors of the Egyptian Government.
Although solicited by Germany to join in
the protest, Russia holds aloof.

LONDON, June 5.

It is said Germany has informed England
and France that she leaves to them the po-
litical part of the Egyptian question, and
desires only to defend the financial inter-
ests of German subjects.

LEGISLATION CONCERNING GER- MAN RAILWAY FREIGHT RATES.

BERLIN, June 5.

A Special Committee of the Bundesrath
has reported favorably on the bill reserv-
ing to the Empire the right of fixing rates
of carriage on a uniform basis for all Ger-
man Railways and abolishing freight rates
which were unduly favorable to articles
produced abroad.

BRITISH INTERFERENCE.

SINGAPORE, June 5.

According to telegraphic instructions
from London, Governor Lebanan, with two
men-of-war, has visited Sankikan Bay, in
the Island of Borneo, to protest against any
attempt to hoist the Spanish flag there.
The territory belongs to the Sultan of Foo
Loo Island.

THE PORTE PROTESTS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 5.

The Porte has sent a despatch to the
Powers declaring the installation of Aleko
Pasha as Governor of Eastern Roumelia,
without hoisting the Turkish flag and ob-
serving other customary formalities, con-
stitutes a violation of the Treaty of Berlin.

INTERNATIONALISTS SENTENCED.

FLORENCE, June 5.

The Internationalists who threw bombs
among a crowd last November have been
sentenced: one to imprisonment for life,
another for twenty years, and four for
nineteen years.

ENGLAND'S WARS.

SIMLA, June 5.

The Ameer of Afghanistan will start for
Cabul on the 8th inst. After a tour of in-
spection throughout the kingdom, he will
visit the Viceroy of India. The tour will
end next winter.
