HUNGARIAN PRELATE DIES

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Presiding officers at the Vatican ecumenical council announced Tuesday the death in Hungary of Bishop Bertalan Badalik, 74, a prelate long listed by the Vatican as "impeded" by Communist authorities in his homeland. Bishop Badalik, a Dominican, headed the diocese of Veszprem in Hungary since 1949.

Foreign Policy Is Described As Important Election Issue

REGINA (CP) — Canada's foreign policy, or lack of it, is important in the Nov. 8 general election campaign, T. C. Douglas, New Democratic Party leader, said here Wednesday. "No one has been able to discern Canada's present foreign policy, if indeed there is one," Mr. Douglas told a brief news conference after he arrived in Regina by air from Calgary.

He left by chartered aircraft almost immediately for public meetings in Dauphin, Man., and Yorkton, before continuing to Winnipeg.

One thing that has saved the present Liberal government in the matter of foreign policy is that there doesn't appear to be a policy, Extra Affairs Minister Martin never has stood up

and declared the country's policy, Mr. Douglas said. "The New Democrats believe Canada should have an independent foreign policy evolved by the national government itself and not framed by any other nation," he said.

CAN'T FAVOR CHINA — "The situation at present is that Canada is overshadowed by the United States and this is the major reason Canada is not able to come out clearly and favor the seating of Red China in the United Nations."

He said he was critical of any Organization of American States "because that would tie Canada up completely to United States foreign policy."

The New Democratic Party foreign policy would be geared to the view that the United Na-

tions is the one hope for world collective security and peace, Mr. Douglas said.

"Canada should be spending its defence money to provide peacekeeping forces, highly mobile, compact and well-equipped to halt these brush-fire conflicts as they break out anywhere in the world."

"Canada also should strengthen the United Nations by making surplus foodstuffs and even manufactured products available for distribution to under-developed nations."

QUINT LEAVES INCUBATOR — The only surviving quintuplet born 12 weeks ago to a Swedish mother who received hormone treat-

ment for sterility has been taken from her incubator, a hospital spokesman said Tuesday. The baby girl, who still has not been named, now is in a normal baby cot but will be at least a month before she can leave the hospital.

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
